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Science Classroom Addition Ready for Use

Superintendent's Column

For the past several months, the possibility of school closing has focused on H1N1 flu. Recently Erie 1 BOCES Superintendent of Schools Don Ogilvie stated, "I want to emphasize the interdependency of roles (schools, health department, parents, etc.) to prevent, track and respond to H1N1. You need to know that the school districts in Western New York are doing everything possible to keep the school environment as 'clear' as possible. The decision to close as a result of H1N1 will be based upon a review of data and patterns of incidence and only after consultation with the county health commissioner. It appears that while each district may act independently, there is much communication and coordination between all agencies." I thought this line of thinking might be helpful.

As we move from fall to winter, the viability of closing for weather becomes an even greater possibility. Therefore a quick review of the procedures for the Orchard Park Central School District may be helpful.

Just as with H1N1, the decision to close/delay schools is not an easy one to make. As early as 4:00 a.m., calls begin to come to myself and our

transportation department from the Orchard Park Police Department, the Orchard Park Highway Department, Boston Highway Department, and the East Concord County Highway Department. Calls also come from the Erie County Sheriff, the New York State Highway Department and the Erie County Highway Department. Whew! While the phones are ringing, Tom Blidy, the District's Transportation Director, is out personally driving and surveying key roads. After the determination of the road conditions has been made, Mr. Blidy then calls me and advises me as to whether to delay/close or not. Once the decision is made to delay or close, I then call the radio and televisions stations. I try to do all of this by 5:30 a.m.

Note that the district is over 50 square miles, and much of the area is hilly terrain shaped in a narrow band that stretches south.

Because of the land formation, it is common to have varying weather at different ends of the district. So, even though school may not be closed, your decision to keep your child home is quite appropriate if the weather around your home is not good. We know and believe that our top priority is safety first for our children.

If weather turns bad during the school day, students will remain at school until the weather is clear enough to travel.

Typical practice is to begin the dismissal process early, which allows the extra travel time needed in bad weather to get home close to the regular time. To increase the potential for older siblings to be home when the younger ones arrive, the dismissal sequence starts with High School students. Middle School dismissal follows, and Elementary students are dismissed last. If parents or older siblings cannot be home for the returning youngsters, please make sure your child knows of an alternate place to go, like a specific friend or neighbor.

This is a great deal of information that I hope has been helpful. The radio and television broadcasts will be the most reliable sources of information when inclement weather occurs.

Thank you for your continued support.

Snow Day Information

The decision to close school because of adverse weather conditions is not made lightly or easily. It involves many consultations with the weather bureau, highway supervisors and police in the six towns which compose the district.

Once the decision to close has been made by the Superintendent, area radio stations are informed, including WBEN, WNED, WUFO, WHTT and WJYE. Closing information will also be shared with the following television

stations: WGRZ, WIVB and WKBW. You may also receive alerts to your e-mail address or cellular phone through the District's "ED Alert" system (visit www.opschools.org for more information). If the District has power, the closing will also be posted on the Disrict's Web site at www.opschools.org

On occasion, an emergency may necessitate the closing of one school, but not the other schools in the district. Single building closings also will be announced on the above stations.

District and Union Collaborate on Bullying and Harassment Prevention Workshop

This past summer, the Orchard Park Central School District and the Orchard Park Teachers Association co-hosted four days of in-service training on Bullying and Sexual Harassment Prevention and Intervention. This project was coordinated through the joint efforts of the District, the Orchard Park Teachers Association, the National Education Association (NEA) and Phil Johnson, retired staff member of the Geneva School District.

Representatives from the District, including teachers, counselors, bus drivers, teacher aides, administrators and Board members, participated in the workshop alongside parents and community leaders, including DARE officers, the Community Youth Council, Boys & Girls Club, YMCA, Park Parsons and the Town Recreation Department. Together, they learned more about why children who are targets of bullying behavior suffer emotionally, as well as academically. They also learned that bullied students have a higher rate of absenteeism, have trouble concentrating in class, and as a result, are denied the basic civil right of obtaining a quality education in a threat-free learning environment.

