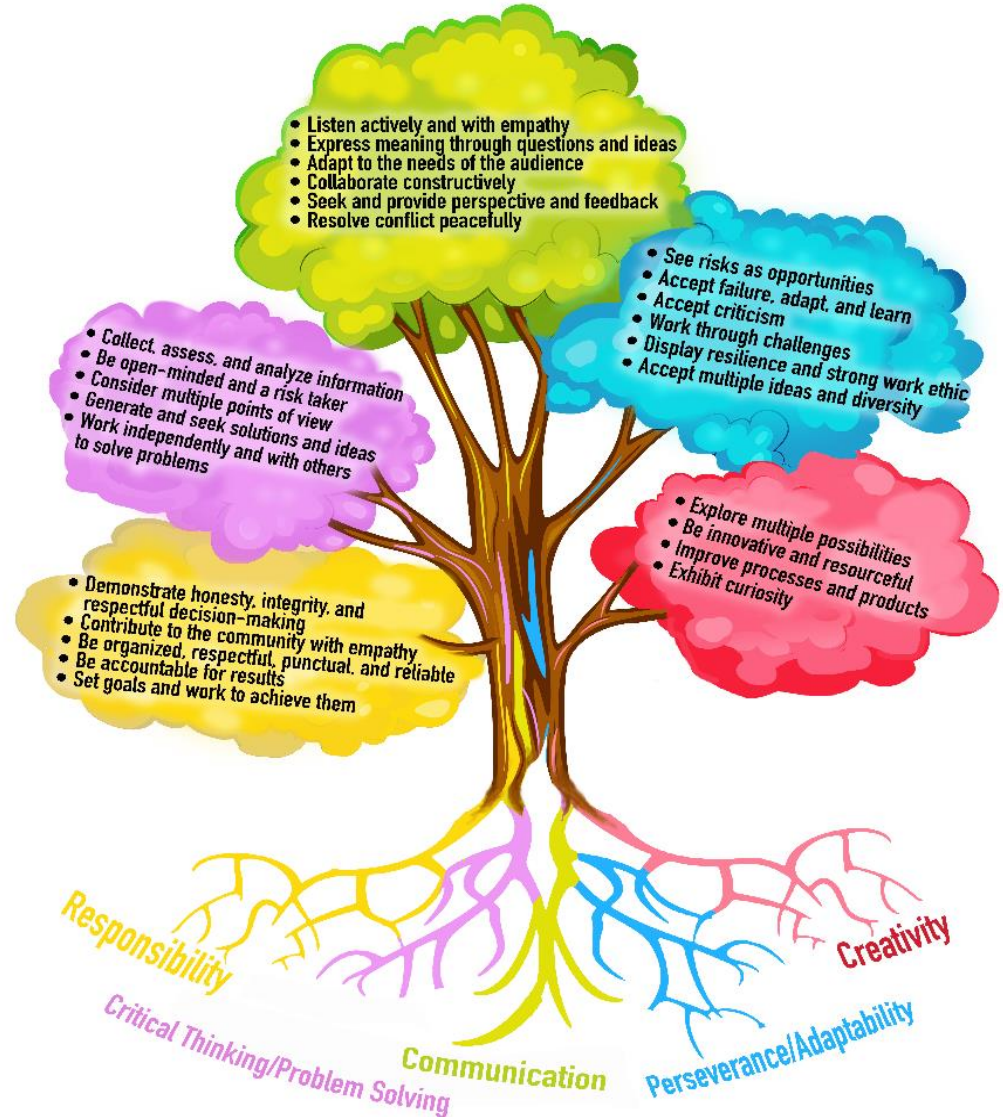

Comprehensive Plan Goals (2024-2027)

