

Proposition 2

- * Proposition 2 is contingent upon the approval of Proposition 1. Even if Proposition 1 is approved by voters, Proposition 2 would also need to be approved in order for the proposed work on the Middle School Auditorium to begin.
- * The total cost of the proposed renovations to the Middle School Auditorium in Proposition 2 is \$1.8 million. Approximately 70% of the project will be funded by the state through New York State Building Aid.
- * The suggested Middle School Auditorium improvements are the only programmatic improvements in the two projects. Proposition 1 focuses on health, safety, American Disabilities Act and Title IX requirements. Proposition 2 is the renovation and related work to the Middle School Auditorium.

Total Project Cost \$24.3 Million

- * Proposition 1 (Base Project) \$22.5 million
- * Proposition 2 (Middle School Auditorium Renovation) \$1.8 million

Total Project Funding

The Project will be funded by a \$22.5 million or \$24.3 million Serial Bond to be repaid over 15 years.

The debt payments will be funded as follows:

- * 70% from New York State Building Aid
- * \$1.28 million from a Reserve for Debt & \$377,000 from a Capital Reserve
- * Balance from Property Taxes (estimated tax impact = \$.17 per \$1,000 or \$17 per year on a \$100,000 assessed value home. Proposition 1 = \$0.146 & Proposition 2 = \$0.024)

Superintendent's Column

During the September 23rd Board of Education meeting, the Board unanimously adopted the recommendation of the District's Planning Committee to move forward and present to the community a two-part facilities project for their consideration on November 18th.

The District's Planning Committee diligently analyzed the 2010 Building Condition Survey, a report mandated every five years by the New York State Education Department. The total cost to do all the items listed in the 2010 Building Condition Survey would be approximately \$43 million (in 2014 dollars.) The committee has prioritized over the past eight months the health and safety and American Disabilities Act (ADA) items, to come up with a list of "Must Do" fixes that cannot wait another five years for the next possible project. The Planning Committee divided the project into two propositions.

Proposition 1 is a District-Wide, Health and Safety Capital **Improvements** Project that includes: replacement of the original windows (1959) at the high school; replacing the middle school electrical switchgear transformers that were and installed in 1955; replacement of several areas in the middle school pool original to 1955; replacement of the roof and skylights in both Eggert Road and Ellicott Elementary that are original to portions of their

buildings and emergency lighting upgrades at both buildings; roof replacement (1976 section) at South Davis Elementary and emergency lighting upgrades; replacement of portions of the Windom Elementary roof; and pavement and roof replacement Maintenance/Grounds the building on the Middle School Campus. These are just a few of the many health, safety, title IX maintenance and improvements in the base project. The total cost of Proposition 1 (base project) is \$22.5 million.

Proposition 2 is the Middle School Auditorium Renovation Project which includes replacing the seating, carpeting, wall covering, sound system and house lighting, painting the floor under all seating areas and refinishing the doors of the auditorium. Proposition 2 is contingent upon the approval of Proposition 1. Even if Proposition 1 is approved by voters, Proposition 2 would also need to be approved in order for the proposed work on the Middle School Auditorium to begin. The total cost of the proposed renovations to the Middle School Auditorium in Proposition 2 is \$1.8 million. The suggested Middle School Auditorium improvements are the only programmatic improvements in the two projects. Proposition 1 focuses on health, safety, American Disabilities Act and Title IX requirements. Proposition 2 is the renovation and related work to the Middle School Auditorium.



The total project will be funded by a \$22.5 million or \$24.3 million Serial Bond to be repaid over 15 years. The debt payments will be funded with 70% from NY State Building Aid, \$1.28 Million from a Reserve for Debt & \$377,000 from a Capital Reserve and the remainder from the community. Both propositions together would be approximately \$0.17 per \$1,000 or \$17 per year on a \$100,000 assessed value home. (Proposition I = \$0.146 & Proposition II = \$0.024).

Orchard Park has long been known for our quality academic programs and a wide variety of co-curricular activities. In order to be able to sustain these programs and activities, we must continue to be proactive to maintain the health and safety of our facilities. As you would continually maintain and update your home, it is equally important for the District to be able to maintain and update our facilities.

Voting on the Project will take place on November 18th from 7 a.m. – 9 p.m. in the Gymnasium of our High School. For easy access to the gym, please use the Freeman Road entrance. Increasing Opportunities for Students and Meeting CDEP Goals

In April 2012, the Board of Education adopted a Comprehensive District Education Plan (CDEP), a guiding document and 3-year educational plan for our district. This plan represented the culmination of 14 months of intensive work by representative stakeholders of our school community. Since the adoption of our CDEP, our representative committee members have met bi-annually to measure our progress toward the accomplishment of our goals.

Our district has made significant progress toward our six major goals of the CDEP. As we approach the conclusion of this plan, it is my pleasure to highlight one particular area where we have far exceeded our goal: to increase the percentage of students participating in Advancement Placement (AP), Honors, and Accelerated Courses by 10%.

