STUDENTS, STAFF CELEBRATE THE POWER OF INDEPENDENCE

Visually impaired students at the Seneca Valley Senior High School visited the quaint town of Harmony this month to practice pedestrian crossing in observance of White Cane Awareness Day (Oct. 15). It is set aside to celebrate the achievements of those who are blind or visually impaired and the importance of the white cane, as it's used as a tool to help keep them safe and navigate through the environment.

Ms. Jessica Sloan, Midwestern Intermediate Unit (MIU) IV Teacher of the Visually Impaired, supervised her students, junior, Nick Berger and senior, Elizabeth Demaster as they practiced crossing intersections with their white canes.

Both Mr. Berger and Miss Demaster have Cortical Visual Impairment (CVI). While they do have a lot of usable vision, their brain struggles to process what the eyes are seeing due to damage in cortical pathways to the brain. Both Mr. Berger and Miss Demaster have difficulty with depth perception skills, so the cane can allow them to identify curbs with ease at street crossings, and to ascend and descend steps safely.

"You can identify a white cane from other canes, because the shaft is white, and there is at least six inches of red at the









bottom," said Ms. Sloan. "Many times, the cane is made of reflective materials to help drivers spot it at night, and a fun fact is that the cane grip is made of the same material golf clubs have on their handles to allow for the traveler to have a secure grip even in the rain, snow, or if their hands are sweating in the heat."

Additional enrichment activities took place on campus to recognize White Cane Awareness Day. Mr. Berger created a bulletin board with facts about the white cane, Miss Demaster created and distributed white chocolate covered pretzels resembling white canes and sophomore, Ciara Schneider worked with SVTV by creating a diagram that demonstrates the different parts of the white cane.

Ms. Sloan added, "In my opinion, the most important aspect of White Cane Day is to bring awareness to the community



about the white cane and how it provides independence and safety for individuals who are visually impaired."

Ms. Sloan currently works with 35 students from across the District who have visual impairments including four high school students who are using the white cane. Mr. Berger and Miss Demaster continue working on analyzing intersections to determine if they are safe to cross, and to use the cane to cross streets at non controlled intersections and intersections controlled by stop signs. They next phase they will practice with Ms. Sloan is crossing intersections controlled by stop lights.






SHOPPING WITH THE PENGUINS
















GOING FOR GOLD

HAVING A BLAST

Inspired by a series of abstract films created in the early 20th century, the short poetic documentary project requires students





to find a great variety of interesting shots using multiple lenses and other equipment. The goals were to give students a unique location for honing their shooting and editing skills, provide a bit of local history and give them an outlet for expressing their creativity. Additionally, their visit to the Carrie Furnaces gave them a sneak peek at a location that will house state-of-the-art film production studios for major Hollywood films in the coming years. NATIONAL PROGRAM RECOGNIZES STANDOUT STUDENTS

Officials of National Merit Scholarship
Corporation (NMSC) recently announced Seneca
Valley seniors Lucas Boyle, Alexander Kim and
Shivani Umesh as a Semifinalist in the 69th
annual National Merit Scholarship Program.

As a Semifinalist, Mr. Boyle, Mr. Kim and Miss Umesh will have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,140 National Merit Scholarships worth nearly \$28 million that will be offered next spring. From over 16,000 Semifinalists, more than 15,000 are expected to advance to the next level of the program where these students will have the opportunity to earn a National Merit Scholarship and, ultimately, the Merit Scholar® title.

In addition, Seneca Valley seniors, Lydia Miller and Lihini Ranaweera, have also been named a Commended Student in the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program. Miss Miller and Miss Ranaweera were recognized by the NMSC for their outstanding performance on the qualifying test used for program entry.

"To be recognized as a National Merit semifinalist is quite an honor, but we must recognize the work that went into that recognition for the past 11 years," said Seneca Valley Senior High School Principal, Mr. Bob Ceh. "These young learners have been tireless in their dedication to challenge themselves and rise to this level of accomplishment. We are proud of them and look forward to their continued contribution to Seneca Valley and to the world beyond our walls."

Over 1.3 million juniors in more than 21,000 high schools entered the 2024 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2022 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state.

This event is the most comprehensive anti-hate conference in the world. It unites experts and leaders from around the globe who are dedicated to eradicating all forms of hate-fueled violence. The purpose of the Summit is to provide a unique, multidisciplinary forum to share ideas and build working relationships to drive the development and deployment of effective approaches to reduce hate-fueled violence.

Mr. Ashley Porter, Supervisor of Equity and Title IX Coordinator, attended the event, along with Ms. Carrissa Miller and Ms. Catherine Smolter, Learning Support Teachers from the senior high school; Ms. Michele Russo, English Teacher at the intermediate high school; teachers from Ryan Gloyer Middle School, Ms. Skylar Meier, Health and Physical Education, Mr. Gregory Smolinski, Gifted Support and Mr. John Roman, Math; Ms. Jessica Scerbo, ELS Teacher at Rowan Elementary School; and Ms. Melissa Bonicky and Ms. Nicole Moorman, Guidance Counselors from Ehrman Crest.

This event was very impactful for our SV faculty, and it brought together leaders from government, academia, journalism, business, and the nonprofit sector. The three days consisted of international keynote speakers, panelists and a variety of break-out sessions.









