Library and Technology

Hello PVE Families,

It has been a great month of reading and learning in the Library Media Center! We have lots of new books that we were able to purchase with book fair funds and everyone has been excited to check them out! We have also commemorated Native American Heritage Month, reading books written and illustrated by Native American authors and illustrators.

Kindergarten: This month we learned about the jobs of authors and illustrators. We created collages that are similar to author/illustrator Julie Flett's books. We have also been learning about using different features of Seesaw on our tablets.

First Grade: Our books this month have focused on family and traditions and how different families and traditions look similar and different. In technology we began learning about algorithms and coding using Scratch, Jr.

Second Grade: This month we read fiction and nonfiction books with a theme of water. In technology we began working on typing in typing.com and discussed the different parts of a web browser.

Third Grade: The focus this month was on biographies. We talked about narrative, simple, and complex biographies and the differences and similarities between them. In technology we worked on keyboard shortcuts and discussed the importance of passwords in our Common Sense Media curriculum.

Fourth Grade: We have been reading folktales, fables, and fairy tales and talking about the differences and themes. In tech we worked on using keyboard shortcuts in Google Slides and using Destiny Discover to begin research.

I hope you have been enjoying the books your students have been bringing home - it has been fun helping them choose new books each week and finding their personal preferences!

In the Art Studio, we learn by: creating, presenting, responding, and connecting. Here is what the PVE artists have been up to in the studio over the month of October...

K: Kinder Artists have been busy learning about lines and abstract artwork. They were inspired by the artist Wassily Kandinsky as they began their abstract lines painting.

1st: First Grade Artists have been learning about craftsmanship and patterns. They created a beautiful mosaic to celebrate their skills.

2nd: Second Grade Artists created cupcakes with pinch pots and coils formed from Model Magic.

3rd: Third Grade Artists created sugar skull artwork using the metal tooling process.

4th: Fourth Grade Artists continued with their paper mache mask projects and were excited to paint them!

Music

We spend our time everyday in music class learning through our state standards of: creating, performing, responding, and connecting.

Kindergarten: We have been singing songs, playing games and playing instruments that demonstrate opposites in music: high and low, long and short, loud and quiet. Songs include Grizzly Bear, Seven Jumps Dance, Old King Glory, and more.

1st Grade: We have been working on hearing differences in music. We label each section with letters of which then creates the form of the music such as AB or ABA.. Songs include: Wake Up You Sleepy Head, Forwards Backwards Dance, Humorsque and more.

2nd Grade: We have been working on Sol-La-Mi compositions. Each student composed their own song using Sol-La-Mi and also performed it on the bells. We are also continuing our work on adding the half note into our repertoire. Song include: Kings Land, Apple Tree, Aiken Drum, and more.

3rd Grade: We have been working on rounds. Their favorite round is A Ram Sam Sam with some fun hand motions to go along with it. We are also continuing our work on adding sixteenth notes to our repertoire. We do a lot of fun rhythm play alongs like The Mandalorian and Wipe out.

4th Grade: We have starting working on learning the letters of the treble clef staff. We are also working on learning many dynamic and tempo terms and hearing those differences in different songs like In the Hall of the Mountain King.

In the pictures below, you will see fourth graders practicing concert etiquette. The fourth graders take a field trip each year to the Overture Center to see a Symphony Orchestra Concert. In the picture on the left, they are practicing audience etiquette for a formal setting. In the picture on the right, they are practicing how to "rock out" at a rock concert. They are two different and equally fun styles of concerts!!!





World Language

World language learners build communication skills in Spanish through speaking, listening, reading, writing and connecting their own culture to other cultures around the world.

- -4th Grade: We continue to talk about healthy foods and compare how we get fresh foods in WI and in Mexico. Have your learner say some healthy foods!
- -3rd Grade: We started a new unit on describing our appearance in Spanish. Ask your learner to describe their hair!
- -2nd Grade: We continue to talk about healthy foods and the food groups to which they belong. Have your learner say some healthy foods!
- -1st Grade: We finished up our unit on expressing likes and dislikes and will start talking about families. Have your learner say what they like to do in Spanish!
- -Kindergarten: We have been learning how to express how we are feeling in Spanish. Next, we will be talking about what we like to do. Have your learner say how they feel in Spanish!

In our 1st - 4th grade mixed POP Groups on November 8, we defined empathy and practiced "walking in someone else's shoes" by imagining how others would feel in a variety of situations. Students brainstormed how they would show empathy during some turn and talks.


At Prairie View Elementary School, students who have missed ten or more students have shown less achievement and less growth when compared to their peers who missed fewer than ten days. This pattern was consistent over the past two school years and across math and literacy.

Students who missed more than ten days achieved 2.9% lower in literacy proficiency and 2.5% in math and grew 3.1% less in literacy and 1% less in math than peers who missed fewer than ten days.

Why It Matters

If children don't show up for school regularly, they miss out on fundamental reading and math skills and the chance to build a habit of good attendance that will carry them into college and careers.
