

ATTENDANCE MATTERS! 9 days or less = School Success

Missing just 2 days or more days a month puts students at risk for not reading well by the end of 3rd grade, struggling in middle school and unable to graduate from high school.

Being in school helps students get to know their teachers and their classmates so they can build trusting relationships which helps motivate them to learn and keep trying even when schoolwork becomes hard.

- 3^{rd} The importance of consistent attendance, growing as a learner, complex emotions, cultural connections
- 4th The importance of consistent attendance, learning strategies, perspectives, solving conflicts respectfully
- 5^{th} The importance of consistent attendance, growth mindset, personal learning plans, identity and culture