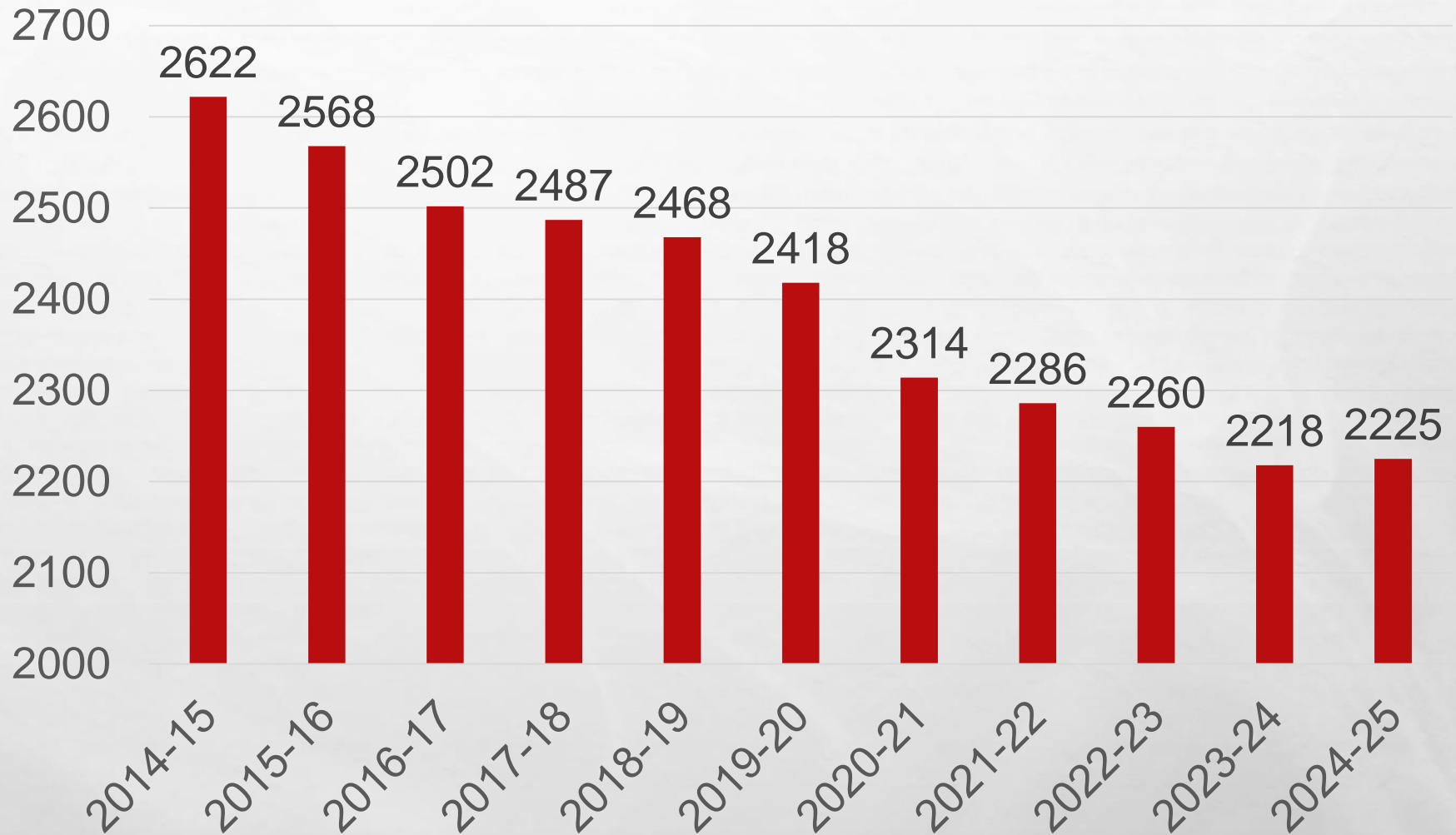

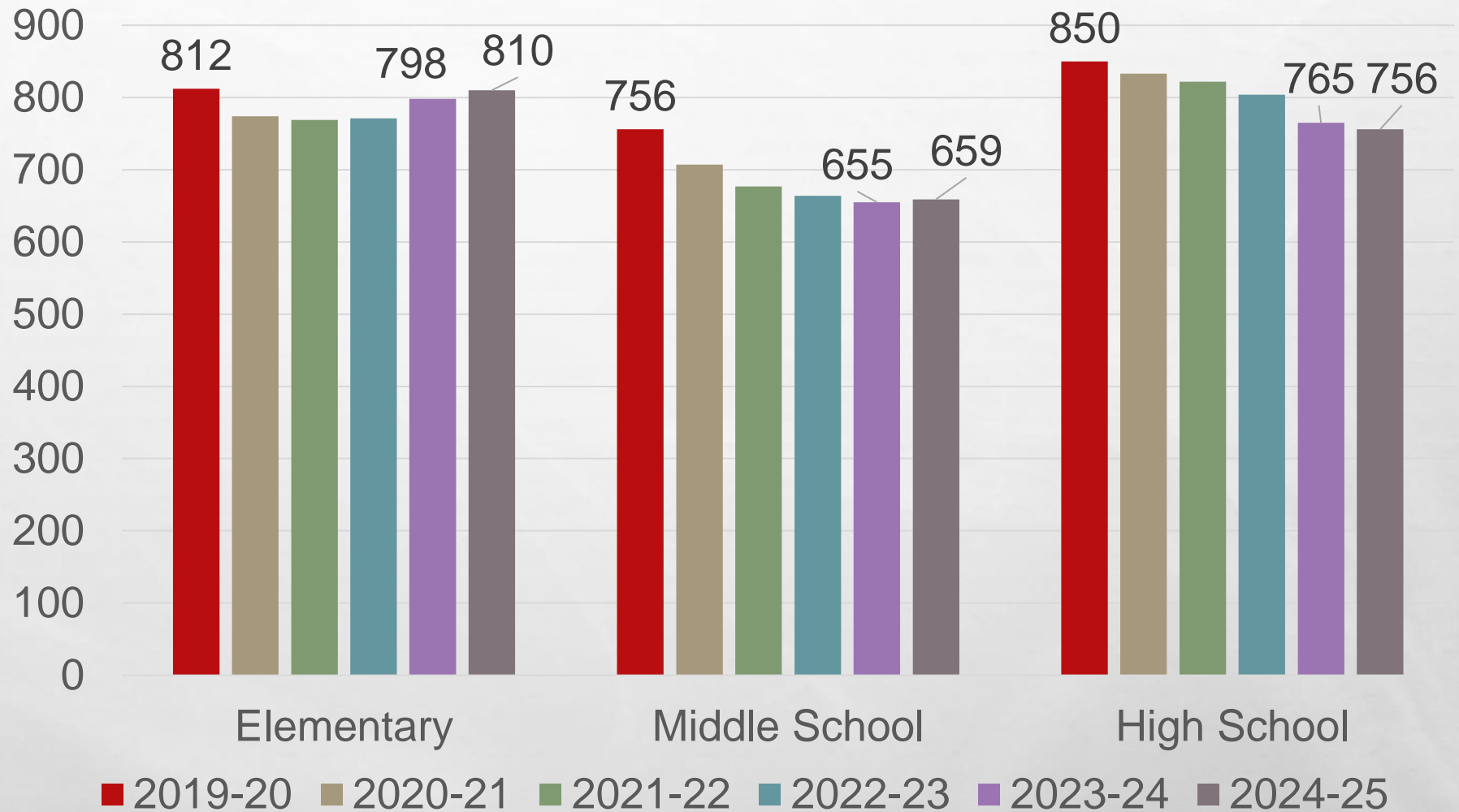

Student Enrollment

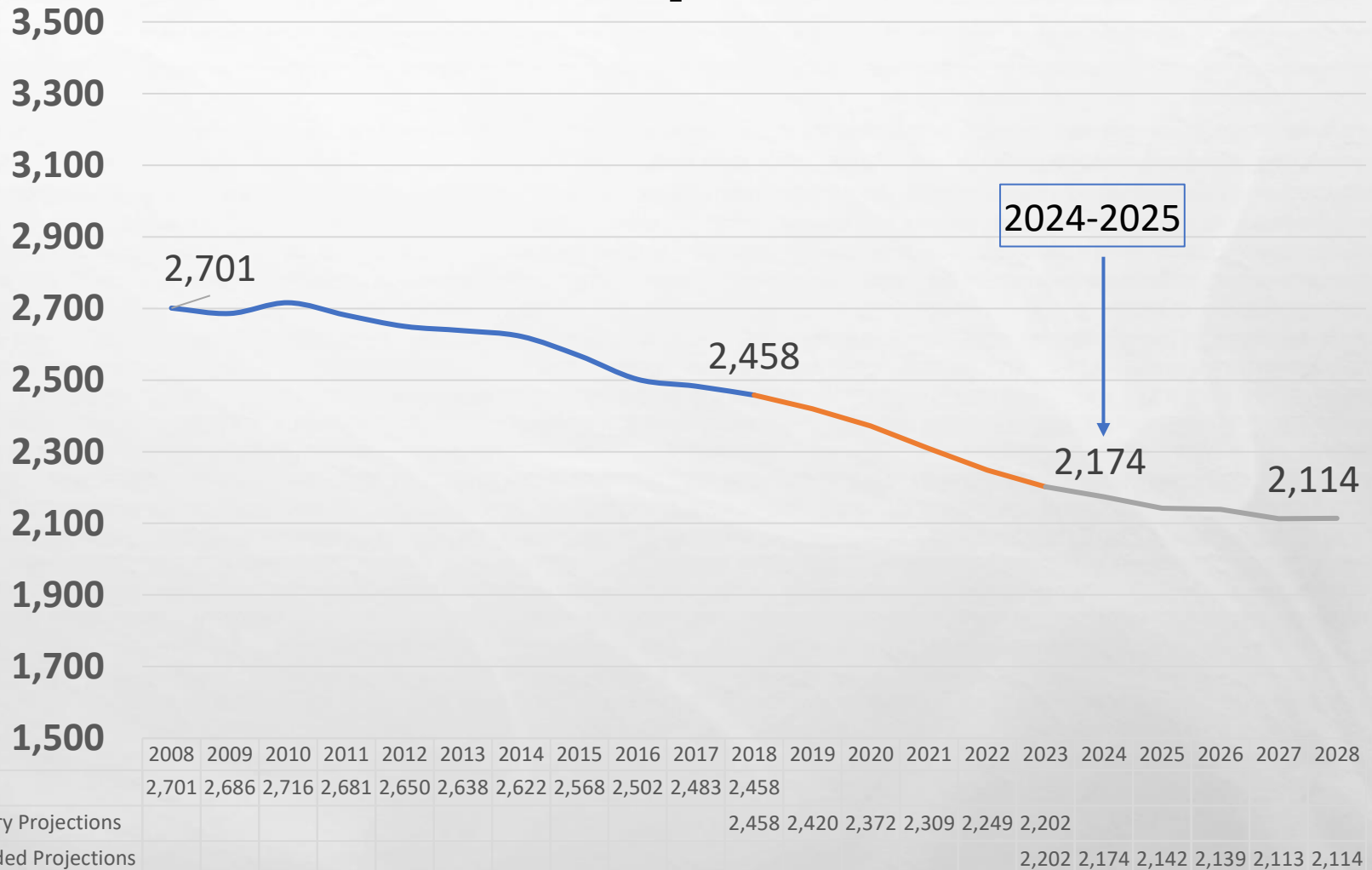

Student Enrollment Change by Level

