7.A.2. Governing Board Members

Andy Fraher noted, the only thing I have is I was able to attend basically, the presentation that Kelsey just gave for Abia Judd and for Mile High. I think it's really good that we did that immediately after those grades were released and gave a chance for parents to have some input on all the action items that are going on, specifically for their schools. I also appreciated all the work that was put in and again, I appreciate all the parents who showed up to those sessions.

Jane Robertson noted, I went to that meeting as well and I think I learn more each time I hear the presentation which is awesome. The only other thing I have to contribute is, working with the district we run the Teacher's Closet. The community has been so generous with their donations that we used to only supply the really needed items in the classroom and we're expanding. We're now able to offer teachers supplies that might not be considered core supplies, but items they need for their classroom. They're not paying for them anymore and that's pretty exciting to me. It might be art supplies, it might be math manipulatives, things they don't have in the classroom that they would once again be using their own funds for. We're able to give them more and more it's a unique job to be able to give teachers things that they need and don't have to pay for. It kind of coincides with being on this board too.

Linda Conn noted, I wanted to ask you, we used to have a Science Resource Center so that every classroom could come in and have like a lending library for microscopes or things you don't use all the time. Do you have space for that kind of thing to have a resource center?

Kelsey Secor noted, a couple years ago we realized that we had science materials in lots of different pockets in our schools so it was a big initiative for all of our instructional coaches. They collected everything that wasn't currently being used and inventoried it. We have a science center at the high school, it is an extra classroom with science supplies in it. When we adopted new science curriculum, teachers went through that and started taking things that they needed but they also know about all the things that are in there. Teachers got really intentional when we adopted new science curriculum they went through and said what are all of the materials that I know I'm going to need. They got rid of things that they knew they didn't need or that a different grade level needed and they kept the things that aligned to the lessons within their curriculum. We've done a lot of work on that.

Jane Robertson noted, I get requests sometimes for consumables that teachers need in their science curriculum, and we do that, but I didn't know that was at the high school.

Kelsey Secor noted, yes. If you want to talk to Diane Ryan the supplies are in the room right next to her classroom. She helps us organize it. She's our science guru. And then we do have a small budget for schools for those consumable pieces for science because we know that some of them need to be replenished every year.

Linda Conn noted, okay then that kind of parlays into a teacher Resource Center. Take elementary schools for example to go and make manipulatives using a die cut machine. That may be something that Prescott might be interested in doing.

Kelsey Secor noted, they do we have die cuts at every elementary school and I think Granite and Mile High have them as well so those pieces are there. There are cutouts for manipulatives and other things too.

Stan Goligoski noted, this last month we had the NHS induction ceremony and Karlee did an amazing job as president. The most impressive thing is the parents that were involved there too. I got to meet Karlee's parents, parents from around the community and really sharp kids. They don't lose sight of the sense of service. Academics is just a portion of one of the pillars and that was something I learned. One thing that I brought up was about being in the arena. We talked about Theodore Roosevelt's The Man in the Arena and encouraged them to speak. Those are our future leaders. It was an amazing ceremony and so wonderful to see everybody there.

We had the Halloween parade we also had the first grade Veterans Day performance at Lincoln I know there's a lot of veteran's day activities and I am much appreciative. I received some feedback from a community member that had their grandfather come in. He couldn't stop weeping when his grandchild was speaking. He is a Navy vet.

Clark Tenney noted, it is amazing and none of that, just for context, shows up in these letter grades. There are awesome things going on at our schools and that system totally misses much of what makes our school's great.

Stan Goligoski noted, we're coming up on our 70th day of school so I know there's a lot of celebration for that. Our students will be dressing in 70s attire so it should be pretty fun.

I love watching the record of the flag football team in their first year. 12 and 0. All the state games are going to be played here in Prescott so it's a pretty phenomenal. I think everybody should get out there and cheer on our lady Badgers because they're doing an amazing job, and the boys football team won the region.

