CHALLENGING OUR STUDENTS

Sewanee: The University of the South Courses

Juniors with a cumulative GPA of 90 or higher, and seniors with a cumulative GPA of 87 or higher, are eligible to enroll in credit-earning courses at Sewanee: The University of the South. These students attend classes taught by university professors alongside university students, in addition to meeting SAS graduation requirements. All courses taken at Sewanee are recorded on an official transcript issued by the University and do not count toward SAS graduation requirements. For these reasons, our arrangement is not considered dual enrollment. As a result of offering this genuine college experience, we do not offer Advanced Placement courses.

INDEPENDENT STUDY, with the approval of the Curriculum Committee and under the guidance of a faculty sponsor, is an option for qualified juniors and seniors who submit proposals that clearly demonstrate academic substance.

ADVANCED CLASSES are available for students seeking additional challenges in math and science courses. The Academic Dean will work with students to explore these opportunities, taking into account their prior coursework and academic abilities. These courses are taught by faculty with advanced degrees and are conducted at college seminar level.

RELIGIOUS STUDIES is a required course for all seniors. This college seminar-level course offers students an exploration of religion as a phenomenon common to humanity. Texts for this class include *Dynamics of Faith* by Paul Tillich, *Siddhartha* by Hermann Hesse, *God Is Not One* by Stephen Prothero, and *Justice* by Michael Sandel.

PLACE-BASED EDUCATION is highly interdisciplinary and uses not just our physical geography but also our local and regional history, institutions, politics, and culture. All departments strive to integrate place-based experiences into the curriculum because it helps deepen learning, increase engagement, and create a unique sense of place. Courses offered include Place-Based and Field Geology.

Cumberland Scholars

The Cumberland Scholars program is designed for students passionate about the environment, inspired by nature, and invigorated by outdoor adventure. Through this program, students can elevate their interests by fulfilling a unique set of place-based and outdoor requirements, ultimately graduating with distinction. The path to this distinction includes academic study, experiential learning, technical skill demonstrations, and service commitments. The journey culminates in the spring of the student's senior year with a public presentation of a capstone research project focused on place-based or outdoor education. CHARACTERISTICS

- Founded in 1981 as a merger of Sewanee Academy (est. 1868) and St. Andrew's School (est. 1905)
- Located on a 550-acre campus in rural Tennessee Grades 6-12; boarding may begin in 7th grade
- 2024-2025 Enrollment: 60 Middle School, 142 Upper School, 202 total students from 20 countries & 11 states 7% are students of color, 10% are international
- 45% receive financial support
- Student-Teacher ratio 7:1, average class size 13
- 100% of the Class of 2024 graduates were accepted to college upon graduation.
- 84% of Faculty hold advanced degrees with 65% having a Master and 19% having a PhD.

ACADEMIC CALENDAR

CURRICULUM

Academic requirements at SAS are designed to ensure a broad distribution of courses and areas of study while allowing the individual student to pursue special interests. Each student is required to successfully complete a core curriculum before pursuing electives.

CLASS FORMAT, BLOCK SCHEDULE

All classes meet for two 70 minute and one 90-minute period each week.