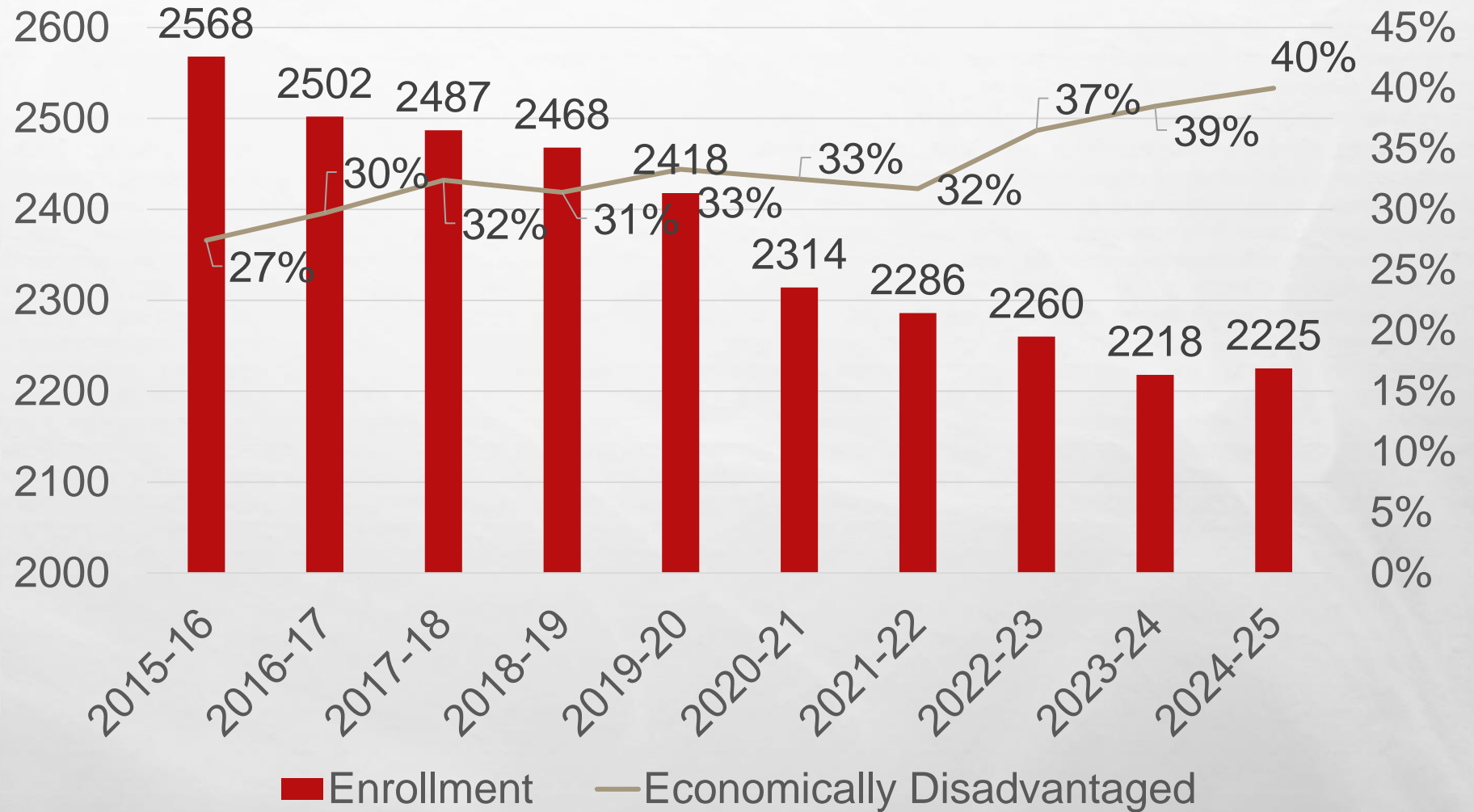

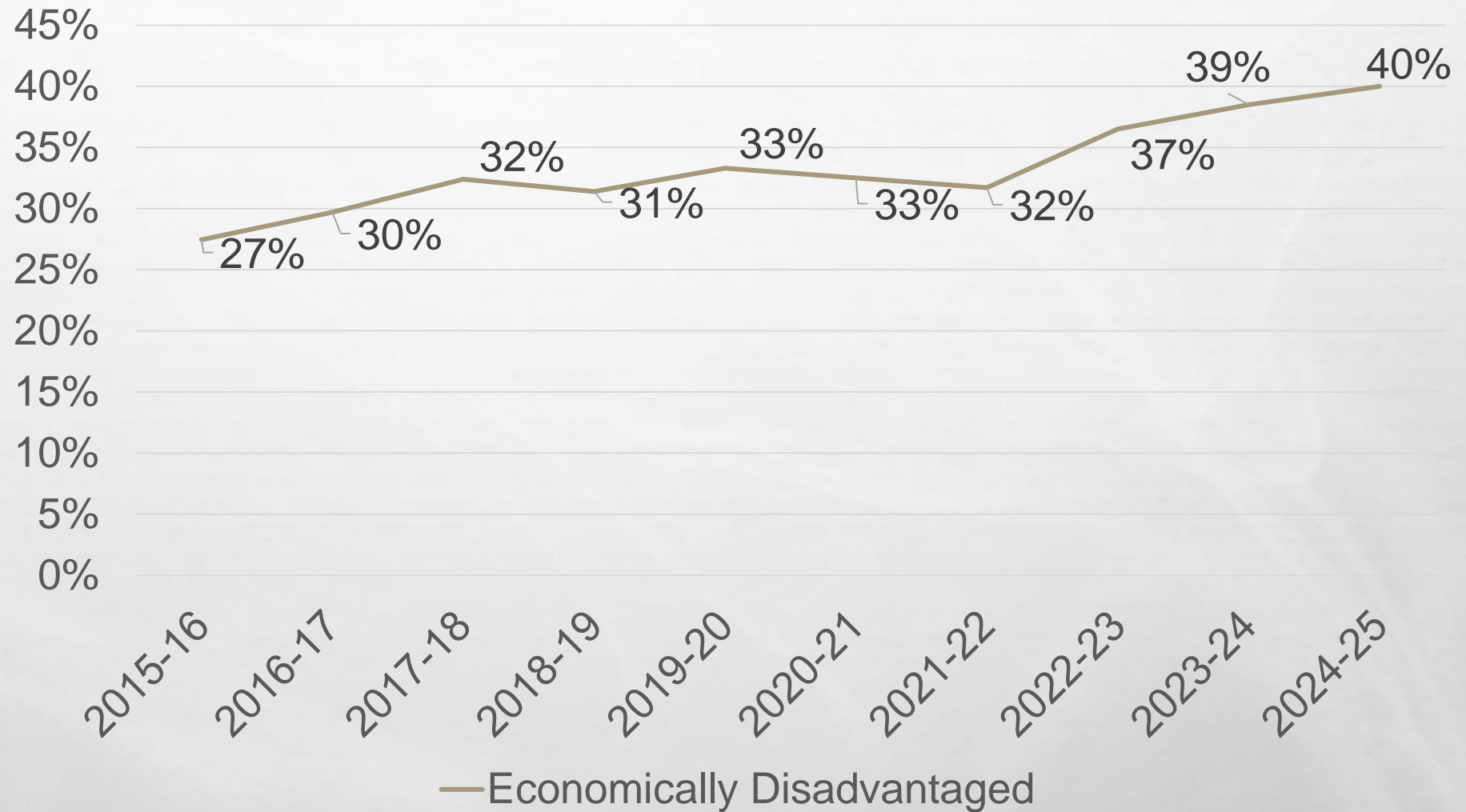

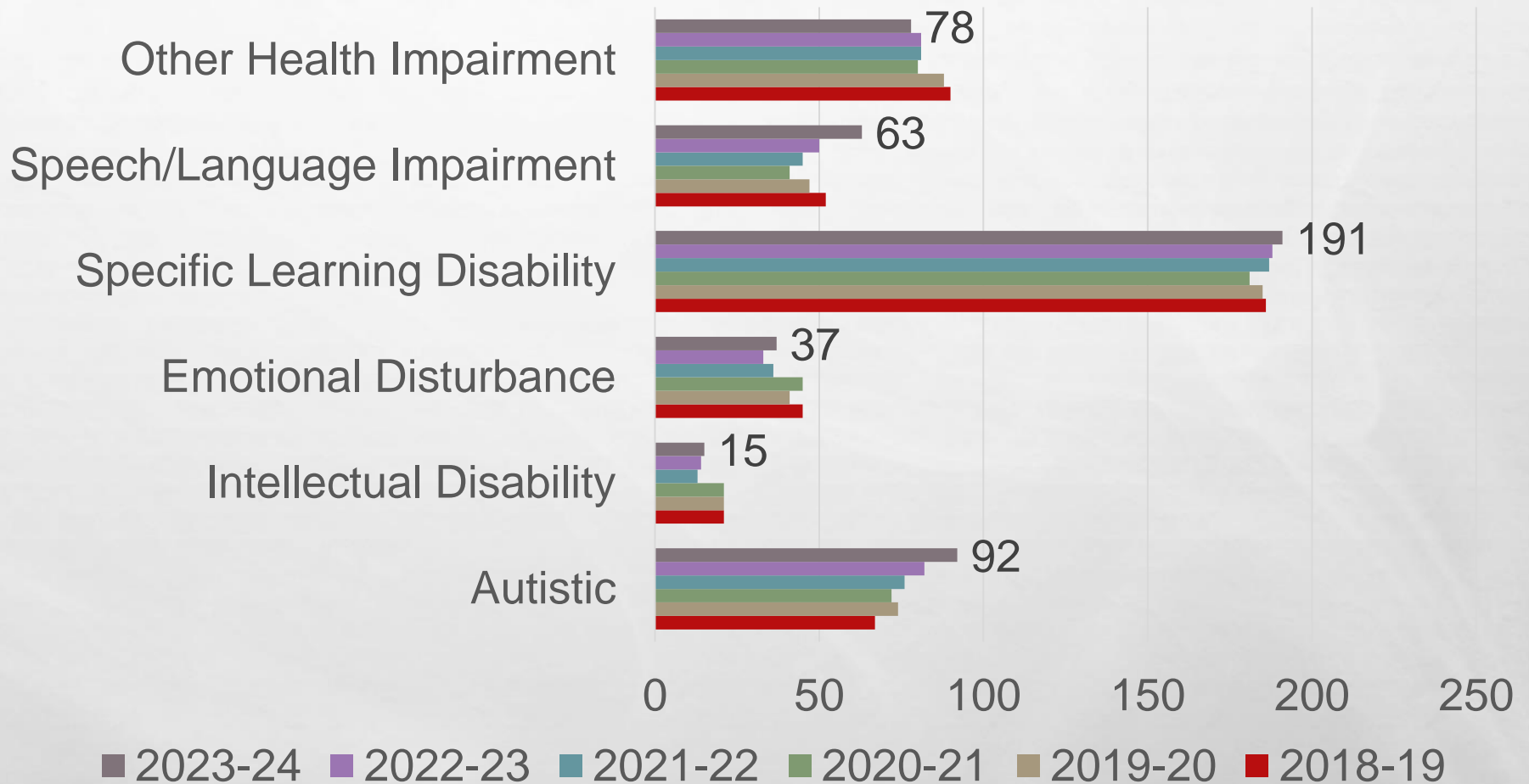

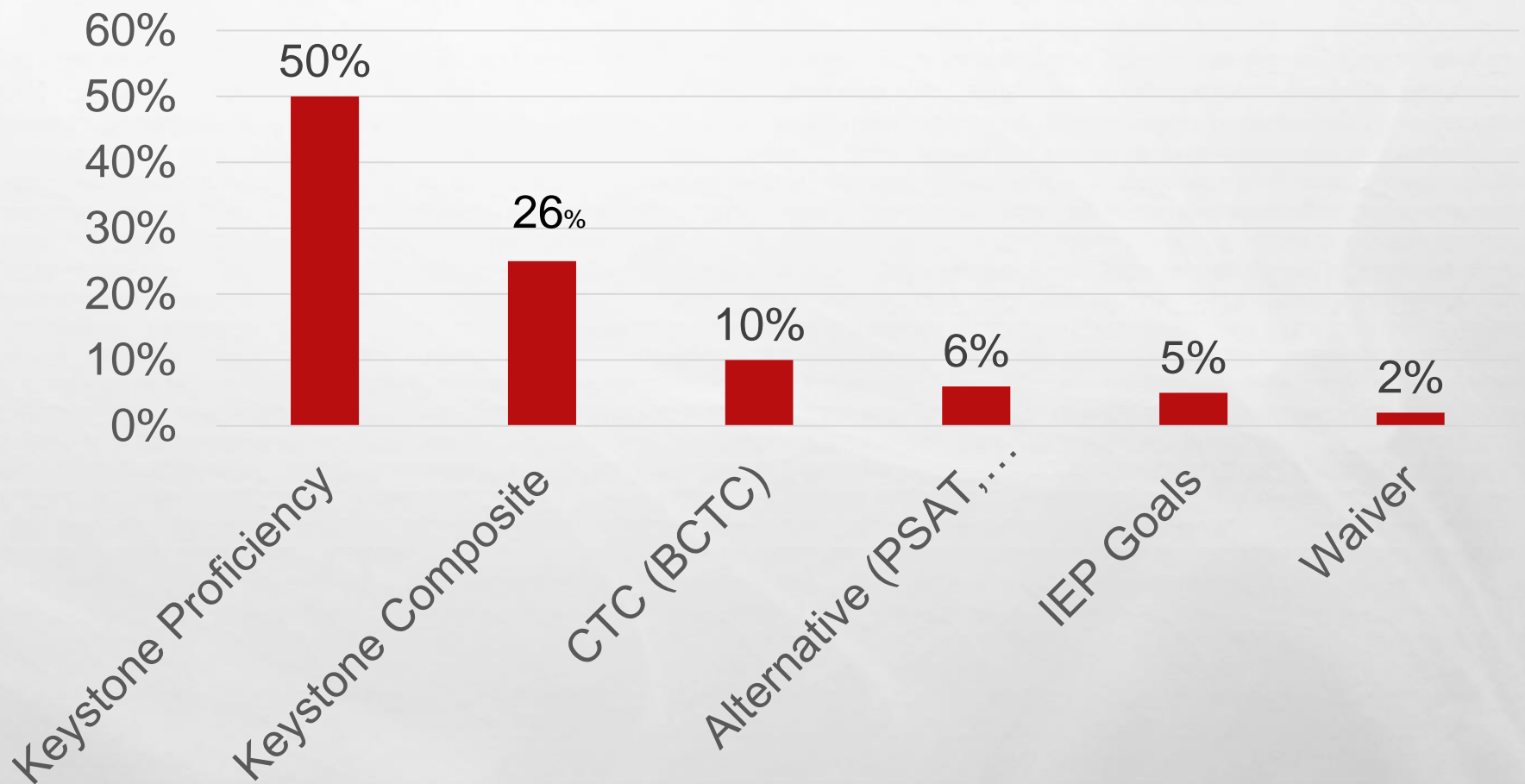

4-Year Cohort Graduation Rate