To achieve the aforementioned goal, our administrators, guidance counselors, and teachers worked diligently to increase our course offerings, enhance our curricula, and to make students and parents aware of these opportunities. Since 2012, we have expanded Honors and Accelerated opportunities at Orchard Park Middle School, and added an AP World History course offering at Orchard Park High School. Over the past three years, enrollment in each of these course options has continued to increase annually.

For example, the enrollment and AP test participation data reveals we have not only met, but also far exceeded our goal of increasing AP participation by 10%. As the data above indicates, nearly one-third of all Orchard Park High School students took at least one AP course last school year. Further, many students took multiple AP courses within the 2013-14 school year.

Exceeding a goal of this magnitude is no small feat and is evidence of the work ethic of our students and their desire to

challenge themselves. This is also a reflection and testament of the value our administrators, teachers, guidance counselors, parents, and community place on encouraging students to reach their fullest potential. Congratulations to our students, parents, teachers, staff, and administrators for their contribution to the tremendous growth in our AP, Honors and Accelerated course participation.

Eggert Student Becomes Honorary Football Team Captain

This year Orchard Park High School was the only high school in New York State that participated in Coach to Cure MD. Coach to Cure MD is a partnership between the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and Parent Project Muscular Dystrophy (PPMD), the largest national charity devoted exclusively to Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy. One football Saturday of each season AFCA coaches nationwide agree to promote Coach to Cure MD. This year it was Saturday, September 27, 2014 which happened to be homecoming weekend in Orchard Park. The goal of the day was to promote awareness of Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy and to raise money to fund research in order to find a cure.

Duchenne is the most common fatal genetic disorder diagnosed during early childhood. It is a progressive muscle disorder that causes loss of muscle function. Duchenne affects approximately one out of every 3,500 boys and 20,000 babies born each year worldwide. The disorder manifests primarily in boys because the affected gene is found on the X-chromosome. Duchenne knows no other boundaries, touching all

races and cultures. To date, there is no cure or treatment to stop the progression of Duchenne, and young men with Duchenne typically live only into their twenties.

The Coach to Cure MD effort is near to the hearts of many within the Orchard Park Central School District but Mark Criscione, Eggert Elementary Physical teacher has been the driving force behind it. Mr. Criscione met Tommy Parzymieso, who is currently a first grade student at Eggert Elementary has Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy, last year and wanted to do what he could to help end Duchenne. Mr. Criscione shared the information about Coach to Cure MD with Orchard Park Athletic Director David Hack and then signed up Orchard Park High School to participate.

Tommy Parzymieso is a huge football fan and loves the game. This season the Orchard Park Varsity football team made Tommy an honorary captain and he was given a jersey at one of the pre-season practices. He has made it to every game so far this season, has assisted with the coin toss and the cheerleaders have even written a cheer for him.

Quaker Boosters have also gotten involved in Coach to Cure MD. They sponsored a Chinese Auction including items donated from local businesses and local sports memorabilia at the Homecoming football game. In addition, they made a generous \$1,000 donation to Coach to Cure MD. There was a huge amount of community support for this cause, many local business donated items for the auction and many people came out to support the cause. All of which helps create awareness for Duchenne. Ultimately awareness brings money for research which leads to better treatments and to one day find a cure.





Windom Fourth Grade Students Learn About the Iroquois


Scott Lembitz from Earth Spirit, an Education Group, visited fourth grade students at Windom



A Word From the President

On November 18th, the school district community will be asked to vote on a health and safety facilities project that is part of a long-range plan created by the District Planning Committee. The Committee has been working diligently for over a year to create a responsible and realistic long-range plan for the maintenance of District facilities. plan considers the results of the 2010 state-mandated Building Condition Survey (a new one is required in 2015) along with the District's current debt service, so that health, safety and compliance issues can be addressed in a way that is most beneficial to taxpayers. This project is the first part of the long-range plan, and includes the repair or replacement of many items that are original to District buildings.

District facilities are widely used by the community. District pools, gymnasiums, classrooms,

auditoriums, tennis courts, fields and cafeterias are used throughout the school year and summer by a host of community groups. These groups include scouting organizations, recreation programs, senior citizen groups, sports programs, dance studios, art and music groups and many, many more. Each year, the District approves more than 1500 events to be held in District facilities! The entire community, therefore, has a strong interest in ensuring that District facilities are maintained in a safe condition so that they can continue to be extensively utilized by the community.

If the project is approved, the District will be reimbursed through state aid for 70% of the cost. If the project is rejected, any General Fund monies spent on maintenance and/or repair of District facilities will not be subject to any reimbursement. This proposal therefore allows the District



to use state tax dollars to pay for the majority of the project rather than putting the full burden on local taxpayers.

The Power Point presentation made to the Board about the proposed project is on the District website, along with a video tour of some of the items covered in the proposed project. I encourage you to view both so that you can be as informed as possible prior to casting your vote. Additionally, I know that District administrators would be happy to answer any questions you may have about the project proposal.

On behalf of the Board, thank you for your continued support of the District.
