7th Grade Students Conducts Mock Trials

Mr. Al Jafarjian's 7th grade Social Studies Classes traveled to the Orchard Park Town Hall to conduct a mock trial. The trial pictured was the case of Simeon Bushnell, who was on Trial for violating the Fugitive Slave Law of 1850, a historic case that really took place in Oberlin, Ohio in the years leading up to the Civil War. In this case the residents of the town of Oberlin help a slave to escape to Canada, stealing him away from slave catchers who had come up from Kentucky to take him back to the planation he ran away from. According to the Fugitive Slave Law, this was illegal at the time, no one could help a slave escape. Many Northerners became abolitionists because of this terrible law. This law, along with many other events of the 1850s, led to the Civil War, a terrible struggle for the United States, that resulted in the end of slavery. By re-enacting trials in our classroom, students think critically, analyze information, speak and present in front of classmates and use debate

Energy Update

The Orchard Park School District has made a strong commitment to energy conservation over the past year. The Board of Education adopted an "Energy/Water Conservation and Recycling of Solid Waste" policy with its accompanying regulations. These documents specify the responsibilities of each stakeholder group - teachers, custodians, administration, etc. - in implementing conservation measures throughout the district. The policy also created the position of "Energy Education Specialist,"who works with all stakeholders to identify and initiate those energy conservation measures.

As Orchard Park's Energy Education Specialist, I am responsible for a wide variety of tasks that all have one common thread - working cooperatively with all district employees to implement the board of education's energy policy, thus reducing waste and redirecting those savings to the job of educating our students.

Our district has partnered with Energy Education Inc., a company with twenty-five years of experience in energy conservation within schools, to accomplish these goals. Energy Education Inc. provides experts who regularly visit Orchard Park Schools, making on-site evaluations and recommendations. They provide a sophisticated computer program that allows us to compare energy consumption from this year to last, factoring in variables such as weather. They share "best

4 practices" in dealing with ener-

gy issues, allowing us to benefit from their years of experience.

Most of my time as energy education specialist is spent in the buildings doing "energy audits." As I walk through a building, I measure room temperatures with an infrared temperature gun. I check to see if fresh air is being vented into classrooms during occupied times and stale air is being exhausted out of the building. I use a device called a data logger to monitor temperature and humidity in a classroom over longer periods of time. Many audits are done late at night, very early in the morning, or on weekends so I can observe the building in an "unoccupied" mode. During these times I hope to see cooler temperatures, exhaust fans off, classroom electronics off, and hall lighting at a minimum. I report the results of my audits to building principals and head custodians so that they can make any necessary adjustments at their building. I also meet regularly with the district's maintenance department to share audit data and adjust the computer-based energy management system accordingly.

Communication is another important part of my job. Ours is a "transformational energy management" process, that seeks to transform all staff members into conscientious energy consumers in the workplace. Early on, I met with each faculty and staff to introduce the new energy initiative. I continually communicate to staff about events such as

"shutdowns," the times when classes are in recess. Explaining clearly what is expected of head custodians and teachers during these shutdown periods helps us realize more savings. I recently sponsored an Earth Day initiative called "A Simple Gesture". More than sixty elementary classroom teachers made a commitment to reduce energy use in commemoration of Earthday. I have regular meetings with Superintendent Matt McGarrity, Assistant Superintendent Jeff Petrus and Head of Building and Grounds Bill Bosinski. We discuss any energy issues that impact the entire district.

Since starting as energy education specialist in October, I continue to grow in my knowledge of how our school district's energy infrastructure works and how best to improve its energy efficiency. I am personally committed to energy conservation in my own life, and I bring that same zeal to my work in Orchard Park. I recently helped Orchard Park Schools become an "Energy Star Partner" which is a tangible commitment to energy conservation and a step toward higher honors with the U.S Department of Energy's Energy Star Program. I look forward to establishing Orchard Park Schools as a leader in energy conservation and a model for other districts to emulate.

Orchard Park Seniors View Firsthand the Consequences of Drinking and Driving

The goal of the morning-long event was safety and making positive healthy decisions, not

just for prom night, but for their entire lives said Mary Wolf, co advisor of OPHS The theme of the assembly was SADD. "Don't let your memories end here," and featured a speaker whose personal story made the tragic consequences of drinking and driving a reality for the students.

In addition to the assembly, the students experienced a simulation of a tragic car accident, and witnessed firsthand the consequences, both physical and emotional, of driving while impaired. Though student actors from the senior class of OPHS were used for the re-enactment. first responders commented that it was one of the most authentic portrayals that they had ever seen.

This is truly a community event commented Wolf. It involved officers from the Orchard Park Police, volunteers from all three Orchard Park Fire Halls, students from the Explorers Program, and Emergency Medical Service personnel. Dan Neaverth, Orchard Park District Fire Chief, provided

narration and explained to the nearly 450 student observers exactly what was taking place on the lawn behind the gymnasium on Freeman Road. The students were respectful, attentive and awestruck by the event. One staff person was heard to say "it is much better to bring this reality to the students in the form of prevention, rather than have any one of them experience that type of tragedy in their own life".

After a solemn morning filled with messages of safety, personal stories of tragedy and loss owing to impaired driving,

and the re-enactment of the results of poor decision making, the simulation of a tragic car accident that students were given the opportunity to begin their prom weekend with hope for their future and a glance at their past, as they signed year books, picked up their caps and gowns and enjoyed a

delicious chicken barbecue. The whole event is in keeping with the mission of the Orchard Park Community to Keep Kids Safe.

The Ride for Missing Children Stops at Ellicott Elementary


