Math

Science

ELA

Students have continued practicing their main idea identification skills. They worked together to sort sentences on a variety of topics into main idea and supporting detail sentences. We also began to read short paragraphs and discuss the main idea.

Global Studies

We continued our work from last week. We read *Ferdinand the Bull* and compared Ferdinand to our general idea about bulls. We used this alongside with our brainstorm about princesses to discuss stereotypes, which we're defining as a statement or belief that groups people together as all being the same way (may be true about some individuals in the group, but not the group as a whole). This work is preparing us to be thoughtful and accurate researchers as we begin to study Vermont's history.