7.A.3. Governing Board Student Representatives

Karlee Molster noted, I have some of the sports ones as well. Girls' volleyball is 12 and 5, they're ranked 14th in our division and they play their first state game tomorrow. I know a lot of great volleyball players and they're really excited. Swim has their State meets this weekend as well and mountain biking just finished third in state and four of the athletes placed top four in state. The boys Golf team qualified for state and they won their section. Girls golf also won their section. Additionally, we had Special Olympics week at the high

school there were a lot of events this week. We raised about \$3,000. and those different funds go towards things like transportation and jerseys. We got to play Bocce ball on the field. One of our events was the Special Olympics dance on Saturday which was my first silent disco. Everyone wears headphones. We had people of all ages. Five people from YEI who were in their eighties and people with all different disabilities and I think if it showed me anything or my student council it would be just how inclusion really does make a difference in our lives and it's really easy to say but it's really hard to do. I do hope that is an active goal, that every student encourages throughout the rest of the year. Trunk or treat also took place this past week which obviously encourages all the students. We had great turnout and the Football game was after that and we did win. Upcoming is teacher appreciation week. Student council wanted to do it in light of Thanksgiving because we are really grateful for our teachers.

Vanessa Ibarra noted, in other sports events the badminton team finished their season last week in the state semifinals they finished 15 and 2 and were third in state. Cross Country also finished their season on Saturday and both teams have qualified for state championships the girls finished 16 out of 22 teams and the boys finished 17 out of 31 Teams. As Mr. Goligoski stated, the lady flag football team finished their regular season yesterday, they are undefeated 12 and 0. They are number one in the 4A and their first-round game is on the 13th of this month here in Prescott. The quarterfinals are on the 16th here in Prescott as well. Semifinals on the 20th and state championships on the 23rd. The football team also finished their regular season on Friday night and they are 8 and 1 right now and are ranked number seven in the 4A Grand Canyon Region winning over Coconino 35 to 28.

Dignity Health and Yavapai College are doing their career exploration day on the 6th of December. PHS is adding a Dental Assistant program which I am super excited about. I have family members, relatives at PHS that are currently really interested in Dental Assisting so I'm grateful for them and I know they are really grateful for this amazing opportunity.

last year, I also attended this explorational day which is how I was able to join my college classes.

Abia Judd is having their Glow Run fundraiser tomorrow which I know my brother is participating in which is really exciting.

Stan Goligoski noted, I think I speak for everyone here when I say that as a community, we are really grateful for these amazing opportunities and these successful badgers.

Stan Goligoski noted, do we have any community comments to share?

Linda Conn noted, I had a request from a community member who wanted to know about all the Billboards and everything maybe even these rack cards but the banners and why we're spending taxpayer money on those things, and then taking down the letter grade and putting new skin on you know with he called it celebrity mug shots or something I don't remember exactly, but he wanted to know why.

Clark Tenney noted, would you like me to address that with everybody here now? First of all, no taxpayer dollars were used for that. We've been using Civic rental funds. When we rent out a building somebody pays for that. That money goes into a fund and that's what we use to build the Billboards. The idea of the Billboards and the banners and rack cards and everything is to give people information about our district so particularly when people move into town but if they're moving from a charter school to say 9th grade where their Charter School caps out at 8th grade or if they're looking at different educational options.

Arizona is an open enrollment State as you know if they choose PUSD that brings substantial funding to us that helps us increase programs and smaller class sizes and, increases funding for staff as well. If we have a billboard and one family with three kids sees it that brings in \$21,000 the next year and the next year and the next year. If we were using taxpayer dollars for that which again, we are not, it would pay for itself quite readily. If a single family sees that and it becomes part of their decision to come to us, it is money very well spent.

Like all organizations we advertise the good things that we're doing to assist our organization in the long run and the Billboards as you have noted are made to be changed out about every year. Last year we had the single letter A that everybody got excited about and we mentioned at the time it's kind of a confusing funky system, but as long as people are fixated on a we'll put an A there for a while. This year we're a B, which again is highly performing, but we didn't want to continue to advertise an A on bulletin boards. It had been a year so we said how else can we continue to focus on the results that we produce from our schools.

For instance, the four on the current billboards are, the most recent Chief Court Justice of the Arizona Supreme Court, our local police chief another PHS graduate, the Attorney General of Arizona, PHS graduate and a recent Instructor at West Point who's a distinguished veteran of the military who happens to be the president of our governing board. They were the four folks that we chose to be representative of what PUSD students go on to do.

It is really good marketing in the community in terms of building goodwill.
