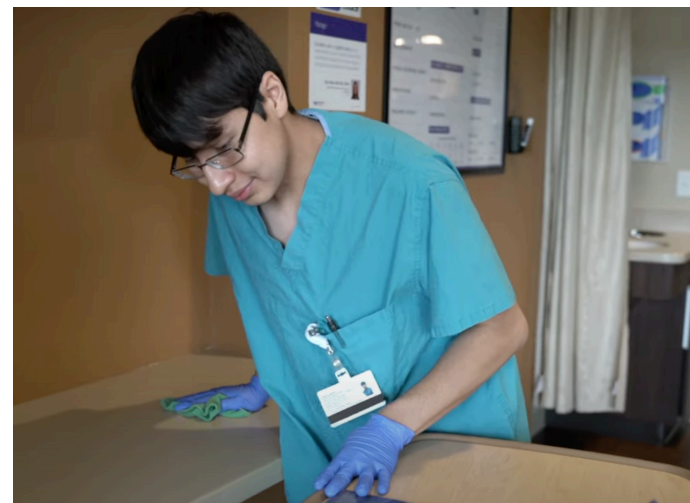

Micro Internship Program

Q: What is a Micro Internship?

Students will earn course credit while exploring career interests through hands-on learning experiences. Students will interview with a site host and receive guidance from their teacher on employer expectations.

Q: Is this Micro Internship paid?

No, the Micro Internship is an unpaid experience. Community High School District 155 provides liability insurance for participating students.

Q: How many hours should I commit to the Micro Internship?

Students are recommended to complete at least 10 hours, but more hours can be arranged based on a mutual agreement with the site supervisor.

Q: What types of activities will students participate in during the Micro Internship?

Students are encouraged to shadow and sample a variety of tasks to better understand the career pathway they are exploring.

Q: How long does the Micro Internship last?

The internship typically lasts between 4 to 5 weeks. Scheduling is flexible, with start and end dates to be agreed upon between the student and employer.

Q: What is the role of the site supervisor or mentor?

The site supervisor should provide a general plan and timeline, inform students about safety practices, share insights on workplace culture, and complete an evaluation form at the end of the experience.

Q: What happens if a student does not meet workplace expectations?

The internship can be terminated if the student fails to fulfill their responsibilities or if the site supervisor feels that the student is not meeting expectations.

Q: What are the responsibilities of the student during the Micro Internship?

Students must comply with all policies and procedures of the internship site, notify the site supervisor of any tardies or absences, and provide their own transportation to and from the internship site.
