SPAT GRANT

- Silent Panic Alert Technology
- GISD Allocation Amount \$39,998
- Status Application completed;
 specific vendor not identified yet
- Grant end date April 30, 2025

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE?

 To fund districts to purchase silent panic alert technologies for campuses as a measure of school safety.



What is silent panic alert technology?

A silent signal generated by the activation of a device, either manually or through software applications, intended to signal a life-threatening or emergency situation (such as an active shooter, intruder, or other emergency situation) requiring a response from law enforcement and/or other first responders.

SCHOOL SAFETY STANDARDS FORMULA GRANT

- Based on proposed safety standards
- GISD Allocation Amount \$599,107
- Status Application deadline extended to August 1, 2023
- Grant end date April 30, 2025

WHAT IS THE PURPOSE?



 To assist in meeting the proposed school safety standards and to include other security related costs.



Allowable safety standards include:

Fencing

Exterior doors

Glass doors not within a secured area

Ground level exterior windows

Silent panic alert technologies

Other required rule components around emergency responder radios, exterior door numbering, and exterior secure master key lock boxes.

Once minimal compliance with the rule is met, we may choose from a variety of school security-related activities, such as:


Security cameras and equipment

Active shooter trainings, emergency response training

Communications systems

Prevention, identification, and management of emergencies & threats

District peace officers, private security officers, school marshals



Proposed School Safety Standards - Overview

- © Creates minimum safety standards for pre-existing instructional facilities.
- © Creates minimum safety operating requirements, e.g., weekly exterior door sweeps.
- O Includes annual maintenance requirements to ensure proper upkeep and ongoing operability.
- O August 2023 Deadline to have contractor procured with a final timeline to complete all work required.



INSTRUCTIONAL FACILITY

A building predominantly used for teaching curriculum under TEC, 28.002.





SECURED AREA

A fence or wall that is at least 6 ft in height and has anti-scaling design features or is 8 ft high; and must be well maintained, and if gated, allows for emergency egress.






EXTERIOR DOORS, EXTERIOR CLASSROOM DOORS & PORTABLE DOORS

Should operate as fully intended, are required to remain closed, latched, and locked, and allow for emergency egress from the inside while remaining locked.

Roof doors should remain closed and locked when not in they are actively monitored or within a secured area.





*Where applicable, trigger doors to lock if electronic door system allows. Notification sent to admin if lock does not engage.

PANIC ALERT

Must allow an alert to be triggered manually by campus staff, automatically with a 911 call, include location of where alert was triggered, alerts administrators which can then alert law enforcement, and can simultaneously send an alert to all staff.


<u>February 22</u> - Due date for district documents to be returned.
