With the seniors' last day of classes on May 22nd and their graduation on June 2nd, juniors are now faced with anxious thoughts about classes, extracurriculars, college, and maybe most importantly, how to pay for college. Well, seniors Annie Bacani, Joseph Castaño-Medina, Fabio Colindres, Romulus Czernisz, and others worked hard throughout their high school careers, and it is greatly reflected in their acceptance into college through the Posse Foundation, Questbridge, and Macaulay Honors College. These organizations have allowed for them to attend all four years of undergrad for free. In being role models, Annie, Joe, Fabio, Rom, and the other scholarship recipients have words of advice and encouragement for upcoming seniors and any underclassmen hoping to plan their college journey early.

The Posse Foundation says that it "identifies, recruits, and trains individuals with extraordinary leadership potential," and Molloy seniors Annie and Fabio were identified as individuals with extraordinary leadership potential. Because of this, they will be leaving Molloy in June and going to Brandeis University and the University of Wisconsin-Madison in August when their first semester of college starts. In order to help upcoming seniors, Annie and Fabio shared their high school and application experiences. Both Annie and Fabio had excellent extracurricular activities and experiences that made them stand out in their application. Annie believes that her "involvement in both extracurricular activities inside and outside of Molloy truly helped [her] stand apart from the crowd."

However, she believes that the way she was able to "express the substantial leadership roles [she embodies] in each one" and her Personal Statement "conveyed more about [her] experiences and character," making her stand out by "offering a unique perspective" of everything that was portrayed in her application. Joe, on the other hand, applied to Questbridge. This was especially helpful towards his application since he felt as if the Questbridge application gave him enough space to truly showcase his personality. As for Rom - who applied to the Macaulay Honors College at CUNY - he felt as if his "overall well-roundedness made [him] stand out" as well as his many hours of

As for deciding which one of these programs to apply to, each of these seniors have shared what attracted them to what they applied for. Both Annie and Fabio found that they really liked the Posse Scholarship's comprehensive support system. This system provides a network encompassing pre-collegiate training, workshops, and other immersive experiences. Annie finds that the assistance that Posse offers through this system before arriving on campus is "unlike any other in terms of ensuring student success." Fabio also appreciates the connections that the Posse Foundation

offers because of how he was able to connect with other people from New York and get to know them before he goes off to college. Rom, who applied to Macaulay Honors, a highly selective college program where New York's most promising students receive the financial and academic support to realize their leadership potential, loved how they also offer internships and study abroad opportunities, as well as close guided mentorship along with a full tuition scholarship. In addition, while Joe did appreciate the amount of space he was given to truly showcase his personality, he didn't appreciate the fact that Questbridge only allowed him to list five extracurriculars, which forced him to think about what he really wanted to mention in order to show what was truly valuable to him.

However, even if these seniors inspire you in any aspect or if you look up to them as a role model for many academic or non-academic reasons, it's important to remember that you should be doing your own research and individual work when looking for scholarships or colleges to apply for. 

Her passion for learning and growth extends into her future aspirations, as she