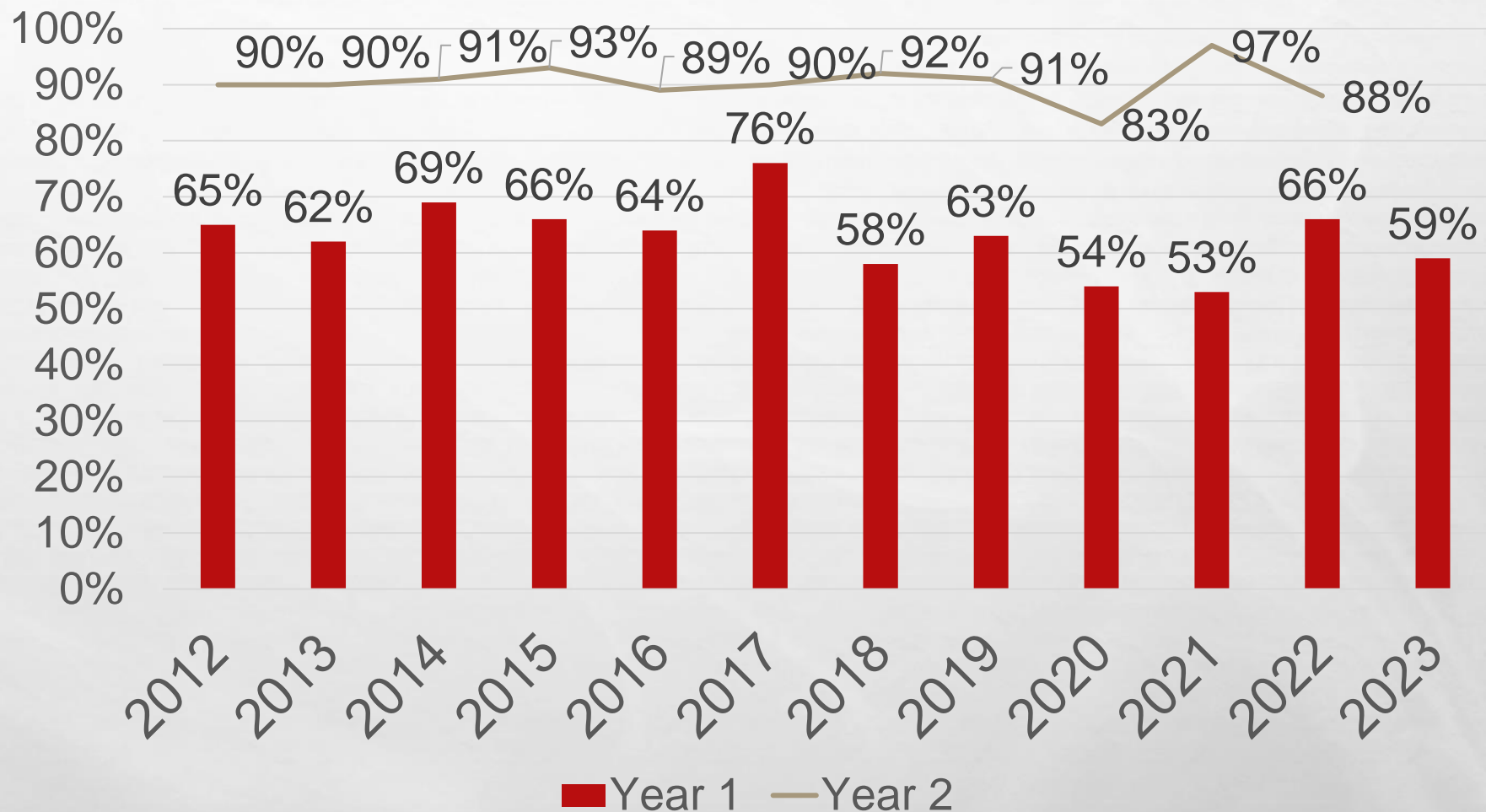

How did our students meet the state graduation requirement?



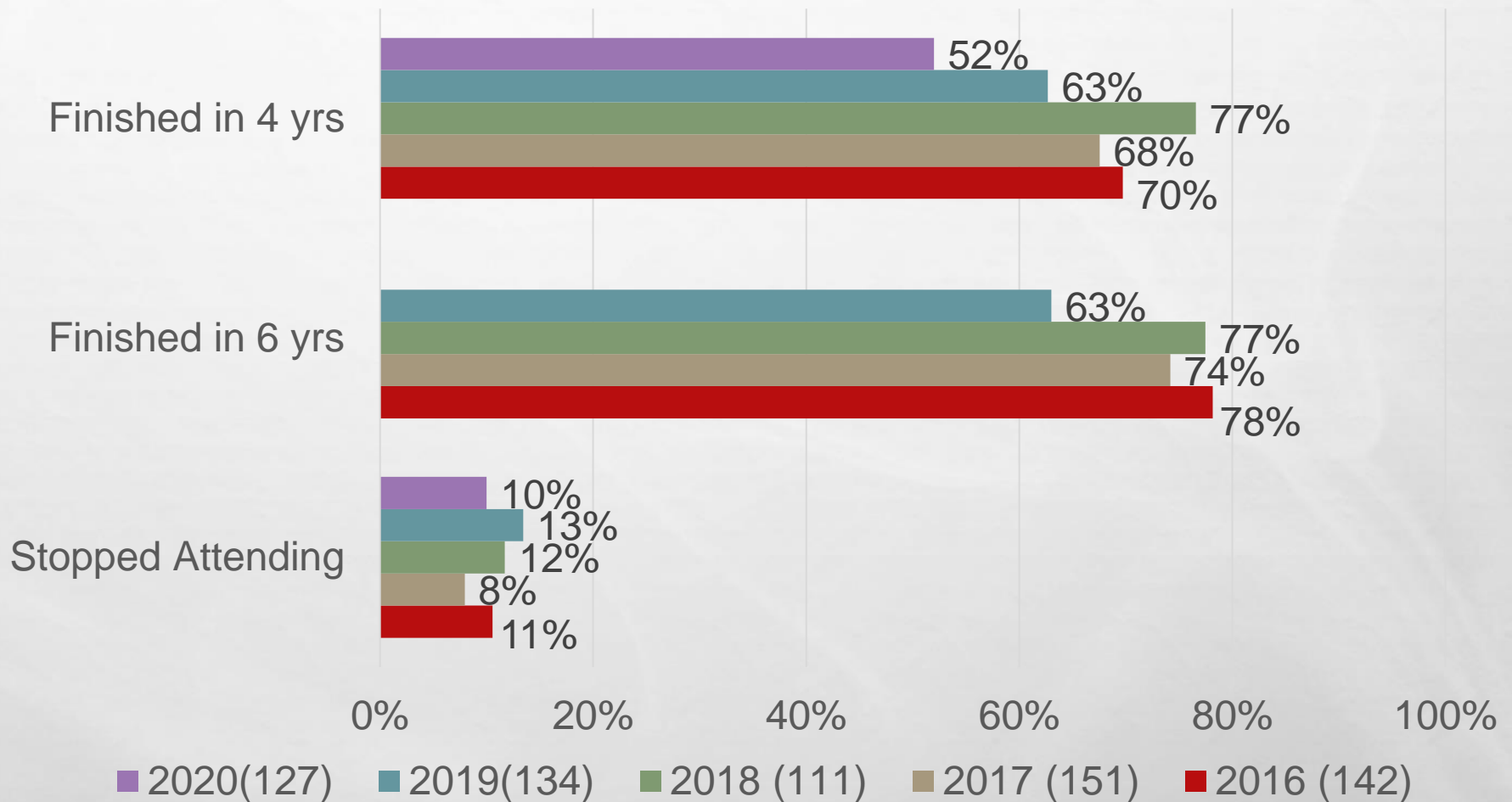
76% met the graduation requirement through Keystone Exams.

