Message from the Principal

Dear West Community,

Nearly everyone agrees that a state report card tells only part of a school's story. Unfortunately, it is that part of the story that often becomes the "brand" of a school. Currently, our brand reflects that we are Meeting Expectations. However, in full transparency, West's overall score dropped this year to 64.5.

While this is not the result we hoped for, it provides a clear focus for improvement. As a school, we are committed to regaining those points and striving for even greater achievements in the future. This year, our goals center around three key areas:

- 1. Reimagining our curriculum through an IB lens to make learning more relevant and engaging for students and families.
- 2. Using assessment to guide instruction so we can better meet the diverse needs of our learners.
- 3. Identifying and removing barriers to engagement to ensure every student can thrive.

We understand that state test scores may not always feel like a priority to families, and some students may not see the immediate value in performing well on these exams. However, these scores represent both our students and West High School. Even small improvements can have a significant impact. For instance, a 2–5 point increase in individual scores could elevate our overall rating dramatically.

Please encourage your student to give their best effort. How they represent themselves and our school truly matters. Below are some ways that you can help your student prepare for tests.

- Ensure they get ample sleep before testing days.

- Emphasize the importance of doing their best.
- Plan something enjoyable afterward to celebrate their efforts.
- Keep the conversation positive and encouraging!

TECH ED: BRIDGES CONSTRUCTION & RENOVATION

Bridges Construction & Renovation has taken off this school year. We have 20 students spread between the two classes that are building a home sponsored by NeighborWorks of Green Bay. Students are a mix from all four major high schools within the Green Bay Area Public School District. We are currently working at 929 N. Broadway Street in Green Bay, with hopes to start a second location later in the school year. Our classes focus on hands-on learning with real-life applications. Students learn the basics of blueprint reading, laying out walls, drywall, sheeting, roofing, siding, setting windows and doors, as well as finish carpentry. Students also receive credit for three classes through NWTC if they choose to pursue a career in the construction field. So far, students have done a great job constructing the house and are working on drywalling the inside. We also hope to put the siding on the outside before it gets too cold.

The Bridges Construction & Renovation class is open to any student in the District that will be a Junior or Senior next school year. There is an application process, so be sure to talk with your student's counselor and get signed up for a great time on the job learning how to build a house. Assistance could include a monetary donation or your expertise in the construction field.

Tiny Earth Symposium on December 6th

Thirteen female students from Green Bay West High school have joined forces with college students across the state of Wisconsin and around the world to combat the world health crisis of antibiotic-resistant bacteria, including MRSA. These fierce student pioneers have conducted research (The Tiny Earth Project) on antibiotic activity in soil bacteria over the last 16 weeks at UW-Green Bay to fill a critical need to discover new antibiotics. Please attend the free research symposium on December 6th, at Lambeau Field from 5:00 – 7:30 pm. Attendees will have the opportunity to learn what the group has discovered as we celebrate the research efforts of these amazing students from Green Bay West. Last year's event was attended by more than 600 people from the community and it continues to grow.








HEART ATTACK DEATHS SPIKE DURING WINTER HOLIDAYS

The American Heart Association urges people to be aware of, and reduce risks for, deadly 'holiday heart attacks.' Studies show weather can increase heart attack risk due to restricted blood flow through constricted vessels caused by cold temperatures. Research also shows that the biggest increases in holiday heart attack deaths are among people who are not in a hospital.



- Know the symptoms and take action: Heart attack signs may vary in men and women and it's important to catch them early and call 9-1-1 for help. The sooner medical treatment begins, the better the chances of survival and preventing heart damage.
- Celebrate in moderation: 'Tis the season for unhealthy changes in diet and higher alcohol consumption. Eating healthfully during the holidays doesn't have to mean depriving yourself, there are still ways to eat smart. Look for small, healthy changes and swaps you can make so you continue to feel your best while eating and drinking in moderation, and don't forget to watch the sodium.
- Plan for peace on earth and goodwill toward yourself: Make time to take care of yourself during the busy holiday. Reduce stress from family interactions, strained finances, hectic schedules and other stressors that tack on this time of year, including traveling.
- Keep moving: The American Heart Association recommends at least 150 minutes of physical activity per week and this number usually drops during the holiday buzz. Get creative with ways to stay active, even if it's going for a family walk or another fun activity you can do with your loved ones.
- Stick to your meds: Busy holidays can make way for skipping medications, forgetting them when away from home, or not getting refills in a timely manner. Here is a medication chart to help stay on top of it, and be sure to keep tabs on your <u>blood pressure</u> numbers.
