I hope this column finds you well and recovering from a busy holiday season. It surely seemed as though there was something happening in the schools or community every evening throughout December. That trend will continue through the new year with sporting events, musical events and special PTO activities. As always, we invite you to visit our website to see current events on our school calendar.

Our winter weather forces us at times to enact our closing procedures for the health, safety and security of our students. This decision is based on weather forecasts and reports from our town and school officials. The Superintendent of Schools is responsible for making the final determination. It is critical that the decision is made as early as

possible, knowing that we have staff members that leave early to get to school. This closing information is made available to area radio stations, including WBEN, WNED, WUFO, WHTT and WJYE. Closing information will also be shared with the following television stations: WGRZ, WIVB and WKBW. If the District has power, the closing will also be posted on

the District's Web site at www. opschools.org

When parents need to be notified during the school day of any sudden schedule changes (including the cancellation of after school sports, clubs and activities), our Ed-Alert System is utilized to send text messages and emails. The District uses the system to keep subscribers informed of school closings, early dismissals, event cancellations and other important information. If you would like to receive announcements and communications, you can opt-in using the following steps:

- Fill in your information using all lowercase for your email address.

With Orchard Park being such a large District, there may be some areas that seem clear, while other regions may be treacherous to transport students. Please know that the safety of our students and staff is the top priority for this decision-making process.

Closing During the School Day
On rare occasions, it may be necessary to close a school during the day due to loss of power, loss of water or other emergency situations. If this occurs, procedures are in place to transport students to another building, if necessary.

If weather turns bad during the school day, students will remain at school until the weather is clear enough to travel. Typical practice is to begin the dismissal process early, which allows the extra travel time needed in bad weather to get home close to the regular time. To increase the potential for older siblings to be home when the younger ones arrive, the dismissal sequence starts with High School students. Middle School dismissal follows, and Elementary students are dismissed last.

Families are encouraged to have a plan in place in the event that a parent or older sibling cannot be home for the returning youngster(s). Please be sure your children are familiar with an alternate place to go, like a specific friend or neighbor. Also, please make sure that your parental and emergency contact information is up to date on the Parent Portal. Board President's Column

Happy New Year! As we begin 2011, the Board of Education will be working closely with District Administrators in developing a budget for the next school year. As in previous years, we anticipate additional state aide funding cuts in education for 2011-2012. At this writing, New York State is looking at a projected deficit of \$9 billion. Governor Cuomo is expected to present a state aid proposal in early to mid-January. It is anticipated that the proposal will include a future reduction in state aid to school districts in addition to a cap increase on property taxes of 2% or CPI (Consumer Price Index). whichever is less. The lack of revenue projections from the State makes it almost impossible for the District to complete a long-range budget plan. Even without this information, the District continues to develop a draft budget for the upcoming school year. It is anticipated that the first draft will be presented to the Board of Education at our February meeting.

In other District matters, the Professional Development Council recently updated the District's professional development plan. It will first be reviewed by the Board of Education's Curriculum and Policy Committee, then forwarded to the entire Board for approval. The CDEP (Comprehensive District

Educational Plan) Committee conducted their first meeting in October. Currently, the committee continues their review of data through the lens of different accountability groups (gender, special education, and regular education performance, economically disadvantaged, etc). The Committee will continue to meet throughout the winter and spring as they develop a comprehensive plan that considers all the important aspects of school improvement.

The District Academic Intervention Services (AIS) team has begun to employ additional screening tools to identify students with the greatest needs. The Middle School has designed their own curriculumbased measurement tool for identifying students in need of writing interventions. This will allow students to cycle in and out of intervention

remediation groups.
The AIS staff and administration are exploring other ways to service the increased number of students that now qualify for services under the revised cutpoints. They are also looking at the frequency of intervention, minutes per session, size of groups as well as other time blocks.

The District has also been working at keeping our children safe. The Olweus Bullying Prevention training was completed for the building level Bullying Prevention Coordinating Committees in November by our District trainers. 

In Case You Haven't Heard about Olweus...

School District continues to move forward with our plan to address bullying behaviors after studying student responses on a survey administered in the spring of 2010. The Olweus Bullying Questionnaire results indicated that our students have experienced bullying similar to other schools across the country. Dr. Lisa Krueger and other administrators have shared these survey results with faculty, the Board of Education, Central Council PTO and the Community Youth Council.

In an effort to intensify and improve our anti-bullying efforts, the District has expanded its capacity to train all staff in the Olweus Bullying Prevention



program. Mr. Terry Tryon, House 2 principal, and Mrs. Kim Cirillo, Assistant Middle School principal recently returned from Olweus training in Frisco, Texas and now join Dr. Lisa Krueger as official trainers.

During the month of November, all three trainers conducted a two-day session for each school's Bullying Prevention Coordinating Committee, otherwise known as the BPCC. Each school's BPCC, which consists of approximately 10-12 staff members, learned that the Olweus Bullying Prevention program is research-based and evidence-based. The program began in Norway many years ago, but was first implemented in the United States in 1999. A 2010 study of 56,000 students across 107 schools (including elementary, middle school and high school) revealed a 39% reduction in bullying behaviors in its first year of implementation. The program is very comprehensive and includes four essential elements: a schoolwide component, classroom component, community component and an individual component. Parents are an important partner in each of the four elements. In order to attain the level of success noted above, the program must be implemented with fidelity.

Now that each school has a committee trained, what happens next?

Each building Coordinating Committee has targeted March 21, 2011 to inform and train the entire school staff about the program, including:

- How to recognize the various forms of bullying
- How to intervene a bullying

- How to refer the individual demonstrating the bullying behavior to the appropriate staff member for follow-through and consequences
- •An understanding of the program components

It is important to note that ALL staff members participate in the training, not just the teachers and administrators.

The District will use the spring Superintendent Conference Day to train teacher aides, kitchen staff, bus drivers, clerical staff and custodians. The goal is to train all adults that connect with our students during the course of the day.

What happens after that?

If all goes according to plan, each school will adopt antibullying rules, schedule a kickoff event in the fall of 2011 and begin to implement the classroom component, which includes a weekly classroom meeting.

Is this district-wide training effort and program necessary?

Our survey results demonstrated that Orchard Park is not immune to bullving behaviors. If you watch the evening news or read the paper, you know all too well that bullying has reached what some consider an "epidemic level." The use of technology has only compounded the problem in school districts and colleges throughout the nation. Students. and adults for that matter. may initiate vicious rumors via text and email as well as stream live video of very private moments. The end result is fear of attending school, poor attendance, a compromised learning environment and even suicide.

DID YOU KNOW?

One of the District's goals for 2010-2011 is to advance Character Education programming through participation in the Western New York Character Council and implementation of the Olweus Bullying Prevention Program.

The challenges associated with implementing such a comprehensive program (i.e. revisions to school schedules, funding for training resources and staff development, contractual matters with bargaining units) might dissuade some from attending to this issue. Hopefully, at the end of the day, we have the resolve to work through them and make a positive difference in the lives of children and their learning environment.
