K-5 STEM Program To Launch This Fall

This fall the district will launch its K-5 STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) program at all four district elementary schools. Over the course of the summer the spaces that once housed the elementary computer labs have been renovated to create elementary

STEM classrooms. The renovation includes flexible and collaborative seating options, open floor space for robotics lessons, Lego walls and dry erase surfaces and upgraded classroom technology. Students in grades K-5 will have STEM once every 6 days which is approximately thirty STEM classes per school year.

The transition from an elementary computer class to a STEM class is an initiative the District has been

planning since 2018 as part of the District's Long Range Technology Plan. The curriculum is being developed based on the ISTE (International Society for Technology and Education) standards and the NYSED K-12 Computer Science and Digital Fluency Standards.

The K-5 STEM program will allow students to have learning experiences rooted in the "4 C's" of 21st Century Learning - creativity, collaboration, critical thinking and communication. Students will be participating in a variety of STEM challenges and projects. One of the projects students will be completing this year is a Sail Car project and an Air Racer Electric Fan Car. They will use the engineering design process to design and build their cars, and will evaluate measurement and how the design variables can impact speed and distance traveled. In addition to the STEM challenges, students will be utilizing Osmo coding activities, Lego BricQ lessons, Sphero Indi robots, Dash and Dot robots

and Glowforge laser cutters. The K-5 STEM teachers have been working throughout the spring and summer to develop their curriculum.

The K-5 STEM program will have both immediate and long-term benefits for students. The immediate benefit of the program for K-5 students will be the increased hands-on learning and the ability to collaborate and problem solve with peers. "The thought of students working together to create their own solutions to problems is an exciting thought as a teacher and parent in the district," said Emerson Smith, STEM teacher and Science Instructional Leader at South Davis.

Students will still receive computer instruction, but will have less screen time and more Continued on page 2.

hands on learning. Students will be using the engineering design process to plan and execute their STEM challenges, which includes learning in a cycle of "test and improve." When planning this program, the District Technology Committee consulted with middle school technology teachers on what the most critical skills for a successful STEM program are. The answer was simple and surprising. "It has been clear the last few years that kids need to be able to fail. They need to know it's okay to test and improve. Test and improve. We have a generation of kids who are afraid to get things wrong, and that is where innovation

is born." said Jim Roland, who teaches drone technology, robotics and architectural engineering and is the Instructional Leader for Technology at Orchard Park Middle School.

The long term goal of the program is to build a comprehensive K-12 STEM program and ensure that all Orchard Park students have exposure to STEM lessons and the potential for future STEM careers. Sarah Hornung, Director of Technology states, "We are excited that this program will have an impact on all areas of our school and community. We have started connecting with local businesses in the region who have a vested interest in investing in the next generation of innovators. We know the students in our schools today will someday have jobs that don't even exist yet. We want to ensure the skills they learn in our classrooms are preparing them for the world they are entering and the skills that the world needs."

The District community is looking forward to being able to provide this program for elementary students and seeing both the long and short term benefits of the program positively impact Orchard Park students.

Bullying Prevention Student Committee at South Davis Elementary

uring the 2021-2022 school year South Davis implemented a Bullying Prevention Student Committee as sub-committee of the Bullying Prevention Coordinating Committee at South Davis Elementary. This group started as a platform for students to use their voices to make a difference in the South Davis learning community and to make all students feel welcome at South Davis.

The committee consists of 4th and 5th grade students and is facilitated by Christina Carter, school librarian and Bridget Pietrantone, school social worker. Student led meetings were held twice per month. Students worked to identify hot spots where bullying behavior occurs at South Davis. They discussed the problems that exist in each area and offered possible solutions with the idea being that efforts continue during the 2022-2023 school year. All student members then attended one of the June BPCC meetings and presented their ideas to the group. One of the goals created was to bring back South Davis' Star Bus Rider program. The group will work on this and several other goals over the course of the upcoming school vear.



Family Solution Center To Open In September

In harmony with the mission of The Orchard Park Central School District, the Family Solutions Center will partner with families to achieve their fullest potential.

Supporting our students academically, is at the core of all we do. Students reach their greatest potential when all of their basic needs are met, and when they have physical and mental wellbeing. Orchard Park Central Schools values our partnership with families,

and will help provide resources to support our families through our new Family Solutions Center.

The OPCSD Family Solutions Center is located within the Orchard Park Community Center at 4520 California Road, Orchard Park. The Center will support families with school age children in a variety of ways such as providing direct counseling services to families, hosting parenting classes, and providing resources to families. The mental health professionals at the Family Solution Center will work with families to promote problem solving strategies to develop healthy relationships using solution focused communication. By recognizing the family as the most significant influence in the development of a child, mental health professionals will optimize student success by empowering families.

The Family Solution Center is not a crisis response center and, therefore, families must have an appointment. In order to provide greater flexibility and access for families, the mental health professionals at the Family Solutions Center can meet with families in the afternoon and evening hours. Parents/Guardians interested should call 716-209-8181 for an initial consultation.

In addition to providing counseling and educational opportunities for families, our goal is to grow the services provided such as a clothing closet, holiday donation coordination, camp scholarships for children, and food or other items of need. As our Family Solutions Center expands its services, we will continue to update the community on events and opportunities to assist our neighbors.

Katie Connelly, social worker, will serve as the Family Solutions Center Coordinator, and will conduct the initial consultation with families. She and our mental health professionals will provide counseling services to families. While Ann Linder, school counselor, will serve as the Transition & Pupil Support Services Coordinator, focusing on resource coordination for families. Mrs. Connelly, Mrs. Linder, and our entire team of school social workers have been integral in the planning and preparation for the Center. The opening of our Family Solutions Center would not be possible without the support of the Town of Orchard Park. We are greatly appreciative of Eugene Majchrzak, Town Supervisor and Sue Hemingway, Community Activity Center Coordinator for their collaboration. Together, we are assisting the families of our community.

Why It's Important to Use Your PowerSchool Parent Portal Account

ocuments previously mailed or sent home are only available on the PowerSchool Parent Portal. At least one parent from each student household should maintain a Parent Portal account and ensure that the email address and phone number are current. If you forget your password, you will need to enter the email address that is already associated with the account, so please keep record of this information. One login will provide access to information for all of your children. With this account, you will have access to: Report Cards, Attendance History, Bus Information, Student Schedules, Test Scores and Parent Notification Preferences.

If you already have an account, you do not need to re-register each year. Parents who prefer to have information mailed home should make a request directly to their child's school building.
