Introducing Kelly M. Zimmerman, Superintendent of Dansville Central Schools



"As educators, we have a responsibility to prepare today's learners to face challenges in a future that is rapidly changing and evolving regardless of background or ability. Tomorrow's workplace will value individuals who can demonstrate complex problem-solving skills, critical and innovative thinking, the ability to collaborate and coordinate in teams, interface with various forms of technology, capitalize on relationships, and engage in divergent thinking. Therefore, we have an obligation to create educational systems that develop the skills our students will need, enabling them to be successful whether they choose a pathway to college or workforce careers."

Mrs. Zimmerman entered the field of education as a substitute teacher. In an effort to understand the science behind teaching and learning, and to reach as many students as possible, she became a school psychologist. After fifteen years, she became a school administrator where she served in building and district level positions, culminating in the superintendency for the past four years. Kelly prioritizes relationships and feels it is important to know one another beyond their work life – their personal values and interests – in order to best serve others.

Kelly and her husband Bob have five children. Four are adults and one is still in college. She believes in putting family first and has focused on raising their children to be kind, service-oriented, contributing members of their community. They enjoy many outdoor activities including camping, hiking, hunting, and sports. They coached their children in youth sports leagues and were active in scouting. Kelly was raised in Hornell, and still has family residing there.

"I was raised in, live in, and have spent the majority of my administrative career serving in a rural community. I have actively advocated for the needs that are unique to rural schools with a focus on preserving our lifestyle while expanding opportunities for our students to ensure equity in programming to prepare them to enter our evolving global society. In rural districts, the school is the hub of the community. We must not only meet the needs of students, but also those of their families and community as a whole."

Kelly believes that teaching and learning must be personal and individualized. Curricular and instructional decisions must be informed by multiple sources of data. Professional development must be relevant, focused, engaging, sustained, and model innovative instructional strategies. Technology must be used as a tool to enhance instruction, accelerate this way of teaching and learning, and provide access to vast resources in a global society.

She asserts that leadership and school culture lay the foundation for this transformational work in which the role of the superintendent becomes critical. The Superintendent must be an effective leader across several domains with the ability to lead and affect instructional, financial, local, regional, and organizational forces and realms. Across all areas of leadership, the superintendent must possess the ability to build trusting relationships with all stakeholders while establishing clear goals, communicating roles and responsibilities in achieving the goals, providing targeted feedback, and holding others accountable along the way; all while managing multiple daily demands and maintaining a constant focus on doing what is best for students and the district.

Kelly's administrative roles have included Superintendent, Director of Curriculum and Instruction, Director of Special Education and Student Services, Building Principal, Assistant Principal, and Assistant Director of Special Education. She has extensive experience in planning and managing budgets as well as experience with rural school district challenges and opportunities.

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She is an active advocate for the needs that are unique to rural schools and serves on the Executive Board of Directors of the Rural Schools Association of New York State. She believes that in rural districts, the school is the hub of the community, and must not only meet the needs of students, but also those of their families and community as a whole. Partnering with the community to support the schools is a key objective.

Kelly believes in leading by example. She says, "Establishing relationships, rapport, and trust takes investment, belief in others, consistency, and time. I am committed to building, strengthening and maintaining a positive climate and culture. Through times of both prosperity and

challenge, I have served as a stabilizing agent, consistently modeling integrity, optimism, commitment, and remaining forward-focused. The superintendent sets the tone through modeling, reflecting the district's values, and leading by example. While it is important to celebrate successes along the way, it is through a relentless pursuit of improvement and "taking the next step" that we experience greatness."

"I offer dedication and commitment to ensuring that the District experiences continuous success in all areas and engages in innovative instructional approaches and professional development of our faculty and staff. This will occur while maintaining important traditions and identity, educating the whole child while prioritizing community engagement and partnerships now and into the future."

As a Director of Curriculum & Instruction, Director of Special Education, Principal, and School Psychologist, she gained significant experience in models of classroom instruction, teaching and learning, special education, curriculum alignment and development, clinical supervision for teacher growth, and teaching at the post-secondary level.

and writing.


Public Use of School Facilities - Guidelines Reminder

As the weather continues to improve, we encouraged the community to use our outdoor facilities. You may enter the track and field facility using the northern gate near the parking lot and concession stand restrooms. To enter the tennis courts, please use the southeastern gate near the large storage shed.

We all share in the responsibility of taking care of our state-of-the-art facility—please report misuse of the facilities to school administration and report any vandalism to the police; encourage others to do the same so together we keep our facility fresh.

Tennis & Pickleball Courts

Public use is prohibited during the school day, whenever the facilities are in use for scheduled activities and events, and after 10:00pm. After dark and before 10:00pm guests can turn on the LED lights with the push of a button on the clearly marked post.



- Sneakers only (no spikes/cleats or heeled shoes)
- No motorized vehicles, bicycles, skateboards, rollerblades, roller skates, drones, model rockets.
- No food, gum, beverages, glass, plastics, tobacco products, vapes or any materials that may damage the surface.
- Pets are prohibited from entering. This will be strictly enforced.

Track & Field

Public use is prohibited during the school days, whenever the facilities are in use for scheduled activities and events, and after sunset.



Guest Obligations

- Please use lanes 5-8 only
- Sneakers only (no spikes/cleats or heeled shoes)
- No motorized vehicles, bicycles, skateboards, roller-blades, roller skates, drones, model rockets.
- No food, gum, beverages, glass, plastics, tobacco products, vapes or any materials that may damage the surface.

Video Surveillance: Guest safety and the protection of District properties are paramount. All of the facilities are covered by high-definition video surveillance. Activities are recorded in every corner of District property, indoors and outside, 24-hours a day, 7-days a week.

Dansville High School Seal of Civic Readiness Recipients

Congratulations to the following DHS scholars who recently earned their Seal of Civic Readiness in the first year that this distinction has been offered at Dansville High School! These students will have the seal presented on their diplomas when they graduate on June 28th:

The New York State Seal of Civic Readiness aims to encourage the study of civics and civility through experiential learning; certify attainment of civic readiness; provide

employers with a method of identifying high school graduates with skills in civics and civility; provide colleges with another way to recognize applicants seeking admission; prepare students with 21st century skills; recognize the value of Social Studies education as a means to build civic knowledge; empower students as agents of positive social change; and strengthen our diverse democracy. The Seal of Civic Readiness can also be used as a 4+1 pathway to meet New York State diploma requirements.

The Seal of Civic Readiness Committee spent the 2022-23 school year learning about the process and planning for implementation. The District had to submit an application to the New York State Education Department for approval, laying out the steps that would be taken to help students earn the required number of points to be eligible for the Seal. That approval was received late last school year, and the Seal of Civic Readiness Committee moved forward with implementation this school year. Not only do students receive the endorsement on their diploma, but earning the Seal of Civic Readiness can also serve as one of the pathway options for graduation. Congratulations to the students, and to the Seal of Civic Readiness Committee on a successful first year!





SCIENCE TECHNOLOGY ENGINEERING ARTS MATHEMATICS

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This year, we've been busy in the DPS STEAM Lab, fully immersed in the world of STEAM, covering Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math. After understanding the concept, we delved into exploration, critical thinking, and curiosity, mirroring the practices of great scientists. Throughout the year, our focus remained on online safety and respect. Here's a peek into our exciting adventures:

- At the start of the year, our young tech enthusiasts were buzzing around, learning about computer
 components and even creating their own paper computers. Meanwhile, K-2nd graders were enhancing their
 online safety skills by using Chromebooks and exploring platforms like Google Classroom, TypeTastic, and
 CodeSpark. The Pre-K Einsteins were busy expanding their vocabulary and exploring computational thinking
 through interactive activities.
- Our curious explorers uncovered the magic of simple machines, from constructing catapults to conducting gravity experiments with candies. We documented our discoveries and savored the joy of scientific exploration.
- Engaging in creative projects, students enjoyed crafting AB patterns with colorful beads and translating their names into binary code. Hands-on DIY projects, such as making snowmen and Christmas trees from nuts & bolts, honed our skills in patterns, sizes, and fine motor abilities.
- Embracing engineering creativity, we set out to design affordable and entertaining toys, from crafting wooden "robots" with recycled materials to developing captivating board games. The experience was both educational and hands-on.

Transitioning from engineering, we explored the scientific method, delving into matter and its fascinating properties. From creating fluffy slime to experimenting with dissolving packing peanuts and making elephant toothpaste vs baking soda and vinegar, our science adventures were filled with awe.

Beyond science, we engaged in hands-on activities, applying our newfound knowledge. Working with STEAM bins, we repurposed recycled materials to craft innovative creations, built structures with bricks and blocks, designed video games on CodeSpark, and improved our typing skills on TypeTastic.


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EBH Law Enforcement Day