The goals of the program included:

- •Increasing awareness of the problem of bullying and harassment; and the harmful effects to the target, perpetrator and even the bystander
- Becoming familiar with prevention/intervention programs and techniques
- •Learning how and actually beginning to develop a school-wide solution (via a school action plan)

What happens next? School personnel have shared what they learned with colleagues at their respective schools, and will revisit the suggested school action plans throughout the year. (See box





below for more information.)

The District and the union will continue to pursue professional development for all staff in an effort to reduce and eventually eliminate bullying and harassment. The solution lies in increasing awareness of the problem, learning about effective prevention programs and intervention techniques, and designing a comprehensive school-wide solution to mitigate the harmful effects of such behaviors. Our academic excellence as a school district can continue to thrive when learning takes place in a safe and positive environment.

In the Future....

Here is a sampling of what schools are planning to combat bullying and sexual harassment:

- Ellicott Elementary is planning a Character Café, which rewards any class that demonstrates anti-bullying strategies. The Character Café promotes special guests who will eat lunch with winning classes in a specially prepared section of the small cafeteria.
- •The Middle School began anti-bullying efforts last year with the sixth graders under the leadership of the guidance counselors, social worker and school psychologists. This September these individuals, along with building administration, designed a Welcome Back assembly for all students. Each grade level received information on bullying, cyber bullying and sexual harassment.
- Teachers at the High School will continue their intervention strategies whenever bullying language is used student-to-student, including, but not limited to, anti-gay remarks.

Technology Education Classes Participate in Real World Field Trip

In early October, junior and senior students from Mr. Daluisio's, Mr. Godfrey's and Mr. Kennedy's technology education classes went on a "real world" field trip sponsored by the WNY Building Trades Council. Students visited the Operating Engineers Training facility in Lakeview, NY, where they spent the entire day being exposed to all the building-trades unions that operate in WNY. They were given the opportunity to participate in operation of heavy equipment, in addition to viewing and experiencing most of the trades first-hand. This provided them with the experience of what a day in the life of a buildingtrades worker can be like. Students

were also given hard hats, safety glasses, goodie bags, information on apprenticeship and journeyman programs and a great lunch. More than a few students were overheard saying "what a great opportunity it was" and "it's unbelievable the money you could make doing something that you really like." This was the fourth time that High School students have attended this function.

Making Strides

On Sunday, October 4, 140 staff members from the District participated in Buffalo's Making Strides Against Breast Cancer Walk. This national event is held in over 40 cities to raise awareness and funds to fight breast cancer. The local walk began at Buffalo City Hall with a pep rally and continued with a 5k walk to the lighthouse at Erie Basin Marina. Members of the Orchard Park Teachers' Association, in conjunction with the Orchard Park Service Related Professionals' Association, raised over \$7,200 for the walk. The event, held annually, raised about \$500,000 for this worthy cause.

National Merit



Orchard Park High School Senior Ross DiPronio has been named a National Merit Scholarship semifinalist. He is one of thirty-two Western New York high school seniors who received the honor, putting him in an elite nationwide group of 16,000 academic stars. The 2009 semifinalists were

chosen from an initial pool of 1.5 million students who took last year's PSAT/NMSQT, a qualifying test. Semifinalists remain in the hunt for 8,200 National Merit Scholarships, which are worth a total of \$36 million. A participant in the Gifted Math Program at the University at Buffalo, DiPronio is a member of the National Honor Society, French National Honor Society and Quaker Marching Band. He has been involved with the band/wind ensemble, jazz ensemble, student government, Model UN, Orchard Park High School's school newspaper, The Voice, and Masterminds (high school academic bowl).

National Participation

This past summer Rachelle Francis, music teacher at Eggert Elementary, was selected to participate in two National Endowment for Humanities summer seminars. In June, Francis traveled to Philadelphia to participate in "A Rising People: Benjamin Franklin and the Americans." In July, she ventured to Wyoming to take part in "Women's Suffrage on the Western Frontier." Each summer, the National Endowment for the Humanities offers 'Landmarks of American History and Culture Workshops for Schoolteachers.' These workshops are designed to provide K-12 educators with intensive study of important topics in American history. Mrs. Francis, the District's K-5 social studies coordinator, has now developed lessons for the NEH website about each of these experiences and will share her learning with other teachers at Eggert Elementary.

