## District Report Card Highlights




### **Overall Rating**

The College, Career, Workforce and Military Readiness Component is report only and does not contribute to the overall rating on the 2024 Ohio School Report Cards.

Achievement This component represents whether student performance on state tests met established thresholds and how well students performed on tests overall.	Exceeds state standards in academic achievement	Progress This component looks closely at the growth all students are making based on their past performances.	Significant evidence that the district fell short of student growth expectations.
Gap Closing The Gap Closing Component is a measure of the reduction in educational gaps for student groups.	Exceeds state standards in closing educational gaps	Graduation The Graduation Component is a measure of the four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate and the five- year adjusted cohort graduation rate.	Significantly exceeds state standards in graduation rates


KEY: Tier 1 (on grade level), Tier 2 (one grade level below), Tier 3 (two or more grade levels below)





## TRIAD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL





This group of students needed to follow directions on cards to create lego items.





# TRIAD HIGH SCHOOL


High school teachers utilized several high impact teaching strategies (HITS) from a district-wide professional development session about student engagement.



Students in Mr. Millice's Geometry class take part in a think/pair/share activity where they turn and talk to teach their classmates about how to prove triangles are congruent. Mrs. Swary's Physical Science students were given a variety of topics that they had talked about in class and each poster had four words on it. They had to work with their teams to come up with something that was different about one of the words and they couldn't use the same one as another group.



Mr. Owen's US Government class did a lesson on the Federal Courts and the Judicial Branch using the Five Word Summary Strategy.





Mrs. Trainer's English 10 students identified personification in poetry and worked together to come up with a summary as a group on what they thought the poem was about.
