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Bullying Prevention Success In Orchard Park

In September of 2010 the Orchard Park Central School District took steps to begin the Olweus (ol-vay-us) Bullying Prevention Program District-wide. The Olweus program has gained international recognition as an effective tool for reducing bullying and producing measureable results. Two years later significant results were apparent in the Orchard Park Central School District.

September 13, 2010, New York State established the Dignity for All Students Act (DASA). It required schools to establish guidelines for a program that promotes a positive school environment free from discrimination and harassment by July 1, 2012. Before DASA was signed into law in September 2010, Orchard Park Central School District had already begun the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program. By November 2010, Orchard Park had 3 certified trainers on staff to assist other school districts in training their staff. By September 2012 three more school districts in Erie County will have implemented the Olweus Program district-wide, and several more districts started using it in some of their schools.

The Olweus Bullying Prevention Program was developed in Norway in response to concern over student bullying. There are four rules to Olweus program:

- (1) We will not bully others.
- (2) We will try to help students who are bullied.
- (3) We will try to include students who are left out.
- (4) If we know that someone is being bullied, we will tell an adult at school and an adult at home.

In Orchard Park Central schools a student questionnaire about bullying was recently conducted and the results were encouraging. Fewer students experienced consistent bullying, 4.3% district-wide and 7.8% fewer at Eggert Elementary School. In addition, more students felt safe at school, 3.6% district-wide, and 9.5% more at South Davis Elementary School. Finally, more students indicated they liked school more, 3.2% district-wide, and 5% among males at Orchard Park High School.

Using the Olweus Program, and equipped with this statistical information, Orchard Park Central School District will continue to make a positive impact on student lives. More importantly, students will learn valuable lessons on how treat one-another, and address discrimination and harassment, as they mature into adulthood.

Energy Update

Summer is a great time to realize a myriad of energy savings within our schools. In fact, all employees have contributed greatly to cutting down on energy costs over the summer.

One step we have taken is consolidating frozen food in cafeteria freezers. Instead of leaving each school's freezers on all summer, all food has been moved to three building freezers, with the others powered off and cleaned.

Another energy saving step occurred in classrooms. This year all classroom computers and peripherals-smart boards, TV monitors and printers are unplugged for the summer. This eliminates "phantom power" usage, the power that quietly is consumed by electronics with LED displays and lights that remain plugged in. Although the amount of power used per machine is small, there can be savings realized over long stretches of time.

Our EMS or Energy Management System has been adjusted accordingly for the summer building use schedule. This computer-based system has shutdown air handlers (vents near classroom windows) and exhaust fans in unoccupied areas of the buildings. It has provided air conditioning to offices and essential areas only during office hours, reducing the run time of most air conditioning units.

A partial "dark campus" policy has been implemented in district parking lots. While exterior building lights remain on, sufficiently lighting the outside of buildings,

pole lights in parking areas have been turned off.

A four-day workweek has been implemented for many district employees that work through the summer. Energy savings can be realized on that additional day when no employees are in the building. Air conditioning can be curtailed. Lighting will be reduced.

If you enter a school building this summer during normal office hours, you will probably notice another way in which Orchard Park employees are reducing our energy footprint. Hall lighting remains at reduced levels when student activities are not taking place.

Orchard Park School District employees are committed to using our energy resources smartly and efficiently, putting the money we saved where it truly belongs - toward supporting educational programs in our schools.

In addition, students will be challenged in reading and comprehension through increased text complexity and academic vocabulary. In mathematics, students will experience an emphasis on conceptual understanding at a deeper level. Especially in the elementary years, the curriculum has shifted to allow fewer concepts to be introduced, but the expectation for deep conceptual understanding of the concepts has been increased. In other words, the focus is not so much on the breadth of mathematical concepts, but the depth and level of understanding of the concepts.

In closing, I would like to applaud the efforts of our teachers and instructional leaders. Our instructional staff spent countless hours this summer preparing for these curriculum changes. It is clear the entire community of Orchard Park including our staff, teachers, Board of Education, parents, and residents value a rigorous and academically challenging educational experience. I look forward to partnering with our community to continue to enhance our students' educational journey.

OPCSD Receives Extremely Low Interest Rate on \$6 Million Ban

The Orchard Park Central School District recently received bid offers on a \$6 Million Bond Anticipation Note, referred to as a BAN Note. The BAN Note is for the financing of the Transportation Department and District Office Consolidation Project, a viable long-term plan for district facilities, which was approved by voters in May 2011 to move the current District's Transportation Department and the District Offices to a joint facility on Southwestern

Eight bids were received and the lowest BAN Note offer came from TD Securities with an extremely competitive rate of .38%. Jeff Stone, Bond Attorney Expert from Hodgson Russ LLP, stated, "this bond rate may be a new record low for borrowing... that's the lowest I can remember. " He stated that the low interest rate is due to a number of factors, including the struggling economy, and the sound financial practices of the Orchard Park Central School District and their current Moodys' bond rating of Aa2.

Orchard Park Pride Awards

Each year approximately 10 percent of the students in the senior class are selected to receive an Orchard Park Pride Award. This award is given to those who have exhibited excellence in one or more of the following areas: character, work ethic, and involvement and impact. Not everyone who exhibits these qualities will be chosen. Selection is made on the basis of information submitted on a student information sheet as well as faculty votes. Each student who is chosen will be paired with a local business representative who will host the student and his/her parents at a dinner in the spring.

We are asking students to self-nominate by submitting the Student Information Sheet to Mrs. See in House III by November 1. The forms are available in the House offices or on-line.** Only students who have completed this form, checked the Orchard Park Pride box at the top, and submitted it by November 1 will be considered in the voting process.

This is not a time to be overly modest. If students have contributed to Orchard Park through activities in the classroom, in the community, or in school sports, clubs, or organizations, we encourage them to self-nominate by submitting the Student Information Sheet. The process is similar to submitting a resume or applying for a job and we feel this will be a good learning experience.


