

Dear Parents,

The following information is for any parent of a child in Kindergarten who would like to refer their child for the Carroll ISD Gifted and Talented Program. The referral form is open December 2, 2024 at 8:00 a.m. through December 17, 2024 at 3:00 p.m. and can be found at the link below, along with additional information in regards to identifying giftedness. You are able to refer your child annually to have him/her tested.

**The deadline for referrals is December 17, 2024 at 3:00 p.m.
There are NO exceptions to the deadline. This is a district guideline.**

The gifted program is called Quest at the elementary level. It is an interdisciplinary program where students are encouraged to make connections and view the world in a more global manner. Quest removes a learner from his or her regular classroom each week, and provides extreme academic intervention for students with an academic need while using state-mandated curriculum.

Students in grades Kindergarten will test in small groups during school hours in January and February. Students must meet [Phase I cognitive criteria](#) in cognitive ability in order to move forward to the Phase II portion of the screening process. Phase II involves testing in the area of achievement. You will be notified after each phase of your student's status after all district testing is complete and the District Screening Committee has met to consider qualifications. Testing will end for students whose scores do not fall within the target range for cognitive ability. In Texas, only 9% of children state-wide are identified as gifted learners. Nationally, it would be the top 3%-5% of everyone. A child in this range is easily observed as such, and thus, there is no reason to rush your child to perform on a paper/pencil test. Waiting will not negatively impact your child's educational experience in Carroll ISD. **The GT testing process is quite rigorous.** Students must be able to listen carefully and sit quietly, without distracting others, for extended periods of time. The hope is that you will consider your student's emotional maturity, academic level (regularly functioning 2 years above grade level), and stamina before putting him or her in a stressful testing environment where they may feel the "pressure to perform" to the extreme level that might require a need for gifted-level academic interventions. If you believe that your child needs gifted and talented academic intervention, please review the information about gifted learners above and determine if testing is in your child's best interest.

By completing this referral, you are agreeing to have your child evaluated for, and to receive specialized educational services, based on academic needs. You are also agreeing to abide by the Carroll ISD guidelines for identification. There is no need to email other extra information, as it might be perceived as an unfair advantage.
