When one player realized her iPad was dead, he offered his own charger to keep her connected. Throughout the game, Fisco cheered the girls on from the stands and was there afterward to congratulate them on their win. During a dinner stop, he even offered to buy the athletes' meals. When asked why he wanted to pay for their dinners, Fisco answered, "I was so proud of how well they played."

This is just a glimpse of the care and kindness that Fisco shows every day. Known for handing out holiday candy and always being ready with a smile, he treats the students like family. "These kids are like my kids," he said. "They keep me young."

For Fisco, spreading joy and encouragement isn't just a job–it's a calling to try to bring out the best in others. "Every person has something good inside of them," he explained. "I just try to seek it out by talking to them, asking them how they are doing, and encouraging them to keep working hard at school."

Students, coaches, and even Wilhelm say the same thing—the bus driver's positivity is inspiring. Grade 7 student Torran Latham describes him as "very kind," while Wilhelm says that he makes her job easier just by being there.




## **"BOOK TASTINGS" SPARK READING EXCITEMENT**

fostering a strong professional culture among staff, and creating a welcoming environment for students to thrive.


The District is actively working to fill key staff vacancies in the Business Office, monitors, and a Human Resource Director, though the hiring process



## EXCITING NEWS FROM THE SAUGERTIES HIGH SCHOOL MUSIC DEPARTMENT

e're happy to share the news that two of our talented seniors, James McTague and Chloe Turner, have been selected to participate in the prestigious 2024 New York State Schools Music Association (NYSSMA) All-State Winter Conference this December!

After wowing the judges during their solo festival auditions last spring, McTague and Turner earned this incredible honor. They will be joining just 600 students from across New York State who will be performing in All-State groups, representing five musical categories: band, chorus, orchestra, instrumental, and vocal jazz.

McTague was selected for Mixed Chorus Bass 2, and Turner was selected for Mixed Chorus Soprano 1.

## Saugerties senior Chloe Turner shares her experience attending NYSSMA's Solo Festival and being selected to sing at All-States:

Hi, I'm Chloe Turner, and I was selected as an All-State qualifier.

On May 11, 2024, I attended the NYSSMA Solo Festival at The Mount Academy in Esopus for the first time. In early January, my voice teacher, Mr. Zelamsky, selected a beautiful piece called "Sure on This Shining Night" as my solo. It is an emotional, lyrical song, typically for a soprano range. The song did not come easy; I worked on it for a majority of my voice classes from January until mid-May. At NYSSMA, I performed my song for a judge, along with a level 6 sight reading. I felt very confident in my solo, and it was no surprise when I walked out of the school with a performance grade of a 99 out of 100.



Over the summer I got the news that I was selected to attend NYSSMA All-State as a soprano 1 in the Mixed Choir. All-State is a huge honor, as only about 600 students are chosen from all over the State to participate in either the band or choir. Although I was confident in my NYSSMA solo, I was completely shocked when I received an acceptance letter. I am so grateful to have been given this experience and represent the Saugerties Music Department.