STARTING THE YEAR WITH RECORD-BREAKING SEASONS! | UPCOMING SPECIAL EVENT DATES

While most fall sports have not yet started their post-season play, two Raider teams - girls golf and girls tennis - have completed their seasons in record-breaking fashion. The girls varsity golf team surprised the entire WPIAL team championship field with their runner-up finish earning one of six playoff berths in the PIAA Girls 3A Team Golf Championships held at the Penn State University Blue Course. At the one-day championship event, the Raiders finished in fifth place. Out of 116 AAA teams in the state, to place fifth is quite a seasonal accomplishment! Prior to the team championships, senior Lihini Ranaweera finished in third place at the WPIAL Girls Golf 3A Individual Championships and earned her second opportunity to compete at the PIAA Championships, and she did not disappoint! Lihini's two-day total of 152 was good enough to finish in the top-nine of the championships earning herself a PIAA 3A Girls Golf Championship medal. We congratulate Lihini and the PIAA state qualifier girls golf team (Madison Sharek, Sarah McCullough, Rylin Barbe and Cassie Dague) on an amazing 2023 season!

The girls tennis team, under head coach Eric Grove, had a recordbreaking 2023 campaign, qualifying for the WPIAL 3A Girls Tennis Team Championships and sending a singles player, senior Kylie Staudt to the WPIAL 3A Girls Tennis Individual Championships. By virtue of her top-four finish at the section singles tournament, Staudt qualified for the WPIAL finals, seeded 16th and had to face the eventual runner-up from Penn Trafford. While the result was not what Staudt expected, we applaud her tenacity throughout the singles bracket and the fact that she was the first Raider girls tennis player to qualify for the WPIAL Individual Championships in 15 years! The team completed their season with an overall record of 10-8 and 4-3 in section play.









Their fourth-place finish in the section rewarded the Raiders with a spot in the WPIAL Team Championship bracket as the 14th seed, squaring off against 3rd seed Mt. Lebanon. Seedings held true to form as the Raiders fell 5-0 to close out their fantastic 2023 season. We congratulate Coach Grove and the entire team on their performances this fall!

Lihini was also recognized as the Week Four Scholar Athlete of the Week by 22 The Point's Friday Night Rivals. We recognized Lihini as the September Female Athlete of the Month. Congratulations Lihini!

The Male Athlete of the Month for September was boys golfer Payton Brown. A senior, Payton has had a great season on the links with a 9-hole average of 39.91. He was a team medalist in two matches, including scoring a season low of 36 in a match versus Shaler. Payton left his best golf for the postseason, finishing in the top 27 at sectionals with an 18-hole score of 80. He was one of five Raiders to make the cut and represent Seneca Valley at

Alexandra Todd, SV '09, is currently working as a news reporter for KDKA CBS Pittsburgh. We asked her to catch us up on what she is doing and how Seneca Valley influenced her life and career.

HELPING YOUR KIDS MANAGE MEDIA CONSUMPTION DURING WAR TIME

A horrific tragedy is happening in the Middle East. It is yet another call to action for adults to proactively mitigate the negative impacts of media seen by our kids and teens.

Discussed below includes three steps to help protect our kids from the downsides of social media and overall screen time, especially given the prevalence of violence, misinformation, and distressing content right now.

Many teens feel that staying well-informed is a sign of solidarity and is the right thing to do. However, there are many cracks in this logic. While there is no need to contest their thoughts on this directly, it is important to create safeguards around what and how much every child, young and old, is seeing.

1. Know what news they are getting exposed to.

Ask your kids where they hear and see things about the Middle East conflict and other hard news. This is key because it might be from places we haven't even considered. Perhaps they are watching YouTube videos. Some teens have shared that there is a TV in the cafeteria with news on it at their high school. Many see things on Instagram or TikTok.

2. Discuss the problems of getting online media.

There are many problems with the media diet getting fed to kids. One issue is that the more shocking a video or image is, the more plays it will get on social media. The business model favors eyeballs on screens; thus, platforms like X (formally Twitter) and others have little incentive to prevent such content from being disseminated.

And that goes for false information, too. The amount of false information and fake images distributed is a big problem. Check out the blog posts, How To Think Like A Fact Checker and Helping Youth Navigate War Videos on TikTok to learn more.



3. Change settings on tech

Have the family bring phones, iPads, and computers to the table and together optimize settings in Youtube, Instagram, TikTok, etc., to improve what and how much gets seen. Here are some pointers:

Instagram

Back in 2022, Instagram launched a setting option called "Suggested content" to help people choose to have less intense violent and sexual content. Here is how to do it.

YouTube

Disable autoplay. Here is how to do this. With YouTube's app, one can also stop autoplay.

Also, one can choose "Restricted mode" in the settings, which helps hide content that YouTube deems "potentially mature."

Tiktok

Make sure the "For You" page is set to "Restricted mode." The "Restricted mode" still lets in all sorts of videos that may be inappropriate. But in terms of harm reduction, it is worth putting it on. Here is how to do this.

Also, for TikTok, it can be an ideal time to try out the Family Pairing system with your teen, where you link your account with them and customize their settings, such as the amount of daily use. In the "Family Pairing" tool, you can do things like filter video keywords. Here is how to do this.

Remember to talk about how we are working on this together so this is not me vs. you. After all, there are ways to get around these types of settings.

Questions to start the conversation:

- 1. What information about the Middle East and other issues is coming to you online?
- 2. What are some problems regarding the information and images we get via various platforms?
- 3. Let's optimize our settings to limit the problems of what and how much we consume.
