






A is for Awesome Art!

West Elementary students have been busy creating masterpieces. Tessellations are repeating patterns made from geometric shapes. The students used squares. All students made their own shapes. Kindergarten and first graders made texture hats/mittens. They chose items from several different textures to add to their hat/mitten, then answered the question "If my hat/mitten was made from _____(item)_____, it would feel _____(texture word)_____." Second and third grade students made repeating tessellations of rows and fourth and fifth grade students made rotating tessellations. Students in the second grade and third grade classes used texture plates to color and fourth grade students only colored in shapes to make the color wheel. Students in the fifth grade traced their shapes and then glued them in for a color wheel.




