On September 12th, the PSCCN team and Promise to Community Navigators successfully hosted the first King County Promise Bridge event at Renton Technical College. Naveed Badri led the effort to introduce youth to King County Promise (KCP). They received a step-by-step walkthrough of a KCP student's journey from high school through college to graduation, as well as insights into the Equity grant and other relevant topics.

Students had the opportunity to share their aspirational goals, which was a highlight of the event. One student, who will begin their studies in business administration this fall, shared their ambition to open a youth coffee lounge post-graduation, where students and young adults can hang out. Additionally, several students studying industrial maintenance mechanics and repair discussed their plans to open their own repair shops after graduation.









TFollowing the presentations, prospective, incoming, and current RTC students received personalized and small group support to aid their postsecondary transition and retention efforts. These activities included campus tours, career exploration, financial aid assistance, registration support, and college budgeting. Incoming students and their Navigators were also able to attend RTC's New Student Orientation that was held later that same day.

A huge thank you goes to the PtC partners for their thought partnership in preparing for this event. We extend special recognition to RTC for generously providing the event space and refreshments. A heartfelt thanks to CIN, Centro Rendu, NWEdA, and YouthSource Navigators for their collaboration in codeveloping the program and for offering hands-on support to the students in attendance.

We spoke to Maria Hernández, the Lead Youth Case Manager at Centro Rendu of St. Vincent de Paul. She has similar lived experience to the youth served, moving to the States and needing to learn how to navigate a new language and culture. She took this role to be the support she didn't have. As we offer this sequence of resilience, we caution readers that our underserved youth should not have to be resilient all the time. These write-ups capture ingredients to survive or thrive in the current educational system, though we know that striving for an equitable postsecondary landscape means reimagining the system itself.



CONDITION FOR JOY #1: PEER SUPPORT

Maria stressed that every student wants to feel like they are part of a larger community. She said, "Every human wants to be seen and heard." When youth feel like they are connected and actively a part of something, they are driven to stay engaged.

CONDITION FOR JOY #2: AGENCY TO ACHIEVE




The opportunity youth that CR works with want to be the actors in their lives, acting on their own ideas and skills. Navigators express that youth need the space and support to pursue their own interests. All three orgs gave examples where they did deep listening to youth's interests and passions before giving advice. For example, at CR, a student had dropped out of high school and did not want to pursue any education beyond a GED. He eventually expressed that he did not want to be at a school just writing, he would rather do something with his hands. After they talked about programs at RTC which are very hands-on, he decided to pursue a mechanic certificate.

Maria's main goal was to help students understand their identity and worth. She related that if students understand how impactful they can be and that they can do great things, that belief empowers them to pursue bigger goals for themselves. A primary role of a navigator is to help youth discover what that means in the context of their own individual interests.

Upcoming HSBP Listen & Learn Stakeholder Events



EMPOWERING JOY: Maria Hernandez: Centro Rendu





I am the Youth Navigator and Case Manager at Central Ending for the youth program. My journey started when I participated in a youth program at Parrish, which inspired me to work with young people. Having struggled with navigating systems during my own youth, I wanted to provide the support I didn't have.

What academic background do you have, & what accomplishments are you proud of?

What might surprise

others about your job? Where are the students you work with in their academic journeys?

One surprising aspect is the level of resilience students show despite their struggles. When you view their situations through a lens of hope, it can be uplifting—not just for them, but for us as well.

Students I work with range from those still in high school to others who have dropped out and wish to return. Many struggle with graduation due to systemic barriers.

I moved to the U.S. at 11 and faced the challenge of learning English. Graduating high school was a significant achievement for me. After working two jobs to save for college, I eventually pursued higher education, despite the hurdles I faced as an immigrant student.







Where do you see students experiencing joy in their academic lives?

Joy often comes from feeling part of a community. When students feel seen and heard, they find joy, even if school itself is challenging.

What is your role in helping students attain joy or excitement?

My role involves walking alongside students, providing emotional support, and helping them explore their aspirations without the fear of failure.

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What excites and motivates students when you talk to them?

Students often get excited about finding their passions. For instance, one student became enthusiastic about pursuing mechanics after realizing it aligns with his

hands-on learning style.

How do your own experiences with joy influence your work with students?

My personal experiences shape my understanding and empathy toward students. I share my journey to encourage them to believe in themselves and pursue their dreams, even if they seem distant.





Can you share an instance where you changed a student's outlook?

I often encourage students who feel discouraged by discussing their interests and potential career paths. This approach helps them see that there are viable options, reigniting their motivation.



What barriers do students face in attaining joy in their education?

Many students face challenges at home, financial constraints, or systemic issues that discourage them from pursuing their goals, often leading to feelings of disillusionment.



Is there anything else you'd like to add?

I believe my mission is to help students recognize their potential and make informed choices for their futures. I want them to leave with a sense of hope and the belief that they can make an impact in the world.