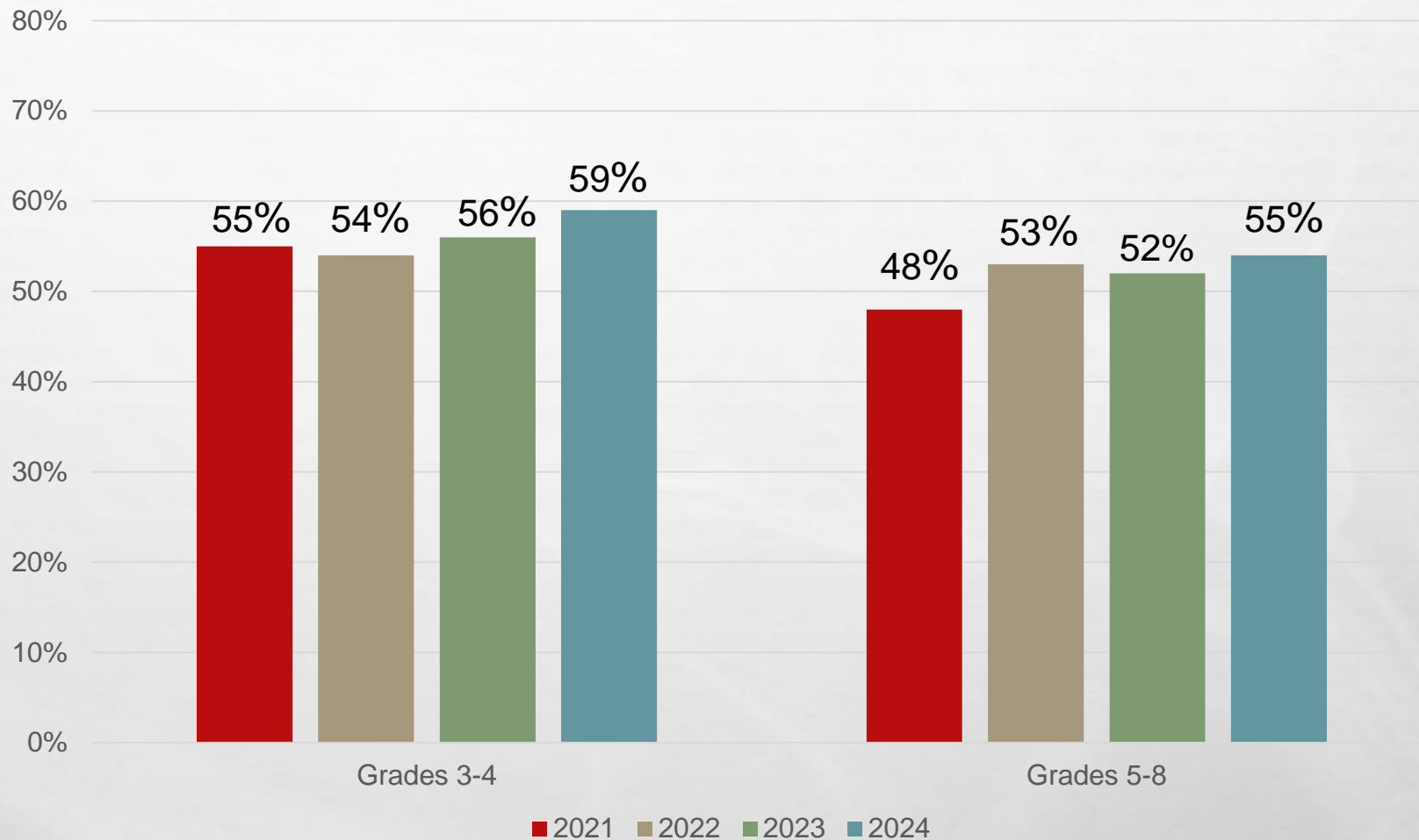

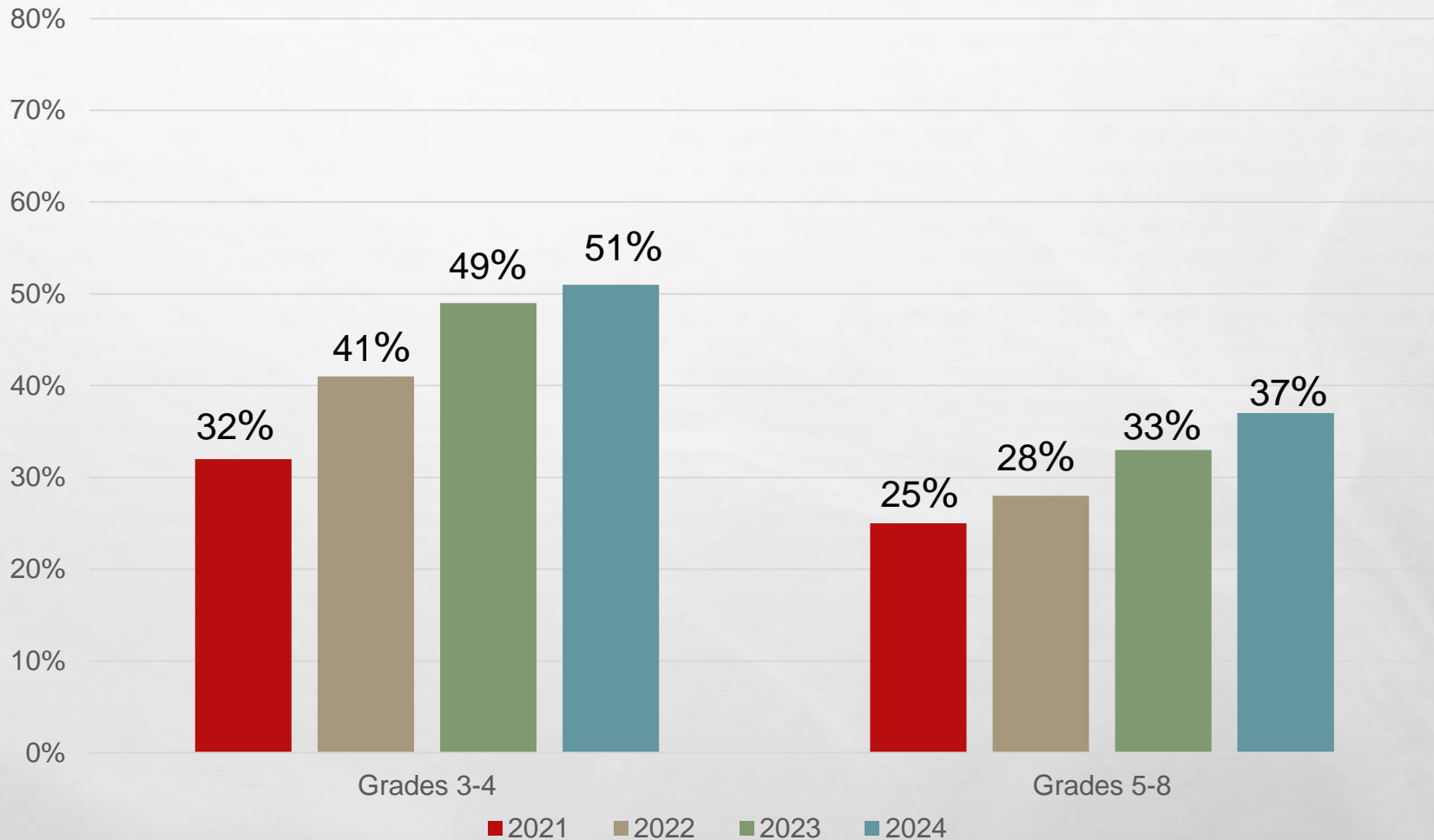

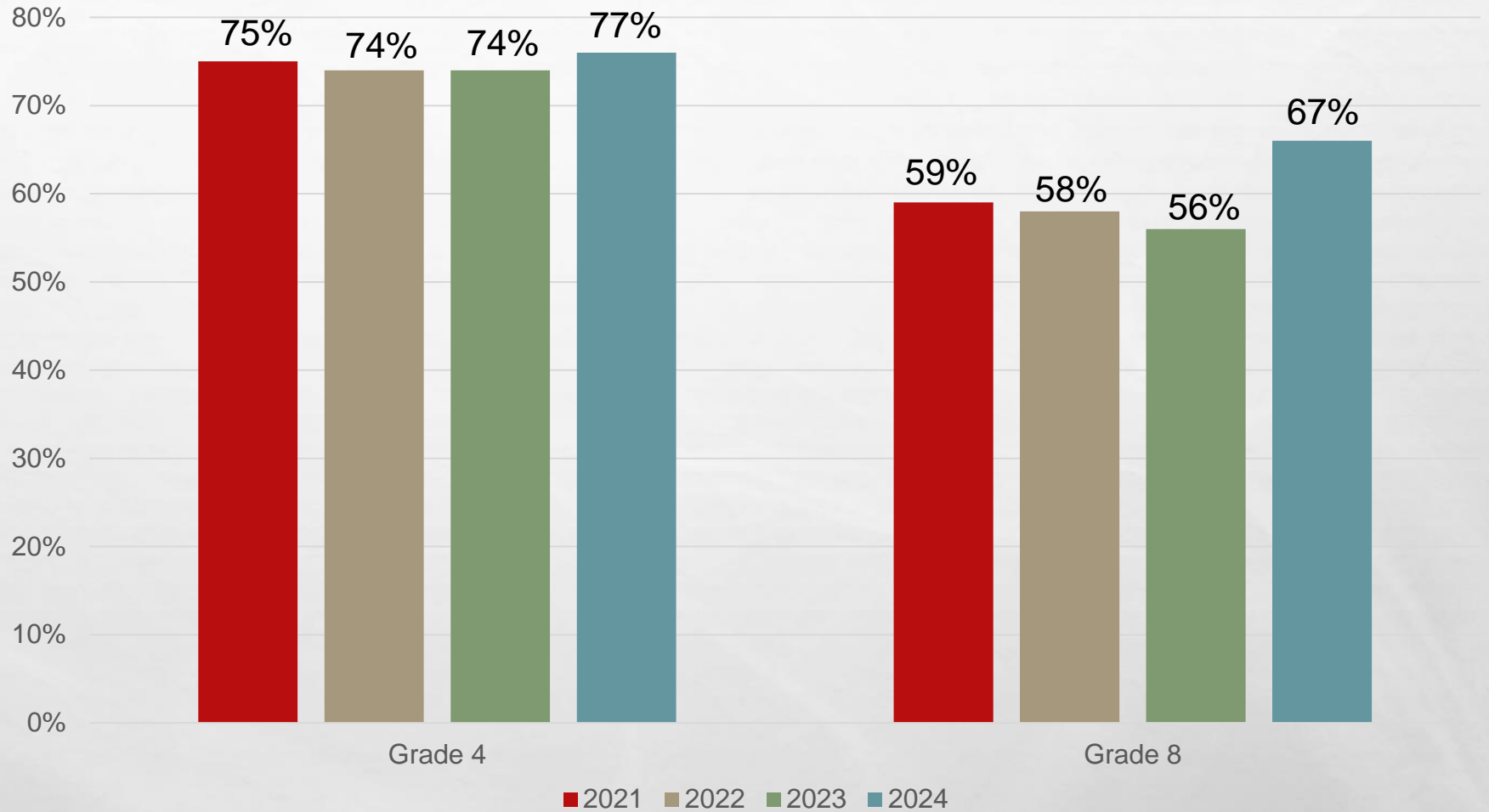
ELA PSSA Longitudinal Data



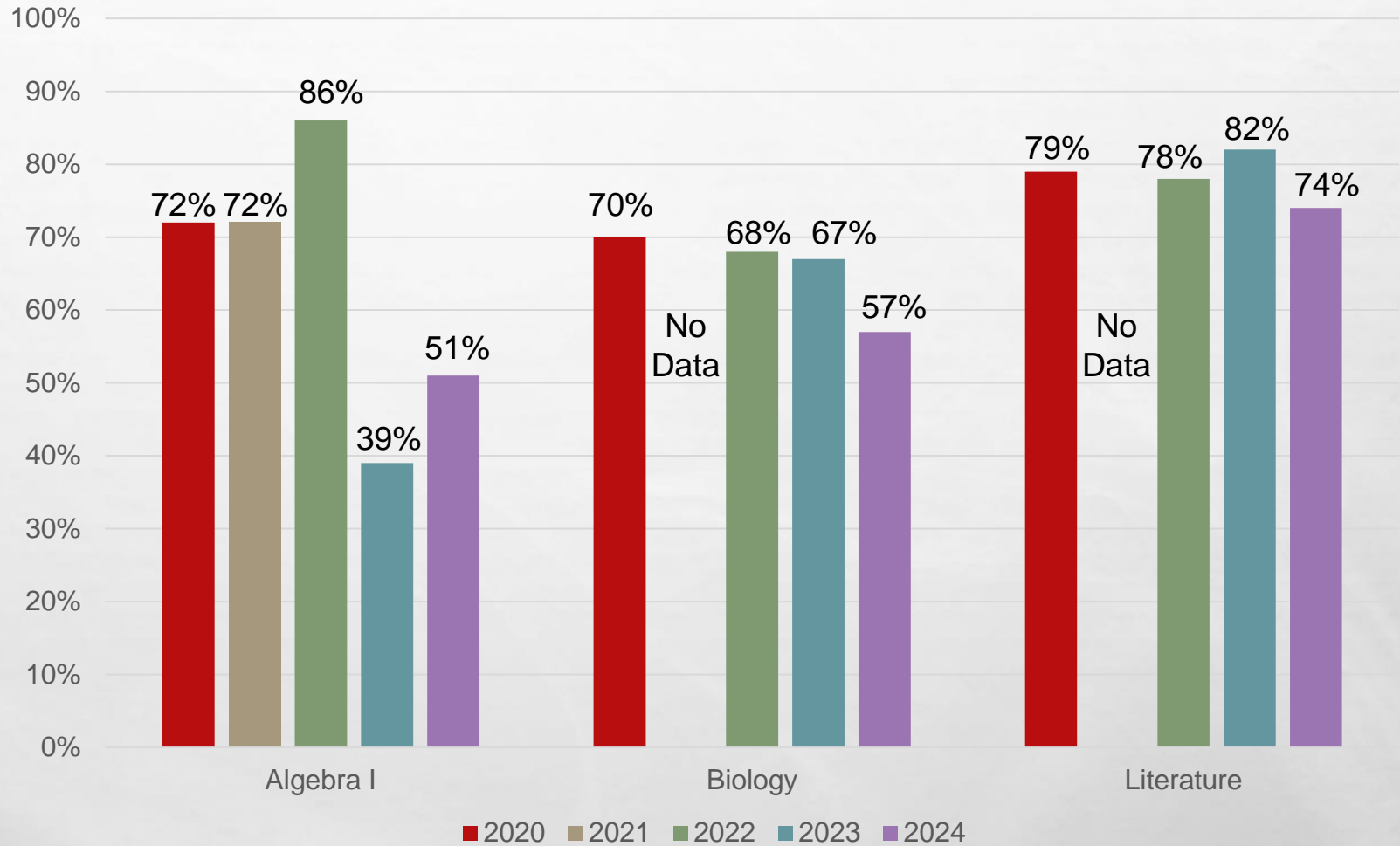
Math PSSA Longitudinal Data



Science PSSA Longitudinal Data

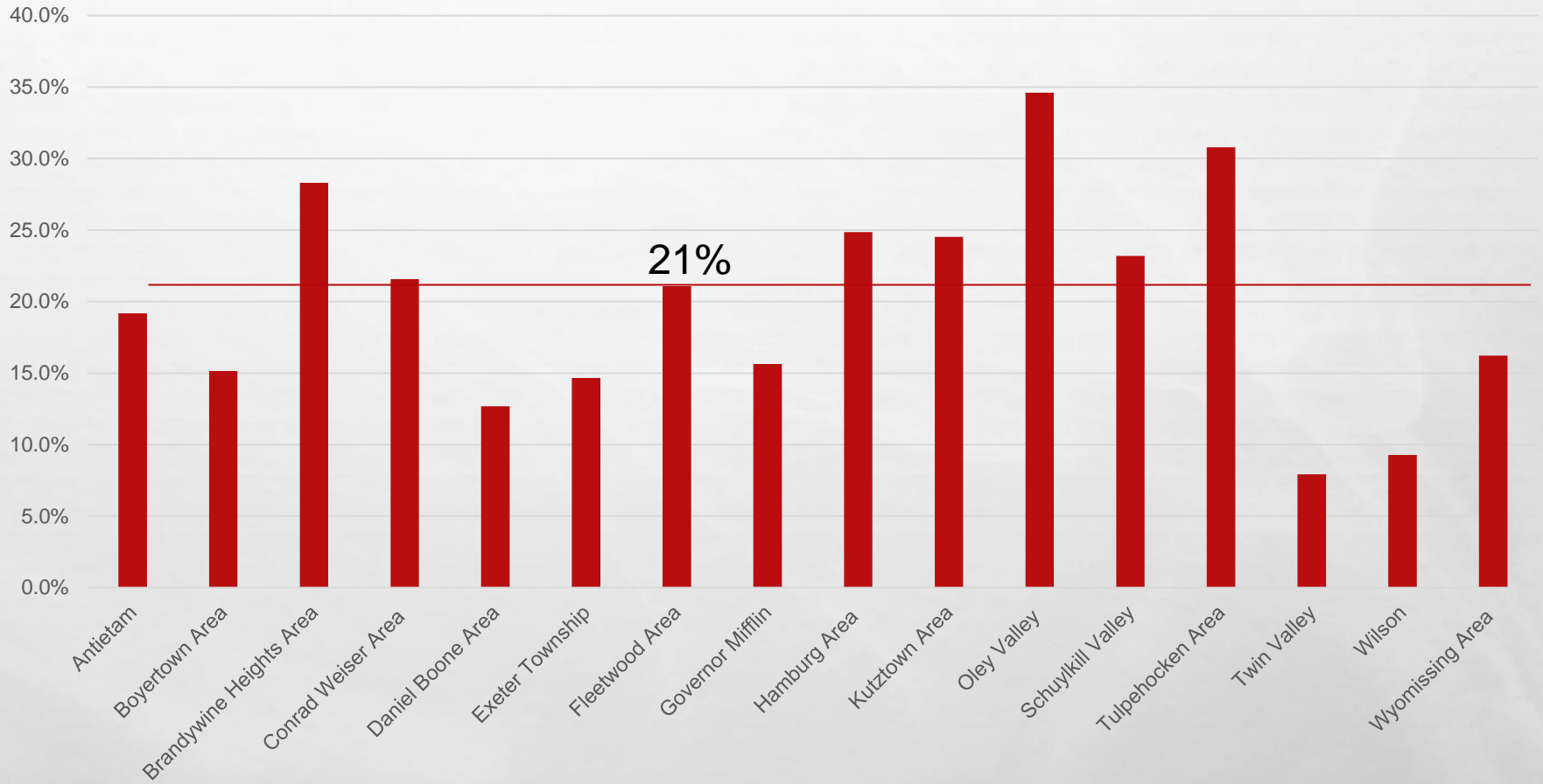

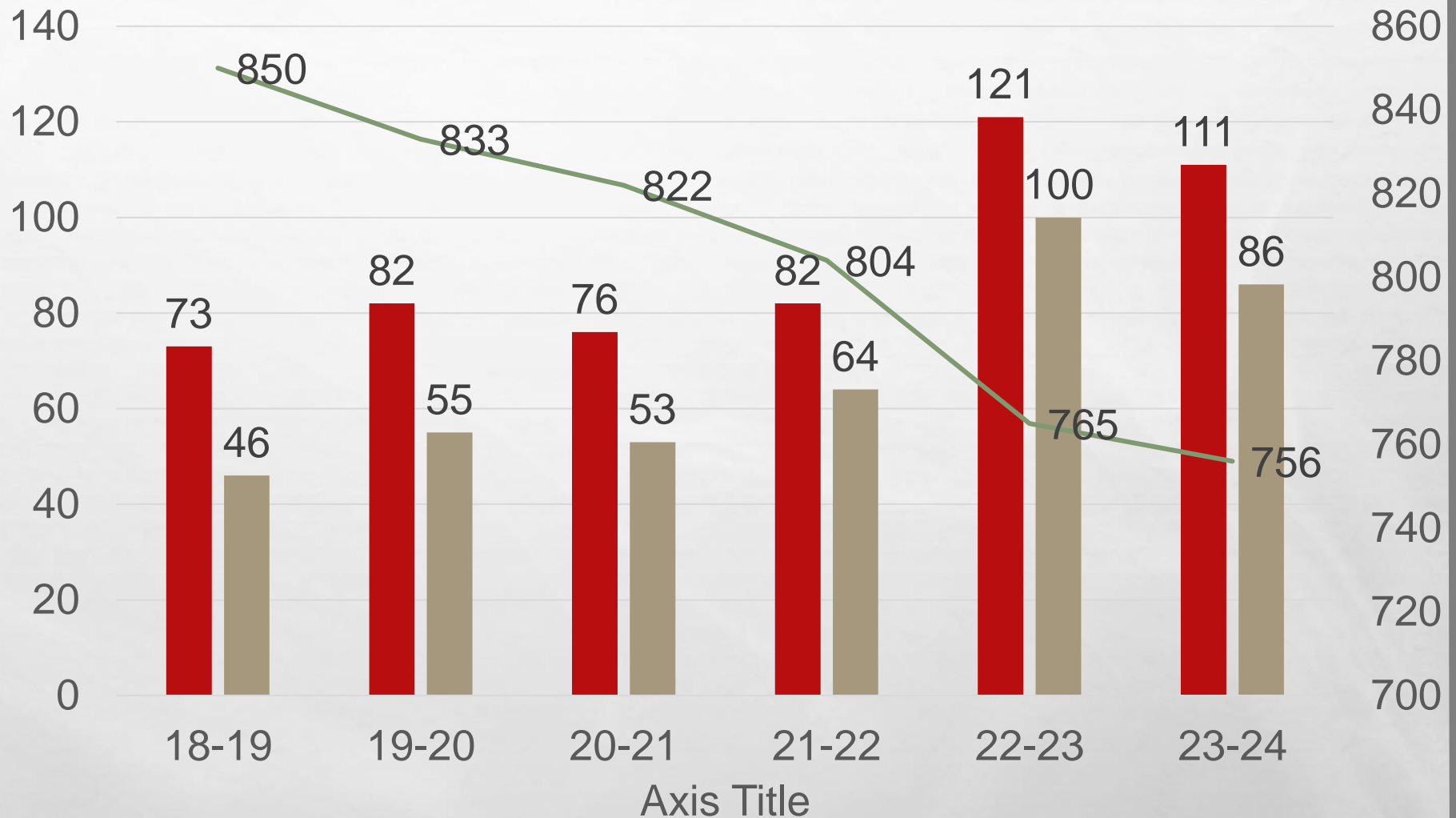

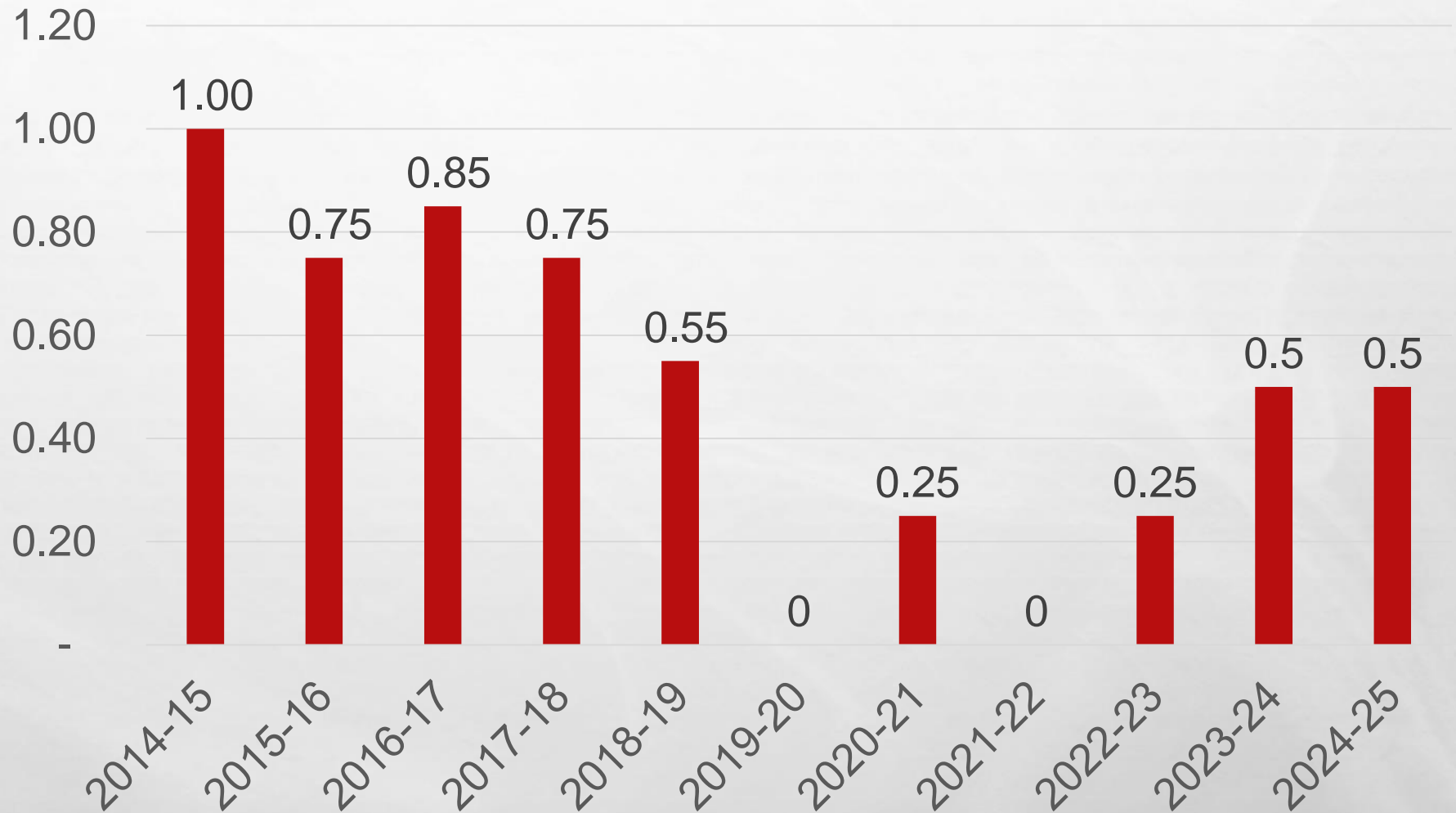

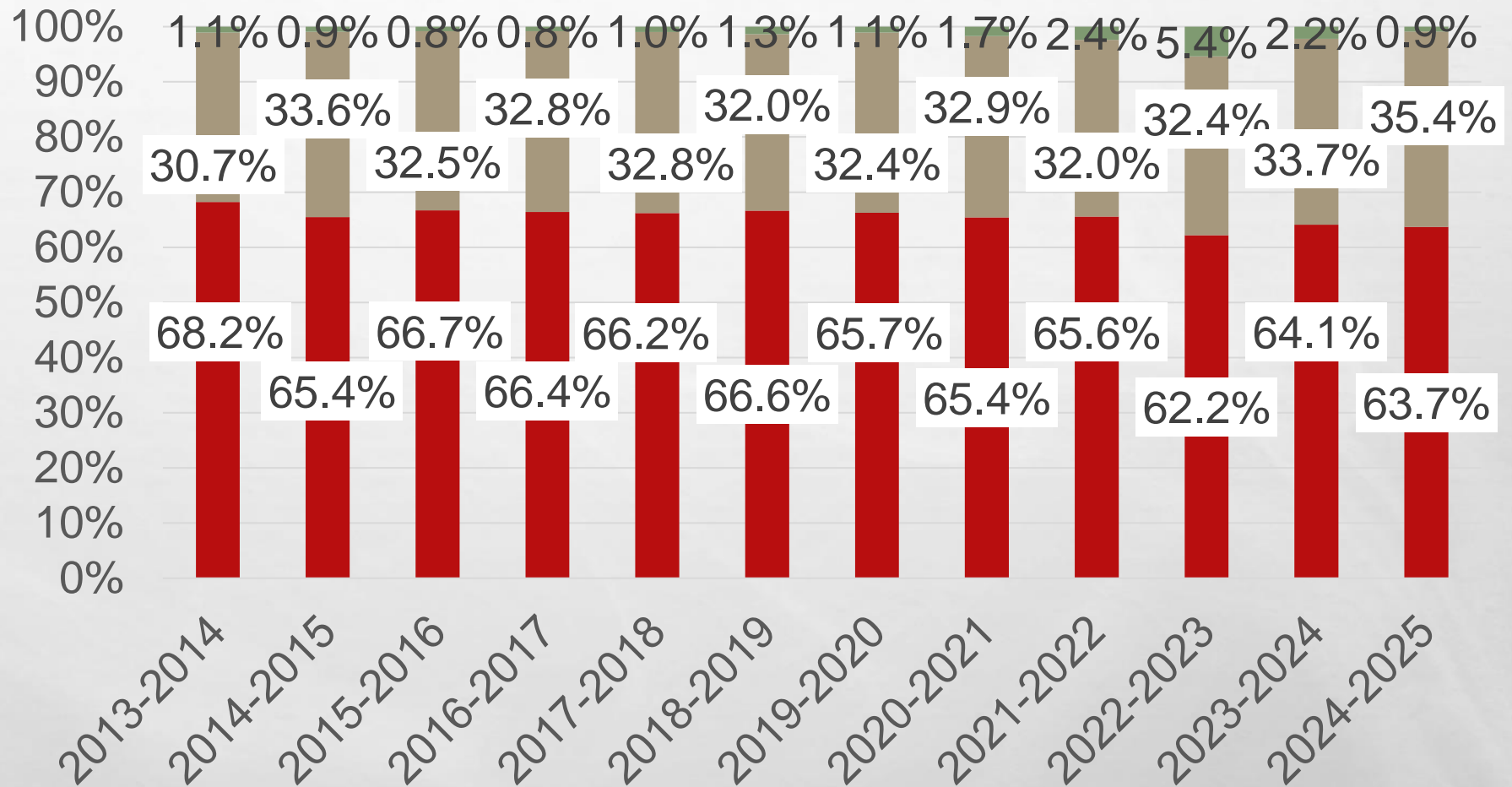
Millage Rate



Millage Increase

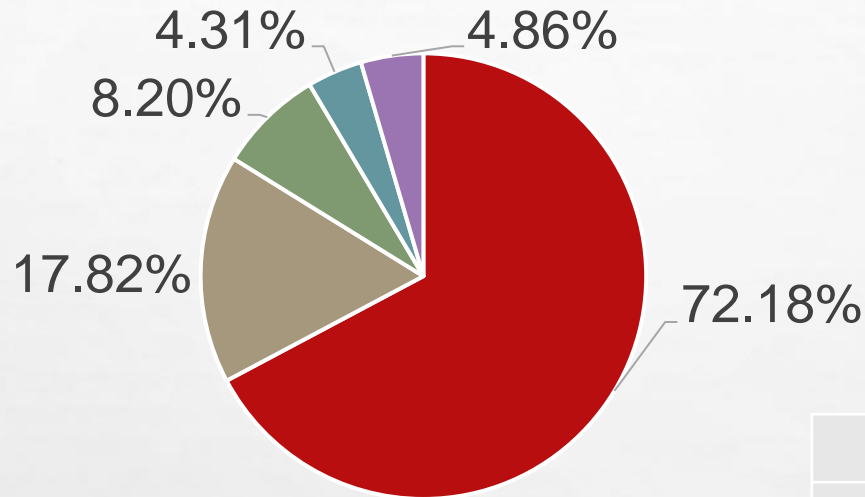


Revenue Breakdown

Student Growth and Achievement:

- Ensure there is a process to address identified student academic gaps.
 - Monitor the implementation of small group instruction and intervention plans (including WIN time) at the elementary level.
 - Support the successful implementation of MTSS process and intervention plans at the elementary, middle, and high schools. (review progress monitoring data and student growth). Structure and attend MTSS/Data Meetings to provide support.
 - Continue to support the implementation (Year 2) of the Reveal Math program in grades K-8.
 - Support the continued implementation of high-quality intervention resources.
 - Support the implementation and use of iReady (K-9)
 - Support building administration in the achievement of their state assessment goals (PSSA and Keystone).
