### Welcome

Meeting called to order at 6:31.

Special Presentation: DARE Officer Kristen Mazur, Orchard Park Police Department
Officer Mazur thanked the PTO for their generous support. She is going to all elementary PTO's to introduce herself, the program, and answer any questions. She has been in the OP Police Department for over 6 years and has spent over 4 years teaching DARE. In 2006, NYS stopped funding DARE. The Orchard Park community including schools, town, police, teachers, and businesses has been very generous in allowing the program to continue. DARE education includes drugs and alcohol and also includes stress, bullying, internet safety, summer safety, social media. She is able to tailor the program to meet the needs of specific schools in OP. The fifth graders have a 15 week program and graduation will be on January 18. She also builds relationships with children in other grades. High school kids come in and give out information. A current problem in OP schools is e-cigs, specifically the brand Juul. Officer Mazur uses her time to educate kids and parents about how to keep safe and ways of saying no. Any questions, Mr. Pietrantone or Caren Chaffee can pass on her email address.

### 1. Book Fair

### 2. Follow up from last meeting

- There were some suggestions to start a collection to pass on to kids and/or families who
  may need some additional financial support to participate in events
- Similar questions/ situations have come up at other schools in the district, so there has been a great deal of discussion at Central Council PTO about this over the past few months
- We have been instructed by Central Council (our body of oversight) that giving PTO funds to individual members is in violation of our charter and puts our 501c3 (non-profit) status at risk

 There has been some discussion about other ways the needs of students and families in need can be met. These discussions are ongoing and will involved teachers and administrators as well as PTOs.

#### 3. 2019-2020 Slate

- We are starting the nominations process, which typically takes several months
- Last year, we put together brief descriptions of each position to help members make informed decisions about what interests them. These have been sent to the current chairs for their review and to make any changes they think are necessary
- We are required to cycled out of positions after two years. (The exception to this is Science Night, as this is a huge event. These chairs stay on for three years.)

- Next step: Current chairs entering their second year in 2019-2020 will be contacted to confirm whether or not they want to continue in their position for the second year
- Once this is done, we will send the list of open positions out

# Teachers' Report Mrs. Hackford

**Kindergarten:** The children are very excited about the upcoming PTO movie night and our Ellicott school spirit day this Friday! Mr. Morton visits this week with a cute hedgehog. On January 30<sup>th</sup> our classes will enjoy a Winter Craft Day. Thank you to our volunteers that are coming in to help out! Our themes this month are winter animals, the season of winter, and Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

**First Grade** has jumped right back into school with and are beginning our Nonfiction units in Reading and Writing. These next months are huge in first grade. Along with learning how to best read nonfiction books the boys and girls will WRITE a nonfiction chapter book. The students will choose a wild animal, research it in computer class, library class, and in their classrooms. Then they will write chapters about the different things they learned about their wild animal. The students will also do many other projects and present them in an animal museum in their classrooms on the same night as science night. (We love science night! Thanks PTO!) I'm sure future updates will include our progress through these units. We will also be enjoying learning about nutrition through the Milk Magician that comes to us at the end of this month. (THANK YOU PTO!)

**2<sup>nd</sup> Grade** is so excited to have a visit from Explore & More on January 11th! The kids will get to "tinker" with various objects and create new structures! Thank you to the PTO for funding this fun experiencing for our students! :)

**3rd Grade:** The 3rd graders entered into the New Year by wrapping up our Non Fiction unit in Reader's Workshop. The next unit, Character Studies, will begin with a favorite story, Because of Winn Dixie. In Math, most of the 3rd graders are exploring measurement, rounding, place value, and word problems. In Social Studies, we will be exploring the United States

Government. Science is varied, depending on the classroom unit of study. The 3rd graders are anxious to embrace the winter weather, so please send in warm clothes for recess! Happy New Year!

**4<sup>th</sup> Grade:** Thank you PTO for your generous contribution to our Science Museum field trip. We had a blast learning about different kinds of weather and were able to make some neat connections to our nonfiction Reading Workshop unit on Extreme Weather. We're excited to begin our new unit on the American Revolution!

**5**<sup>th</sup> **Grade:** Prior to the break, the fifth graders were busy with concerts and our Reading Around the World event which included a reading invasion and Mystery Readers from the High School and our Administrative staff. In January, the kids will be getting ready for the Musical which is always so exciting! We are completing a unit in Reader's Workshop that pushes the kids to dig more deeply into fiction books with a focus on character and theme. We are starting a new science unit that asks the question of "How Can We Provide Freshwater to Those in Need?" In this unit, the kids will be building water pumps and filters to clean water. Our DARE Graduation will take place on January 18 and we thank the PTO for all of their assistance with this event!

### **December Computer Lab News:**

**Kindergarten:** We began a new program called <a href="www.ReadingEggs.com">www.ReadingEggs.com</a>. We took a short quiz before playing so we would be playing the reading/phonics games at our own level. Parent letters were sent home so students could access this (and many other sites) at home, at any time. We also used <a href="www.ABCya.com">www.ABCya.com</a> and <a href="www.santatracker.google.com">www.santatracker.google.com</a> to do some holiday activities.

**Grade 1:** Parent letters were sent home with information on how students could access many of our paid websites at home, at any time. We learned about Holidays in England, Mexico, France, Greece, Germany, and Israel. We created a "Holidays Around the World" booklet using Pixie4. We also used <a href="https://www.santatracker.google.com">www.santatracker.google.com</a> to do some holiday activities.

**Grade 2:** We began using a new math site called Prodigy. A parent letter went home explaining it. We used activities in Abcya.com to practice using 2 hands to type these sentences (left hand on the left, right hand on the right). We also used <a href="www.santatracker.google.com">www.santatracker.google.com</a> to do some holiday activities that mainly included computer coding: Code a snowflake and Code Lab. The student did very well with this.

**Grade 3**: We began a new program called ReadingEggspress. It is the older student version of ReadingEggs. We took a short quiz before playing so we would be playing the reading/comprehension/spelling games at our own level. Parent letters were sent home so students could access this (and many other sites) at home, at any time. We also used <a href="https://www.santatracker.google.com">www.santatracker.google.com</a> to do some holiday activities that mainly included computer coding: Code a snowflake, Code Lab, and Code Boogie. We wrote code to make an elf dance or move through a maze and created a snowflake with code.

**Grade 4:** We completed a Plant project using Google Slides. We completed slides by identifying the different parts of a seed, a plant, and a bee. We also wrote what they need or how they help. We then reviewed ReadingEggspress.com. Parent letters were sent home with information on how students could access many sites at home, at any time. We also used

**Grade 5:** We worked on a site called Everfi. It is an NHL sponsored site that shows how math and science skills are used in hockey. We wrote code to make an elf dance or move through a maze and created a snowflake with code.
