Hands-Only CPR Training at OPHS

Orchard Park High School is taking steps to educate their students with a lifesaving skill that can potentially save victims of sudden cardiac arrest. The week of December 17-20, students at the high school were trained in basic CPR during physical education classes using the American Heart Association's Hands-Only CPR method.

This training is a result of the American Heart Association's push for the passage of a state law that would require all high school students to know CPR before they graduate. Students that complete the training will not be licensed CPR specialists, but will know the basic techniques to help a victim of cardiac arrest.


Several different groups in the community have come together to make this training possible. Rural Metro donated several instructors and the mannequins to Orchard Park for the training week. The Orchard Park Fire Company has contributed EMS volunteers to assist in the training.

Molly Budzinski, a junior

at Orchard Park High School, coordinated this effort with her mother Molly Dyson of Orchard Park Pediatrics. She brought the idea forward and made the training possible at Orchard Park. They hope that it will be possible to begin offering these trainings at more schools soon.

"Hands-Only CPR can be taught in 30 minutes or less, so it fits easily into a school day," said Chuck Koeppel, Paramedic, Education Coordinator for Rural Metro, and member of the American Heart Association's Buffalo Niagara Advisory Board. "High school students are certainly capable of learning the psychomotor skills of CPR that could double or triple a sudden cardiac arrest victim's chance of survival. Since 300,000 people suffer out-of-hospital sudden cardiac arrest every year, the need to know CPR is crucial."

The specialists that visit Orchard Park will train teachers in CPR as well, so that they may start a tradition of training students in CPR from year to year. Future students

will receive CPR training once a year and will have been trained all four of the years that they are in high school. This will allow them to recall the important information needed to give CPR in an emergency. Orchard Park High School is also hoping to raise enough money to purchase their own CPR practice mannequins for the training each year.

Superintendent's Column

I hope everyone had a chance to enjoy the holiday season with your friends and families. The year 2013 flew by but I am looking forward to all that is to come in 2014.

It appears that this winter may be a little worse than the last two winters in Western New York. I would like to take this opportunity to review some of our procedures for closing schools due to weather and/or road conditions.

The decision to close/delay schools is not an easy one to make and often the decision needs to be made quickly and decisively and in the best interest for the safety of our students and staff.

As early as 4:00 a.m. calls begin to be made by our transportation department and the Superintendent of Schools to the Orchard Park Police Department, the Orchard Park Highway Department and neighboring highway departments, Erie County Sheriff and the Erie County and New York State Highway departments. While the phones are ringing, key district personnel are out surveying area roads and reporting the conditions to the Superintendent of Schools.

Once the decision is made to delay or close, radio and televisions stations are contacted, the district's website is updated and the Power Announcement notification is sent out.

Note that the district is over 50 square miles, and much of the area is hilly terrain shaped in a narrow band that stretches south. Because of the land formation it is common to have varying weather at different ends of the district. So, even though school may not be closed, your decision to keep your child home is quite appropriate if the weather conditions around your home are not good. We all know and believe that our top priority is safety for our children.

The decision to close schools due to cold temperatures is another decision made by the Superintendent of Schools. In consideration of the safety of students in cold weather the following information from the National Weather Service is used as a guideline in making a determination to close schools:

Cautionary:

Wind Chills of -18 to -20 degrees

Advisory:

Wind Chills of -25 degrees or below

Warning:

Wind Chills of -35 degrees or below

In many areas of the country, schools will not close until the wind chill temperature is at the Warning level of -40 degrees or below. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that no one should be outside with unprotected skin with wind-chill factors in the range of -40 degrees or below. In Orchard Park, if the wind chill temperature reaches or is above the advisory level, school could be delayed or closed.

If weather turns bad during the school day, students will remain at school until the weather is clear enough to travel.



Typical practice is to begin the dismissal process early, which allows the extra travel time needed in bad weather to get students home - close to the regular time. To increase the potential for older siblings to be home when the younger ones arrive, the dismissal sequence starts with high school students. Middle school dismissal follows, and elementary students are dismissed last. If parents or older siblings cannot be home for the returning youngsters, please make sure your child knows of an alternate place to go, like a specific friend or neighbor.

This is a great deal of information that we hope has been helpful. The radio and television broadcasts and our Power Announcement notification will be the most reliable sources of information when inclement weather occurs.

Common Core Myths and Misconceptions

Lately, it seems as though a week doesn't pass by without media cov-

erage on the Common Core Learning Standards, New York State's testing program, or the teacher/principal evaluation system. Some of this coverage includes very heated debates and public meetings as to whether or not these changes are beneficial to our students. Unfortunately, there are a lot of misconceptions and inaccurate information for parents to sift through. Making sense of all of these changes can be overwhelming. Below are a few myths and misconceptions about the state of education in New York and in our own school district.

- ☐ **Myth & Misconception #1:** The Common Core Learning Standards mean students will be tested more.
 - Fact: The Common Core Learning Standards are curricular changes. This means the way teachers are teaching, the content they are teaching, and what/ how students are learning is changing. The new learning standards in English Language Arts and mathematics are more rigorous. The vocabulary, concepts, and expectations of student performance are at higher levels. However, our local schools have maintained the day-to-day control over how to assess this learning. Student assessment can take many forms: an essay, a project, research paper, presentation, etc. Tests are not the only way to assess what students' know and are able to do.
- Myth & Misconception #2: Kindergarteners are taking multiple-choice tests and filling in "bubble sheets."

