The Power of Giving Back:

AVID, Kids Club and SoWashCo CARES Partner on Service Learning Project

South Washington County Schools (SoWashCo Schools) has been awarded an Innovation in Service Learning Grant from the Minnesota Department of Education. With the support of the grant, Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) and Kids Club will expand on their partnership, which began as an opportunity for AVID students to give back to their community and mentor younger students in the Kids Club program.

AVID is a school-wide system to develop successful leaders in their communities and society offered for grades 7-12. AVID students represent our community's economic and cultural diversity. Service learning is an essential part of the AVID curriculum. Through service learning, students practice mentorship, leadership, and empathy skills outside of the classroom.

"The partnership offers a valuable learning experience for both AVID and Kids Club students," explained Julie Onken, AVID Coordinator and Teacher. "AVID students are leaders and mentors." Kids Club students get to see older students from similar backgrounds in leadership roles.

Throughout the school year, Woodbury High School (WHS) AVID seniors and Kids Club students at Bailey, Pine Hill and Woodbury elementary schools will complete three service learning projects addressing genuine community needs, including winter clothing, nutritious snacks and school supplies. They have partnered with the nonprofit, SoWashCo CARES Education Foundation, for community outreach and distribution.

SoWashCo Nutrition Services is Piloting a **Food Rescue Program**

On Monday, Oct. 21, SoWashCo Nutrition Services began a Food Rescue pilot program at five SoWashCo schools, East Ridge High School, Oltman Middle School and Crestview, Grey Cloud, and Hillside elementary schools. With the state-funded Free School Meals program in place, the district served 2.7 million meals during the 2023-24 school year, a 10% increase from the previous year. However, this increase has also led to more food waste. To ensure the safety of all students, particularly those with severe food allergies, uneaten food cannot be redistributed in our schools. To cut down on waste and address food insecurity, SoWashCo Nutrition Services teamed up with the local nonprofit Basic Needs to start the Food Rescue pilot program.



"This initiative not only addresses food insecurity but also empowers students to play an active role in their community by turning surplus food into a valuable resource for families in need," said Opey James Peñaloga, Executive Director of Basic Needs. "It's wonderful to see students learning about food rescue and sustainability firsthand, helping to create a stronger, more compassionate community."

Collection carts are available in the cafeteria for students to drop off unwanted, unconsumed foods. Food is available during the week at the free Basic Needs Food Market (8475 East Point Douglas Road, Ste. 106 in Cottage Grove) on Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 10:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., and on Tuesday and Friday from 10:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Food is also available on the weekends at the Basic Needs Free Little Pantry in the Park Grove Library. Nearly 10% of residents in Washington County worry about running out of food before they can afford more. Please encourage families facing food insecurity to visit the free market or pantry for help.

Construction Updates

Over the past year, architects have met with design teams to form the design work for the additions and renovations at the secondary schools that were approved by voters last year. Drafts of design concepts for Oltman and Woodbury middle schools and East Ridge, Park and Woodbury high schools are available to view online.

Recently, the School Board heard a middle school construction update from Assistant Superintendent Tyrone Brookins. The update included draft floor plans and renderings of project areas within Woodbury and Oltman middle schools.

Woodbury Middle School's remodel consists of:

- Remodel existing space (old pool area) for additional multipurpose space
- Creation of a secure entry / Moving the main office
- Music suite renovations / Creation of 3rd music room
- Create new bus road to revise traffic flow for safety

Oltman Middle School's remodel consists of:

- Additional classrooms, increasing capacity to approximately 1,300 students
- Expansion of cafeteria and kitchen serving areas
- New STEM and special education spaces

After the design phase is completed for each project, construction permits for the work will be secured and the request for proposals (RFP) bidding process for the construction will begin. Later this year more draft design concepts will be released for the other secondary schools.

The design process will begin for Pine Hill, Bailey and Grey Cloud elementary schools in early 2025, followed by Red Rock, Pullman, Crestview, Royal Oaks and Hillside elementary schools later next year.

"It is an opportunity for the students to give back to the school community and get more involved with their school community," said Amy Saldana, Kids Club Out of School Time Support Specialist.

"I got to know all these wonderful kids and got to be a mentor to them," said AVID student Adriyana Lolar.

AVID students learn about each topic, practice teaching it, and then present the lessons to elementary students at Kids Club. The first-trimester project covered winter clothing and consisted of three sessions with each Kids Club site. In the first session, AVID students taught lessons on preventing hypothermia, and the importance of waterproof gear and had a relay race to put on winter clothing. In the second session, AVID and Kids Club students worked together to budget and order approximately \$9,000 of boots and waterproof gloves.

"One thing I really enjoy about doing the Kids Club activities was talking to the kids and seeing what they enjoyed," shared Owen Spores, AVID student.

The students wrapped up the Winter Clothing project by writing personal notes and tucking them into the boots and gloves for the recipients to find. Then SoWashCo CARES picked up the items in the Skoolie bus to distribute to students in need.

AVID students are beginning to raise funds for the second-trimester nutritious snacks project. Grant money will not pay for snacks, so the students have organized a district-wide fundraiser. "It's truly our community, helping our community", said Cheryl Jogger, Founder of SoWashCo CARES.

Tips for Families to Engage Readers of All Ages

As SoWashCo focuses on literacy, we wanted to share some simple tips for families to help readers of all ages. We often hear a lot about learning to read, especially focusing on phonics and sounding out words. These are essential skills, but it's also important to build strong comprehension skills from a young age. Understanding what they read is a skill students need through high school, and it can be part of conversations with older learners, too. The best thing you can do is read with your child and talk about what they're reading—no matter their age!



Curran Mahowald shares six ways families can support reading comprehension at home in her article, Six Reading Comprehension Strategies Families Can Practice Together At Home. Here's a quick overview of each:

- Activate background knowledge: Help your child connect new words and ideas to things they already know. Ask questions like, "What does this remind you of?"
- Make predictions: Ask your child what they think will happen next and why.
 After reading, talk about whether their predictions were right or surprising.
- **Monitor comprehension:** Encourage your child to pause and think about what's happening in the story as they read.
- **Ask questions:** Ask questions to help your child connect ideas, understand details, or guess what might happen next.
- Retell: Have your child retell what they read in their own words. This helps them understand the story better and remember details.
- **Embrace storytelling:** Make reading fun by using different voices for characters and making storytelling playful.





Tips to Dress Safely for Cold Weather

Dressing safely for cold weather will help you avoid hypothermia and frostbite.

- Wear several layers of loose-fitting, lightweight, warm clothing. The layer of air between each piece of clothing acts as extra insulation.
- Outer garments, including gloves and mittens, should be tightly woven, water repellent and hooded to keep out wind, rain and wet snow.
- · Wear a hat to prevent heat loss.
- Cover your mouth to protect your lungs from extreme cold.
- If you begin to feel too warm, remove layers to avoid sweating and chill.

SoWashCo Schools encourages families to monitor their children's clothing selections to make sure they are appropriately dressed for cold weather. Students who do not have the appropriate winter clothing will not be able to participate in outdoor recess. For more safety information and tips visit weather.gov/safety.



Review Emergency Procedures Before Winter