Supporting Our Schools

Eggert Elementary has been selected as BJ's adopta-school program for the 2009-2010 school year! The outlet retailer will present the school with a \$500 check early this winter. 
district performance are categorized into four levels as follows:

- Level 4: Meeting Learning Standards with Distinction
- •Level 3: Meeting Learning Standards
- Level 2: Partially Meeting Learning Standards
- •Level 1: Not Meeting Learning Standards

These levels not only measure progress in meeting the NYS Learning Standards, but they also serve as predictors of student success on future Regents examinations required for graduation. Students that score at level 3 and 4 are "on target" for meeting the learning standards and passing the "high stakes" Regents exams.


Although these results rank Orchard Park Central Schools near the top in Erie County on most assessments, the district continues to focus on ways to increase student achievement, thereby assisting all students in meeting the standards. Excellent student performance is a direct result of the Board's continued investment in professional development to extend teacher knowledge and "best practices", development of high quality standards-based curriculum maps, additional time on task (after school or before school programs), software to inform instruction through analysis of student performance data, and talented and dedicated staff.

District English Language Arts results on state assessments are very impressive. Please note the positive three year trend lines in the graph above. The percentage of students meeting standards (Level 3 and 4) has steadily increased.

District Math results on state assessments were equally very strong. The percentage of students meeting standards (Level 3 and 4) improved at all grade levels – the third year in a row. The district team is very proud of this positive trend line as well. Math was an area targeted for improvement four years ago by the Board of Education. Please note the significant improvement of students meeting the standards at 7th grade (91% to 97%).

DIGITAL KNOW....

Have you seen
"DIGITAL CITIZEN"
bracelets on students and
staff around town? They
landed on the wrists of
Orchard Park elementary
students on October 9 when
the Orchard Park Digital
Citizenship Curriculum was
launched.

Beginning in September 2009, school districts across New York State are expected to teach Internet Safety to all K-12 students. To meet this expectation and to insure that all students participate in an Internet safety curriculum, representatives from each building met during the summer of 2009 to align and expand current Internet Safety activities into a Digital Citizen Curriculum.

An assessment of District digital information revealed these startling facts:

- •On April 6, 2009, a local evening newscast ran a story of the return of a 13-year old that had run away with a 24-year old. The next day, we discovered that an OP fifth grader had a "MySpace" account that listed her age as 17, living in NYC and looking very much like the teen in her profile from the camera angle of her photograph.
- •Cyber bullying is on the rise. An Orchard Park third grader was banned from AOL for sending inappropriate messages to other AOL members.
- •An elementary student assumed the identity of her teacher and set

up an Internet "teacher page" in the teacher's name.

- The parent of a 5th grader sent the child to school with a flash drive to copy a program he enjoyed using in class.
- •A High School student was deleting the work of fellow students from the victim's directory.

It was apparent that the understanding of the digital world was beyond just "staying safe". After the initial assessment, committee members reviewed what was being taught to develop digital citizens. How to be safe and how to act responsibly were top priorities, but other areas of digital citizenship were also reviewed, including:

- Social Networking
- Digital Ethics
- •Digital Research Strategies

Once the review was complete, the committee began the work on a K-12 curriculum that articulates what needs to be taught in the classroom, library and computer lab. The Digital Citizenship Curriculum launched on October 9, initially placing a focus on citizenship in the virtual world. The Orchard Park Police Department, teachers, and a representative from introduced the topics of Internet Safety, Social Networking (acceptable behavior vs. bullying)

and Ethical Use of Digital Information.

October 9 is just the beginning. The Middle School plans to host a representative from in January for grades 7 and 8 and in June for grade 6. The High School is working on a "social networking" experience for all ninth graders through Freshman Boost.


