

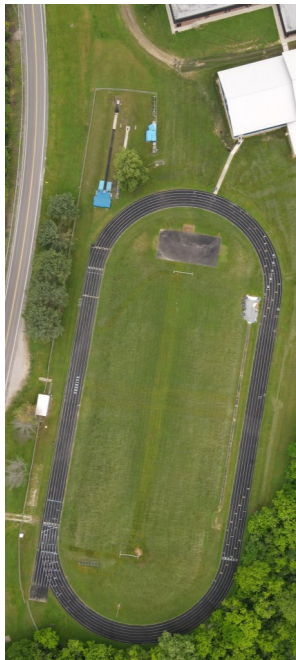

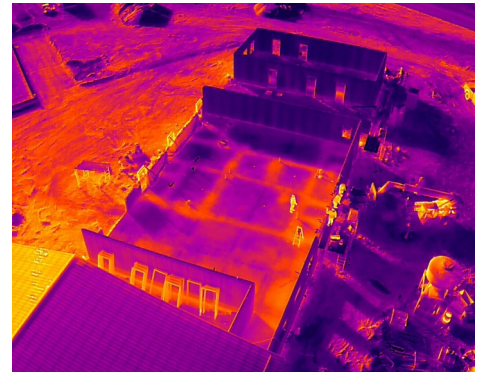

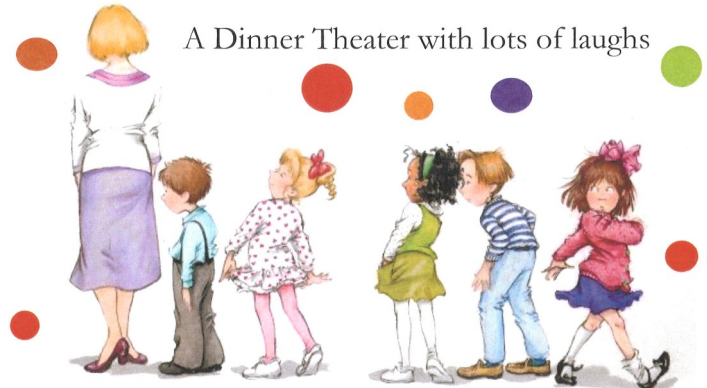

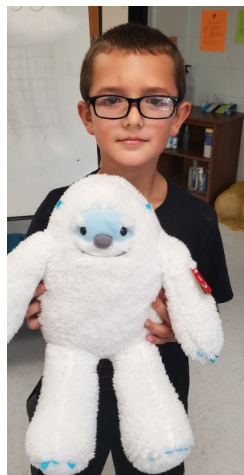

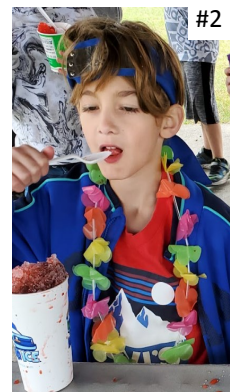

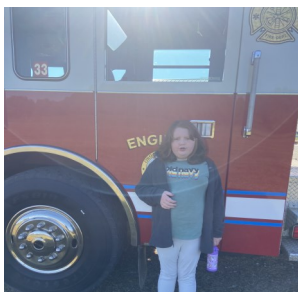

South Students are Climbing On the Walls!

The Morgan South students are literally climbing on the walls! The students are enjoying the new climbing wall that was installed the week before the school year began.

This wall isn't a traditional climbing wall that requires a climbing helmet, harness and ropes; it is a traversing wall. A traversing wall means the students climb along the wall from left to right instead of climbing up.

This is a safer way of enjoying the climbing experience without the risk of falling from a higher height. The students have a safety line that is approximately 3 to 4 feet off the mats that are under the wall. The students feet are not allowed to pass this line thus keeping them closer to the ground.

The students practice using secure hand grips and moving their feet in a lateral position not letting their legs to cross over each other. Climbing impacts all three learning domains — physical, cognitive and affective — and helps pave the path to a lifetime of physical activity.

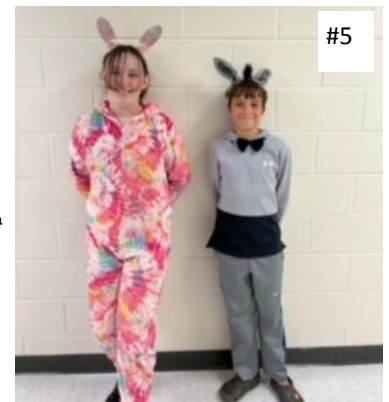
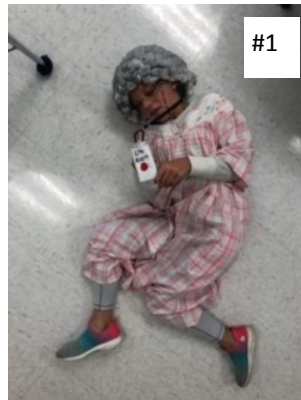
