The students prepared for Pallotta's visit by reading his books, creating a variety of their own artwork, and using his books as an inspiration for their own writing. Windom even hosted a giant "Who Would Win" tournament to get ready for the visit.

Jerry Pallotta is an award winning author of children's alphabet books, imaginative fiction and the very popular *Who Would Win* series. He has been writing children's books for 30 years and has written over 90 books and sold over 10 million books. He grew up going to Peggotty Beach in Massachusetts and often uses those experiences to inspire his books.

The Windom PTO, Principal Phil Johnson, faculty and staff, and librarian Jim Clark collaborated to make this exciting and enriching experience happen for Windom students.



South Davis Students Create A Collaborative Mural

South Davis Elementary Art teacher, Miss Bleem helped South Davis students visually represent how they will make their mark on South Davis Elementary and their community. In Art class students learned about collaborative art and what it means to work together and to plan and design their artwork to be part of a larger piece. They discussed organic lines and patterns and used the philosophy of the book *The Dot* with the idea "just to make a mark and see where it takes you". Students followed a bingo chip around their paper with a marker to create unpredictable organic lines. The students filled in all the sections that they created with different colors and patterns using 4 different art supplies: colored pencils, markers, oil pastel, and watercolor paint. Fifth-grade students then worked together to arrange all of the individual dots, made by each K-5 student at South Davis, into a large collaborative mural in a rainbow design.




Spanish Speaking World Students Study Día de los Muertos

STEM Club Participates In Regional Rocketry Challenge

The OPHS STEM Club did a phenomenal job representing our school on October 22 by launching their custom-built rockets at the Geneseo War Plane museum! The club had two teams participate in the Regional Rocketry Challenge, a MOOG hosted event. Teams needed to design a rocket to travel to approximately 850 feet in elevation and remain aloft for approximately 40 seconds, all while transporting a raw egg! Both teams put in a lot of hard work and brought home awards for their efforts.

Team "We're going to France, Baby!" (WGTFB) reached a height of 915 feet on their first launch and 796 feet on the second. They graciously brought 3rd place back to Orchard Park.

Dressed all in pink acknowledge to breast cancer awareness month, and to pay homage to their rocket, Team "Barbie Girls" brought home 4th place and a spirit award for their perfectly planned outfits. Their first launch went up 917 feet and the second launch reached 791 feet. This team was also awarded the "Best Second Launch" award, indicating that their adjustments between flight were excellent engineering choices.

STEM club advisor Mr. Betrus said, "I was amazed how many kids we had staying after school every day as we pushed to prepare for competition day. They made three amazing rockets that met the required criteria. What was even more exciting was that they made adjustments to their rockets during the event so that their second launches were even better than their first."



Third Grade Students Visit the Agricultural Education Center

The third grade classes at Eggert Elementary went to the Agricultural Education Center at the Erie County Fairgrounds on Tuesday November 8. Students rotated through stations to learn about turkeys, fall harvest foods, and Thanksgiving celebrations. There were connections to science concepts, such as buoyancy, and ELA/social studies concepts with Native American legends. Students participated in fun activities: building a model cornucopia, making pumpkin pie, and mapping out the planting patterns representative of the Native Americans.

The 2022-2023 Parent Information Series continues with a presentation by Dr. Amanda Nickerson called *Talking to Children About Tragedy.*

Given recent violent and tragic events in our community and the nation, parents often grapple with how to discuss these issues with their children. In this presentation, Dr. Amanda Nickerson, professor of school psychology and director of the Alberti Center for Bullying Abuse Prevention at the University at Buffalo, will provide tips and best



practices for adults to talk with children about these topics. Representatives from the Orchard Park School District will be onsite and available to answer questions about how our schools approach these conversations with students.


The presentation will be held on November 15 at 7 p.m. in the Orchard Park High School auditorium. There is no registration required to attend this in-person event.