- o Fact: This may be happening in some school districts. However, our district does not believe this is developmentally appropriate. Our administrators and teachers work collaboratively, and representatives from our schools serve on a district Assessment Committee. committee makes recommendations to our Superintendent of Schools related to district-wide assessments under New York State's Education Reform Agenda. I am pleased to report we are not pre/post assessing our students in grades K-2 for the sole purposes of teacher or principal evaluations. We are sensitive to assessing our youngest learners, and do so for the purposes of monitoring student growth and progress, ensuring appropriate instruction and placement in academic programs and support services, and providing feedback to parents.
- ☐ Myth & Misconception #3: Parents and/or students can "opt out" of the New York State Grade 3-8 Assessments.
 - opt-out provisions, New York does not. There are very limited exceptions to this, such as some unique cases for students with disabilities. Aside from such unique circumstances, all public school students in grades 3-8 are expected to participate in the New York State Assessments. In our school district testing results, coupled with classroom performance and report card grades, are considered in the referral and evaluative criteria for entrance in select academic courses such as Advanced Placement, Honors/


Accelerated courses, and the Spectrum program. This information is also used in determining students in need of remediation and academic support.

- ☐ Myth & Misconception #4: Parents can refuse to have their child take a NYS Assessment and there is no consequence for this choice.
 - o **Fact:** Students who refuse to take any or all portion for the Assessments are coded as 999: test refused. There are potential consequences for districts when students do not participate in the Assessments. In alignment with the No Child Left Behind Act, school districts are required to have participation of at least 95 percent of its eligible population as well as all subgroups of students (i.e. a subgroup such as students with disabilities, etc.) participate in the Assessments. Failure to have 95 percent of students participating in the New York State Assessments and, therefore, failure

to demonstrate 95 percent of students making adequate yearly progress will jeopardize a district's Title 1 funding. As a point of reference, our district's Title 1 funding for last school year was just over \$250,000 dollars.

Math and ELA Instructional Leaders, Curriculum Coordinators, Elementary Principals, and I will facilitate the presentation. New Equipment For OP Swimmers



Petitions for Candidacy on the Board of Education Will Soon Be Available

Petitions for qualified candidates seeking election to the Orchard Park Central School District Board of Education will be available beginning February 3, 2014 in the office of the District Clerk, 2240 Southwestern Blvd, West Seneca, NY.

To be a qualified candidate for the Board of Education you must be a resident of the district for a least one year prior to the election, a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age, able to read and write, and cannot be an employee of the district.

The terms of three trustees on the seven-member school board are up for election, Mrs. Rachel Baksa, Mr. David Nielsen and Mr. Sean Wittmann. Each term is for three years, July 1, 2014 – June 30, 2017. Candidates must obtain at least 49 valid signatures, which represent two percent of last year's total vote count. Petitions are due in the office of the District Clerk by 5:00 p.m. on Monday, April 21, 2014.

Public voting on the budget is Tuesday, May 20, 2014, from 7:00 a.m. - 9:00 p.m. in the Gymnasium of the Orchard Park High School. For easy access to the Gymnasium, use the Freeman Road entrance.

Windom Students Raise Money



Ellicott Students Create Power of Reading Puzz

Rachael Giza's third grade class at Ellicott Elementary has been learning how children around the world access books. The students examined 16 different countries, and learned what challenges each faced when obtaining books due to geographical factors.

Miss Giza's class used books such as Rain School by James Rumford, My Librarian is a Camel by Margriet Ruurs, and Nasreen Secret School by Jeanette Winter while learning to become strategic readers and writers. Students worked in small groups to research data, then came together to create a Power of Reading Puzzle that highlighted the countries researched and how children there access books.

A Word From the President

A new year is upon us and for Board members that means that budget planning for the 2014-2015 school year is gearing up. I encourage community members, staff and students to become as informed as possible about the budget by attending Board meetings and visiting the District's website. Board meetings in February and March will be held at the High School.

The financial realities facing our District are similar to those of other districts across the state as a consequence of decreasing state aid and increasing costs. For example, in the last 5 years our District's state aid has decreased by \$3.5 million, while at the same time its pension costs have increased by \$4.25 million, mandated special education costs by \$2.8 million, and health care costs by \$1.4 million. The Board has been told that while we can expect a small state aid increase for the 2014-2015 school year, we are also facing additional increases in these other areas that will surpass the anticipated increase in state aid.

To complicate matters, the two largest bargaining units in the District (OPTA, representing the teachers, and OPSRPA, representing the schoolrelated professionals including aides, bus drivers, etc.) are working under contracts that expired several months ago. By law, the expired contracts remain in effect until new ones are executed by the parties. While negotiations are on-going as of this writing, the District's 2014-2015 budget may be adopted prior

to the successful conclusion of negotiations with one or both groups. This obviously makes planning for salary and benefit expenditures, which comprise approximately 66% of the District's total budget for these two groups, especially difficult.

The Board is approaching these budgetary challenges with three goals in mind: maintaining the District's comprehensive program; staying within the constraints of the tax-levy cap; and, ensuring the District's long-term fiscal health. The Board is proud of the fact that the District's sound financial management practices have earned it a Moody's Aa2 rating. This rating is beneficial to taxpayers because it allows the District to borrow money at a lower rate. We have seen other districts deplete their fund balances and reserves in order to avoid making reductions to their budget. Those districts have a lower bond rating and must pay more to borrow money, ultimately costing their taxpayers more. This Board, upon the recommendation of Superintendent McGarrity and his team, has made the decision to put the long-term fiscal health of the District ahead of the short-term maintenance of various budget items because we believe it is the responsible thing to do (even if it is not always popular).

Again, please stay informed throughout the budget process by attending Board meetings and/or visiting the District website.
