### Rutledge and Lincoln Hall assemblies celebrate contributions of veterans

On Friday, November 11th, the District invited family members, loved ones, and community members who served in the armed forces to be honored and recognized at assemblies held at Rutledge Hall and Lincoln Hall. Throughout the day, students at Todd Hall also participated in a number of Veterans Day themed activities. These experiences gave students the opportunity to learn about and honor the contributions and sacrifices of veterans.

Prior to the assemblies, veterans were treated to complimentary treats, coffee, and gift bags made by students. Selected students acted as "ambassadors" having the opportunity to ask questions and learn more about each veteran's military service. With students dressed in red, white, and blue, the assemblies included student-written poetry, performances, and a presentation of the flag by a local Honor Guard comprised of members of the Lincolnwood Fire and Police Departments.

At Lincoln Hall, the Band, Orchestra, and Chorale ensembles performed patriotic songs concluding in a rendition of "Taps." After all the veterans were introduced, students at Rutledge Hall sang the Armed Forces Medley. The event included a slideshow of staff member's families who served in the armed forces. ## SD74 alumnus pledges generous donation to the District

Earlier in the school year, the District received an unexpected communication from SD74 alumnus, Barry Berger. Mr. Berger and his wife, Taffy, decided to "pay it backwards" by donating \$500,000 over the next ten years to the District, which Mr. Berger identifies as extremely instrumental in laying the foundation for his professional success.

Barry Berger was born in Lincolnwood and graduated from Lincoln Hall in 1968. Upon graduation from Niles West, Barry moved to Phoenix and attended Mesa Community College and transferred to Arizona State University (ASU), graduating in 1976 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business. Barry then moved to Los Angeles and started working for a radiology company that provided nuclear medicine and ultrasound services to hospitals. In 1980, he ventured out on his own to open a home care company called Accredited Home Health. Barry met his wife, Taffy in

1984 and they married in 1985. Taffy left her job to join Barry where she grew to be a leader with Accredited Home Health.

The Bergers retired and sold the business to a publicly traded company in 2021. As a result of their successful business endeavors, the Bergers set up a charitable foundation selecting Lincolnwood School District 74 as one of their recipients.

The first \$50,000 donation was accepted at the December Board of Education meeting. In the coming years, funds will be allocated to projects that are already on the District's Master Facilities Plan and eventually to other potential campus improvements. Part of this year's donation will go to renovations of playground areas and toward making the interior courtyard of Todd Hall into a multifaceted learning space. The District is appreciative of and thankful for the Berger's donation.

## New social studies program offers more information and additional student resources

This year Lincolnwood School District 74 is implementing a new social studies program in grades kindergarten through eighth that offers new learning experiences and a variety of additional resources for students.

The new program was selected after a comprehensive review completed during the 2021-2022 school year. A committee of teachers representing every grade level worked through the process of reviewing and evaluating a variety of program options that resulted in each school selecting materials best suited to meet their students' needs.

At Todd Hall, kindergarten through second-grade teachers on the committee chose the *myWorld Interactive* elementary social studies curriculum. *myWorld Interactive* introduces civics, economics, geography, and history concepts to young learners. Topics are relatable to students' everyday lives and the resources are

presented in an organized manner. An engaging layout makes information accessible and captures students' attention. The social studies experience at Todd Hall affords students the chance to learn foundational concepts through written work while applying their knowledge in more hands-on learning opportunities.

"We are currently learning about different cultures and traditions to tie into the holiday season," said first-grade teacher, Veronica Schmidt. "We are exploring different countries and the winter holidays they celebrate."

IMPACT Social Studies was the program chosen for third through fifth-grade students at Rutledge Hall. IMPACT Social Studies aims to teach students about geography, history, structures of government, the economy, and immigration by analyzing sources, thinking critically, and providing opportunities for students to work together.

"The new materials incorporate advanced writing, comprehension, and literacy skills," said fourth-grade teacher, Jill Litwin. "I like that the program features additional outside resources and materials, and includes short assessments at the end of each section. This really helps determine if students are understanding the material earlier on."