- Further develop high school opportunities for all students such as dual enrollment, internships, and college courses.

District Goals

Staff Development and Training:

- Develop a K-12 Professional Development Calendar for the 2024-25 school year.
 - Inclusive of:
 - Inclusion and instructional strategies.
 - Small group instruction, co-teaching, flexible grouping.
 - Identifying and implementing effective instructional strategies in the classroom.
- Support teachers participating in the Alvernia TExpL Cohort
- Schedule training for teachers, counselors, and psychologists for the new Gifted Screener.
- Support the implementation of PLCs at the high school.

District Goals

Organizational Leadership:

- Continue to work closely with surrounding district superintendents to help us grow as a district.
- Develop partnership within the community to support Fleetwood Area School District Initiatives.
 - Begin to establish the Fleetwood Business Education Coalition
 - Re-Establish the Fleetwood Education Foundation
- Monitor and support the growth of the FASD Virtual school program.
- Continue to develop our District Instructional Leadership Team.
 - Develop a Differentiated Supervision Plan
 - Create consistency and cohesion in our parent/community communications and engagement
- Facilitate the development and finalization of the Counseling Plan (Chapter 339 Plan).

District Goals

District Operations and Financial Management:

- Demonstrate fiscal responsibility through thoughtful and consistent oversight of budget development, inclusive of a three-year budget forecast that allows for the replenishment of the unassigned fund balance.
- Complete quarterly reviews of budgetary areas of concern such as transportation, charter schools, and special education to guard against any potential budgetary shortfalls.
- Seek additional grant opportunities that will help to enhance/support our current educational programs or expand programs through additional funding.
- Continue review of the capital improvements plan to address areas of concern raised in the FASD feasibility study.
- Assess and refine the growth plan for the capital reserve funds for upcoming capital projects and further enhance the district's financial stability.
- Negotiate an employment contract with FEA and Act 93 that will provide competitive wages and benefits and enhance the district's ability to retain and attract new staff.

Strengthen Communications and Community Relations:

- Provide the necessary communications with the community to help with transparency and to keep everyone informed.
- Create and share an annual report to highlight the strengths and areas of need for the district.
- Engage stakeholders in the implementation of our District Comprehensive Plan.
 - Involvement in improving Family/Community Communication and Engagement
- Support the implementation of social media channels at all buildings, and the district level.
- Assist in designing a recent graduate survey and feedback mechanism.
- Develop and share a district newsletter to be circulated throughout the community.

Human Resources Management:

- Increase awareness and usage of Employee Assistance Programs (EAP) and other available benefits to support staff's mental, emotional, and physical well-being, thereby reducing stress and improving retention.
- Continue to improve communication effectiveness by fostering transparency and enhancing information sharing across all levels of the organization to ensure staff are well-informed and engaged.
- Regularly reach out to staff to gather feedback, address concerns, and foster open communication to build connections and improve overall involvement.
- Keep growing and improving our recruiting by finding new ways to reach potential candidates, spreading the word about our job openings, and making our organization a great place to work so we attract top talent.
- Continuously analyze exit survey data to identify patterns, understand reasons for turnover, and explore practical improvements that enhance employee satisfaction and retention.
