





# PARENT PERSPECTIVE ON THE ARTS


### Sommer Mendoza

Events such as the FUSD Marching Band Showcase and partnerships with organizations like the Cheech Marin Museum and the California Theater of the Performing Arts have created opportunities for students to showcase their talents and connect with local artists.

The younger students thrived under the guidance of their high school mentors, fostering a sense of connection and inspiration for the future. Wendi Johnson, Director of theatre at Henry J. Kaiser High shared, "Multi age collaboration in the arts, especially theater arts, build students' creativity, collaboration, communication, and critical thinking abilities. 
















# FUSD Marching Band Showcase Brings Music and Unity to the Field






**Amy Griffin**, a senior who portrayed Mary Bailey, emphasized the emotional core of her character:

## **Elementary Instrumental Music Program**

Instrumental Music provides a once-a-week pull-out program for grades 5 (beginning band/strings) and grades 6 (advanced band/strings), preparing students for middle school music ensembles such as band and orchestra. The classes are 40 minutes each and may be broken down into woodwinds, brass, strings or other small ensemble groups as time allows at each site. The district loans various instruments, including trumpets, trombones, baritones, clarinets, alto saxophones, flutes, violins, and cellos, enabling students to practice throughout the year. The curriculum, **Essential Elements** (string)/ **Measures of Success** (band), guides students through musical fundamentals. The 5<sup>th</sup> grade program concludes with a performance at Fontana HS at the end of the school year, with specific goals outlined for each semester, covering aspects like instrument assembly, posture, tone production, and repertoire performance. The 6<sup>th</sup> grade advanced band/strings students will also have the opportunity to participate in a district wide honor band/strings program.