Ms. Litwin's class recently enjoyed learning about immigration. One project tasked students with interviewing family members who shared their personal immigration experiences. These conversations resulted in the production of fun video segments highlighting the stories of important family members.

"I enjoyed spending time with my grandpa and learning about where he's from," said fourth-grade student, Zainab Y. "It was fun watching my classmates' video interviews and learning other cultures and also seeing if there were any similarities between our families."

### **Eye on Education**

Lincoln Hall Middle School students are learning about U.S. and world history through a social studies program launched by McGraw-Hill Publishing. United States History: Voices and Perspectives and World History: Voices and Perspectives provide in-depth text and rigorous reading levels that challenge student engagement. Even within the first months of implementation, the new materials are providing students with a more comprehensive foundation of knowledge through a variety of sources.

"I like that each chapter includes additional supporting sources to answer big picture questions," said eighth-grade teacher, Travis DuPriest. "It's nice to have questions built into the text, whereas before we had to seek out this information on our own."



It has been a big difference moving on from our old material and learning experiences," said seventh-grade teacher, Mallory Weiss. "We want to maintain the integrity of old projects we used to assign students and incorporate them into new projects in the future."

Mrs. Weiss' classroom recently finished their first major project during an

exploration of the Medieval Period. She is looking forward to their next time period, which covers the Renaissance. She plans to incorporate a great deal of culture, art, knowledge, and innovative thinking; which she feels the new text goes "above and beyond" in providing background knowledge.

"Our project for the Medieval Period was a simulation of what life was like then," said seventh-grade student, Victor H. "It was a very different experience. I look forward to more projects like this."

Students and teachers will continue to familiarize themselves with the new programs throughout the remainder of the year with all three buildings agreeing that the materials have been welcomed additions to the District's resources.

# Next generation interactive display technology introduced at Todd Hall

Technology continues to be an important teaching tool to generate classroom engagement; therefore, the District follows a refresh cycle to ensure hardware does not become outdated. This past summer presented an opportunity to address aging projector and display screen technology at Todd Hall. The Technology Department explored options within the next generation of interactive display hardware. The department searched for a device that would handle all classroom tech needs in a unit that was both durable and cost effective.

"Rather than buying and installing new projectors, we decided to get BenQ

interactive display boards," said Director of Technology, Jordan Stephen. "These boards are not only full-size interactive whiteboards but they also have 4K picture displays with built-in sound systems, fast refresh rates, and cloud-based storage."

"We use our friend 'Ben' all day, every day in my classroom," said Kindergarten teacher, Sarah Blomstrand, in reference to the nickname her students have given to their board.

"The new BenQ boards have brought a new excitement for learning in kindergarten," said teacher, Dena Swidler. "This year we have been able to use the interactive activities of the Jolly Phonics



Program to make learning phonics fun for all students. Students are able to use their fingers to move pictures, write letters and words, and play games during the phonics instruction time!"

The District will examine the hardware needs at Rutledge Hall and Lincoln Hall in the coming years, but felt installation of BenQ Boards were best suited to the needs of our youngest students. "The interactive features of the boards increase student engagement and improve learning retention," said Stephens. "They are easy to navigate and really just fun for the students to use."

#### Alice in Rutledge Hall!

All third through fifth-grade Rutledge Hall students lended their artistic abilities in helping create an *Alice in Wonderland* art installation down the Expressive Arts hallway. Each grade level had a specific responsibility for the art piece; third grade created the Kandinsky forest, fourth grade created the Monet flowers, and fifth grade created colorful mushrooms to complete the project.

"The project took about six weeks to create all the pieces and about four days to actually put up in the hallway," said fourth-grade student, Laila E. "The goal was to have every student [at Rutledge Hall] contribute to the art piece."

Every student at Rutledge Hall did an amazing job of making their own unique contribution to what was a visually outstanding display.






# Halloween parade
