BACKGROUND

The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (http://dpi.wi.gov/acp) in the PI-26 legislation requires public school districts to provide academic and career planning services to students in grades 6th - 12th. This Education for Employment / Academic & Career Plan is required to be approved by the school board and published on the school district website annually.

Academic and Career Planning (ACP), is a student-driven, adult-supported process in which students create and cultivate their own unique and information-based vision for postsecondary success. Research on the ACP process shows that it increases student motivation, engagement, school connection, and awareness of individual strengths and weaknesses.

The ACP program at Glendale River Hills School District ensures every student is prepared for life after school no matter what path they plan to take. This includes:

- Career and technical education provided in the school district for 4th through 8th grade students. Topics covered include engineering, design, woodworking, machines, marketing, agriculture and design.
- Career Exploration and Skill development through the following clubs and extracurriculars: STEM Club, Green Team,

Garden Club, Rainbow Rights, Forensics, Robotics and STEM Club.

• A commitment to Social Emotional Learning for all students to support workplace and life skills.

The Glendale River Hills School District is committed to supporting our entire staff to become engaged in the career readiness process. Our School Counselors will annually provide professional development of staff covering the following topics:

FAMILY ENGAGEMENT AND COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

Glen Hills parents, community partners and volunteers play a pivotal role in the Academic and Career Planning (ACP) process. They actively contribute to the development of their children and the betterment of our school by generously sharing their wealth of knowledge, extensive experience, specialized expertise, and unwavering support during various events, community experiences and classroom projects. Planned activities in 2024-2025 include a College & Career Awareness Week together with our annual STEM fair.

Community partnerships with colleges and businesses are essential for aligning our ACP initiatives with the demands of a future-ready workforce. Collaborations such as classroom partnerships with the UW-Milwaukee School of Architecture and MSOE Engineering Workshops help foster post-secondary awareness and career exploration.

In addition, our annual STEM fair showcases the strength of these connections, featuring over 34 community partners and local businesses. Partners include BMO Harris, Mathnasium, Milwaukee Public Museum, Milwaukee River Keepers,





Caregivers are kept informed about ACP initiatives, their goals, and how their children are actively participating. Updates are regularly shared with parents through our Thursday folders. Furthermore, we actively encourage parents and community members to engage in our educational activities.

The Student Services team also promotes awareness of transitions and provides ACP support at family open house events, parent conferences, and via direct email. Additionally, 8th-grade students receive transition information during a dedicated family night and are offered individualized conference opportunities.

INDIVIDUALIZED ACP SUPPORT

Personalized support is offered to students via ACP (Academic and Career Planning) lessons within the classroom, collaborative in-class projects, and immersive learning engagements with our community partners. In conjunction with these initiatives, we harness the power of Xello, our career information software. Additionally, our commitment extends to one-on-one meetings with 8th-grade students as they prepare for their transition to high school.

ACCESS FOR ALL STUDENTS

Our team of case managers collaborates closely with our school counselor to develop customized transition plans for students with IEPs, 504 plans and English Language Learners. These comprehensive plans are designed to establish a robust support framework that empowers all our students to successfully achieve their Academic and Career Planning (ACP) goals.

ACP SOFTWARE TOOL / CAREER READINESS TECHNOLOGY

The District has selected Xello, a web based tool that helps students to achieve their potential in school, career and life. Xello's interactive and engaging platform allows for both teacher-led and student-guided career and academic planning and exploration. The platform follows students from year to year, allowing them to explore careers of interest and communicate their interests and future plans to caregivers, educators and peers.

CURRENT PROGRESS AND FUTURE GOALS FOR IMPLEMENTATION

The foundation for a strong ACP and E4E program at Glendale River Hills School District is well established in our learning extension program and career and technical education classroom. The addition of expanded school counseling and student support services staff in 2022 has allowed us to focus more intently on articulating our current initiatives while growing



opportunities for students and engaging students and caregivers in strong transition and career exploration activities. As we build on these foundations, areas for future growth and study are needed. Specific goals for our team include the following:
