

### Board of Education Organizational Meeting Overview

The Orchard Park Central School District Board of Education held their Organizational Meeting on Wednesday, July 1, 2009. At the meeting, Donald Sniezak was once again elected President, and Maria Lehman was re-elected Vice President. In addition, Alfred McClymonds and Carla Marazzo took their Oath of Offices as reelected Board Members.

Other highlights of the meeting are as followed:

•Mrs. Thomas led a discussion with the Board regarding a new bus garage for the District. For over two decades, the District has tried to move the current bus garage away from the Village for a variety of reasons, specifically spacing and safety. Because the current garage and adjacent property are not large enough to house our bus fleet, the Transportation department parks buses on Duerr Road and at Ellicott Elementary. After discussion, it was decided that the District continue to research options for a new bus garage, while the Board would take a tour of the current bus garage and look at a similar facility in another District.

• Scott Jones and Jeff Nunn from Gordon Jones Associates provided a Capital Project Update to the Board. Overall, the project is moving along on time and on budget. A major component of the project is the addition of a three-story classroom Science wing, which will be completed this winter.

Information on the bus garage and capital project will continue to be discussed at future board meetings and will be included in the next issue of the Community Report.

# Students Broaden Knowledge of WW99 and the Holocaust



## *Revised Code of Conduct Adopted* By Dennis Fitscher Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Pupil Services

Our Board of Education recently adopted a revised Code of Conduct. School districts in New York State are mandated as part of the Safe Schools Against Violence in Education (SAVE) legislation to develop a code to improve school safety.

Most people make the assumption that the required Code of Conduct was written to address student behavior on school property and at school-related functions. While this information is true, a District's Code of Conduct also calls for the

maintenance of order on school grounds for all members of the school community, which not only takes into account students, but also teachers, school personnel, parents and visitors.

The original Code of Conduct was written with foresight and wisdom, but that committee could never have predicted the changes in technology and education law. As a result, a committee representing all constituent groups was formed to update the Code. The goal was to revise the Code, taking into consideration the effectiveness of the Code, and the fairness and

### Significant Changes to the Code of Conduct

•Expanded the definition of school property

•Added an expectation for essential school partners whereby they lead by example and conduct themselves in a courteous, respectful manner

•Added prohibitive conduct for engaging in cyberbullying

• Revised protocols for the discipline of students with disabilities to reflect changes in education law

• Updated sign-in procedures for visitors to align practices with our security system and district policy • Public conduct prohibited on school property now includes: removing district property or the personal property of anyone lawfully on school property; use language or gestures that are profane, lewd, vulgar or abusive; smoking or using other tobacco products on school property

• Violators of the prohibited conduct are subject to immediate ejection and/or removal



consistency of its administration.

The most substantial changes can be found in the box below. These modifications and others were presented to the community at a public hearing on May 19. School personnel, parents, students and other interested parties were invited to participate and respond to the recommended revisions. The Board of Education adopted the revised Code of Conduct at their June 9th meeting, which now obligates the District to submit the

revised Code to the Commissioner of Education within 30 days.

The District would like to publicly thank the committee members (listed below) for providing their time, effort and expertise to critically review our Code of Conduct. This updated guidance document will assist us in ensuring a safe environment for all individuals to work, play, learn and visit at our schools.
