MESSAGE FROM -ADMINISTRATION

Dear BUUSD Community,

As winter weather approaches, it is time again to prepare for school cancellation and delay decisions. The school calendar is set up to accommodate snow days and the following update provides an outline of the process we follow for making school cancellation/delay decisions for weather events:

- 1. Prior to a "weather event" and early in the morning of an event, we gather information from a variety of sources.
- 2. Our goal is to have a decision made by 5:30am.
- 3. Once a decision is made to delay or close, we communicate in the following ways:
- We'll send out a notification through our communication system, REMIND.* These
 messages will be sent either as an email, a text message, or an app notification –
 whatever you have set up.
- We post on Facebook, web pages, and phone greetings.
- We contact the media, police, road crews, as well as food and transportation companies.

The decision to delay or cancel is extremely important for everyone's safety. We take it very seriously. There is no guarantee that we can make the correct decision every time, but we do our absolute best. 


