# STRATEGIC BUDGETING MAINTAINS CHILDREN-FOCUSED EDUCATION AND DELIVERS A 0% TAX LEVY INCREASE

Developing a budget that is both fiscally responsible and best serves the educational needs of Westbury students is a challenge every year. This year, it was especially difficult, particularly in light of the inadequate state foundation aid the District will receive for the 2018-2019 school year (see page four for more details on this topic). New York State's own formula for foundation aid says Westbury should be receiving more than \$74 million. In contrast, the District will receive only \$36.3 million in foundation aid. This is unfair to Westbury students and taxpayers, and it presents great challenges to the District's on-going ability to deliver a high-quality education to your children.

Between the state's inadequate funding and keeping the tax levy increase to zero percent, the District was faced with a budget gap of over \$7.2 million. Tough decisions and compromises had to be made. What was most important was to find savings wherever possible that did not negatively impact the core educational program offered to Westbury students. It was critical that the budget support the District's five instructional focus areas (see box at bottom left of this page). As a result of a meticulous review of every budget line item and strategic financial planning, the District has been able to accomplish these objectives and **put forth a proposed budget with NO INCREASE in the tax levy.** 

#### COMMUNITY-FAMILY ENGAGEMENT IS KEY

An effective and open school-family-community partnership is essential to student learning and achievement. Cultivating a positive, cohesive and collaborative relationship among all stakeholders is vital to the success of our students, our schools and community. These partnerships will enable the Westbury School District to provide the innovation needed to help ensure we are successful in developing a future-ready District. ### With Students Leading the Way, Westbury Fights for Equal State Aid



In March, ahead of the finalization of the New York State budget, the Westbury School District held a press conference for faculty, students and parents to demand a fair share of foundation aid funding in order to maintain the same comprehensive education enjoyed by neighboring districts. Dozens of passionate students, many whom had just attended the March for Our Lives in Washington, D.C. the weekend prior, admirably joined the fight for equality. Unfortunately, the State ultimately decided to continue with its inexplicable plan to deny the Westbury School District equal treatment.

The State's budget allocated 48.7 percent of foundation aid to the District, markedly less than the minimum 55 percent needed to provide ongoing quality education to its students and far less than what the state's own formula says the District should receive.

According to the foundation aid calculation created by the State—which considers wealth, number of students, the needs of the students and other factors—Westbury should receive \$74.5 million for the 2018-2019 school year. However, the State's budget only allocated \$36.3 million to the Westbury School District. The fight is not over, of course. The Westbury School District urges you to make your voices heard by writing to your representatives and by exercising your right to vote on May 15.
