2022-2023 School Year Updates

Transportation Information

Thank you for your patience as we worked to plan the transportation routes for our K-12 students. On a daily basis we safely transport over 5,000 students to at least 65 different instructional locations throughout the WNY area.

With the shortage of drivers throughout the region we have faced many challenges in finalizing pick up and drop off points for our students. As always we appreciate your support and understanding that during the

first weeks of school we will continue to closely monitor travel times and make any necessary improvements to routes.

At the elementary level, we will have door to door pick-up in most situations. Two exceptions:



- Dead-end streets where we cannot turn around safely. This is the case for many current dead-end streets.
- In certain neighborhoods we may use a consolidated bus stop so we are not stopping at each individual house. The goal for these stops will be for each residence to be able to view their elementary child getting on the bus from their property.

For grades 6-12 we will begin the year with neighborhood stops that have been developed with safety as our top priority.

At the elementary level, we ask that you have a plan for your child to enter the residence, either by you being present, or by having a plan for your child to access the home, as we drop children off at the end of the day. If you have an emergency where you will not be present and your child does not have access to his/her residence, please contact the Transportation Department immediately upon being aware of this issue so we can appropriately handle the concern.

As a reminder, during the first week of school, transportation is typically delayed, particularly on the way home from school, since drivers are still learning routes and students are working to become familiar with where to find their bus in the school lot.

You can find the pick-up drop off location information in the <u>parent portal</u>. Please continue to check back Sunday and Monday as there may be slight changes to routes through the weekend.

We are all very excited to be seeing students again and look forward to a great year!

K-5 STEM Program To Launch This Fall

This fall the district will launch its K-5 STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) T his fall the district will launch its κ -5 3 i EM Scheme, required to greate elementary schools. Over the course of the summer the spaces that once housed the elementary computer labs have been renovated to create elementary

renovation includes flexible and collaborative seating options, open floor space for robotics lessons, Lego walls and dry erase surfaces and upgraded classroom technology. Students in grades K-5 will have STEM once every 6 days which is approximately thirty STEM classes per school year.

planning since 2018 as part of the District's Long Range Technology Plan. The curriculum is being developed based on the ISTE (International Society for Technology and Education) standards and the NYSED K-12 Computer Science and Digital Fluency Standards.

The K-5 STEM program will allow students to have learning experiences rooted in the "4 C's" of 21st Century Learning - creativity, collaboration, critical thinking and communication. Students will be participating in a variety of STEM challenges and projects. One of the projects students will be completing this year is a Sail Car project and an Air Racer Electric Fan Car. They will use the engineering design process to design and build their cars, and will evaluate measurement and how the design variables can impact speed and distance traveled. In addition to the STEM challenges, students will be utilizing Osmo coding activities, Lego BricQ lessons, Sphero Indi robots, Dash and Dot robots

and Glowforge laser cutters. The K-5 STEM teachers have been working throughout the spring and summer to develop their


The K-5 STEM program will have both immediate and long-term benefits for students. The immediate benefit of the program for K-5 students will be the increased hands-on learning and the ability to collaborate and problem solve with peers. *The thought of students working together to create their own solutions to problems is an exciting thought as a teacher and parent in the district," said Emerson Smith, STEM teacher and Science Instructional Leader at South Davis.
