Who can earn the State Seal of Biliteracy?

- Any student in their **senior** year.
- Students who demonstrates **proficiency** in **English** and **any other language**, whether the student speaks the non-English language at home or have learned it at school or in the community.

What the State Seal of Biliteracy aims to?

- Encourage students to study and **master languages.**
- Certify attainment of **biliteracy skills**.
- Recognize the value of language diversity.
- Provide **employers** with a method of identifying people with language and biliteracy skills.
- Provide **universities** with a method to recognize and give credit to applicants for the attainment of high-level skills in languages.
- Prepare students with skills that will benefit them in the labor market and the global society.
- Strengthen intergroup communication and **honor** the multiple cultures and languages in our community.


It's strongly recommended to practice the test to get familiarized with the format.
