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
NICE RIGHT NOW Jonathan Freeman

She said, "God gave us an amazing tool to mitigate sorrow and seize joy by the collar: gratitude. It is a crazy effective trick." In my deep grief, I longed for such a thing to relive the anguish I felt as I tried to go through the motions of "celebrating" a holiday. I now count gratitude as a primary survival tool.

This year I employ the gratitude tool daily. I like 365 projects – having a themed activity to do every single day for a year. Last December I decided 2020 would be the year of gratitude. Since four is my favorite number, I write down (on the Notes App) four things from the day for which I am thankful. I have an alarm on my phone to remind me to do this every night before I go to sleep. As you can imagine this task proves to be harder on some days. In fact, on a couple of occasions I have rebelled and wrote something for which I was NOT "gratefulfour" (like, say, the rushed appointment of an ultra-conservative Supreme Court justice). But generally, I find this practice very meaningful both in the moment of taking time to reflect, as well as when I look back at the long, cumulative list of items for which I thank God. (In case you're wondering, the people and experiences at APTS often make the daily cut.)

I have figured out the evening ritual is easier if I'm on the look-out for things to be gratefulfour during the day, and I type thoughts in as they happen. As a result, I have been forced into gratitude during this crazy COVID year. That's not such a bad thing.


LETTER FROM THE EDITOR Sopphey Vance
