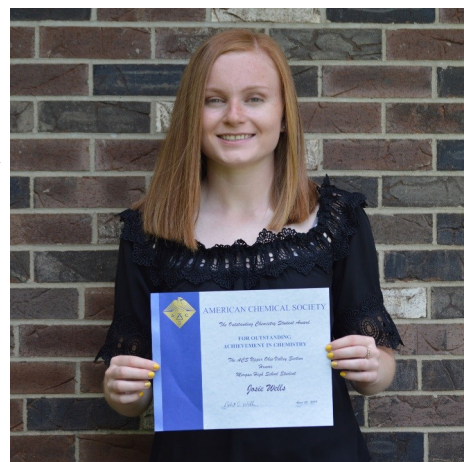

Morgan High School Band Earns Superior Rating

On Saturday, May 4th, the Morgan High School Concert Band made their way to Gahanna Lincoln High School in Gahanna, Ohio to participate in the Ohio Music Education Association (OMEA) State Large Group Adjudicated Event. At large group contests, the band receives an overall rating, determined by the average of scores from four qualified OMEA adjudicators. Three judges evaluate the performance of three pieces that the ensemble prepared, while the fourth evaluates the performance of a piece they perform after only eight minutes of studying. The band's performance was remarkable and rewarding, earning them a "Superior" rating! This is the highest honor a high school concert band can receive.

The judges commended the band's preparation and were amazed by their level of musicianship. Another state-level OMEA adjudicator was present in the performance and commented that the performance was "brilliant!" Mr. Parlin remarked, "I am very fortunate to have a group of students who trust me. They are very attentive and responsive to my cues and direction while on the podium, allowing me to act more as a sound technician than a conductor during their performances. A "Superior" rating is a very exciting way to cap off a highly successful year for this group of student musicians."

The Morgan High School Band program continues to impress across the state of Ohio. The program has performed in five state events for concert band and two for marching band in the last five years. The success of these students reflects not only their own dedication, but also the support of their families, administrators, and community. The high school band program in the Morgan Local School District is truly a gem in Southeastern Ohio.

The Morgan High School Concert Band is directed by Mr. Korey Parlin, along with Assistant Director Shayne Woodland. Congratulations to the band and their directors for earning a Superior rating!

The Wilds

This spring, Morgan Junior High School students benefited from a grant awarded to Morgan Local Schools. This project was made possible in part by the Institute of Museum and Library Services and by the Library Services and Technology Act.

The intent of the grant was to improve students' research, technology and presentation skills, to expand Morgan Junior High School library resources, and to fund a field trip to The Wilds in Cumberland, OH. Science teachers Tiffany Lanning and Jared Heagen collaborated with the district librarian, Suzanne Roberts, on the *Wild About My Library* project. All 8th graders were assigned an animal at The Wilds to research and presented their project to classmates in their science classes. On May 6th, students

visited The Wilds where they were able to view and learn more about the animals they had researched. Students couldn't have asked for a more beautiful day for the field trip. Located less than 22 miles from the school, The Wilds is the largest wildlife conservation center in North America. Nearly 10,000 acres of reclaimed mine land is home to more than 25 different species of animals, many of which are endangered. Scientists at The Wilds research and develop conservation techniques not only for animals, but for plants, pastures, and wetlands. School, public, and state libraries offer many free, valuable resources to students and community members. We especially want to thank the State Library of Ohio who administered this grant program. It was a great experience for our students!

Mr. Chip Clark, the IDEA Lab administrator at Zane State College, spoke to Mr. Lawson's technology class about how technology is growing exponentially and will be changing our lives in the next ten years. After his talk with the students, Mr. Clark presented the class with a \$300 Dr. Fuel Cell Model Car. 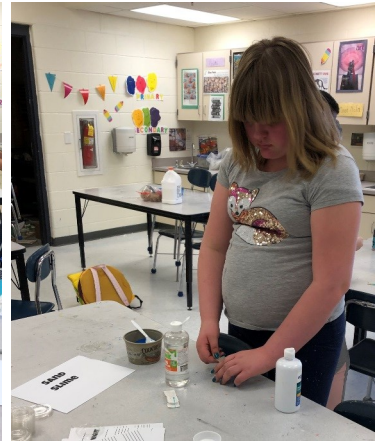

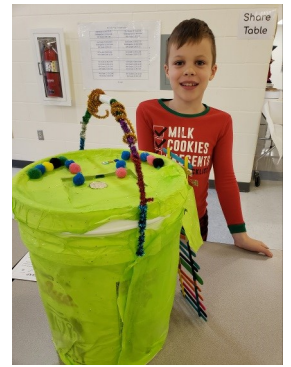
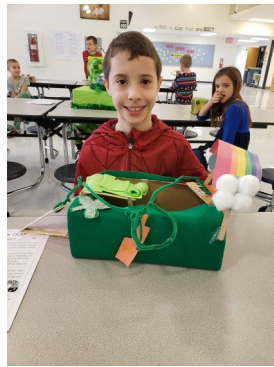
Parade of Graduates

Morgan East celebrates kindness with a student display of kindness rocks at the front entrance. Students painted and decorated rocks, which now line the flower beds at East.

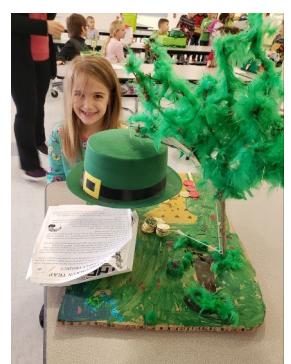

South Elementary Chess Club

It started as a simple conversation. A sixth grader asked if I would like to play him in a game of chess. Admittedly, I was rusty and he won. We had a conversation about the game and he suggested we should start a chess club. Mrs. Poling, our principal at South Elementary, jumped on board and helped me right from the start. I presented the idea to fourth, fifth, and sixth graders, and expected maybe 10 kids to join. The flyers went out and we waited for their return. In the meantime, we needed materials. The South Elementary PTO came to our rescue. They were gracious enough to buy us 15 boards with accompanying pieces. Without their help, there is no way we could have started the club. It is truly an amazing group and I can't thank them enough for all they have done for us. The permission slips started pouring in! Far more kids were signing up than I originally planned. A slight sense of panic set in. Not only had I never taught chess, but I'd never run a chess club either! As the excitement and anxiety started to percolate in my brain, lightning struck. I ran into Roger Welsh at the end of the day. I told him about the club and he immediately volunteered. Every Thursday he comes in and volunteers his time. He does an amazing job with the kids and has also helped my chess game immensely. He is just one example of the awesome community I am lucky enough to be a part of every day.

Twenty kids showed up the night of the first chess club. We started with the basics and grew from there. We watched videos and practiced openings and defenses. We wanted to keep track of how well the kids were doing so we created player cards. The cards track their wins, losses, draws, and stalemates. As they progress, they can be upgraded from a pawn all the way to a King. Each week, we had more kids show up and eager to learn how to play. We had to add chairs and tables to accommodate the expansion of players. At the end of year one, we had over thirty players and were able to purchase chess shirts for everyone!

Fast forward to year two. We now have close to sixty players! We've purchased more boards, a new crop of shirts, the Raider Youth Academy donated timers, and we held our first tournament. Thirty-four players showed up, along with at least 70 parents! All 34 tournament players were South kids! We had a double elimination bracket. The players battled for close to four hours and the top 4 players received chess boards donated to us by the Raider Youth Academy! We have Chess Club every Thursday night from 3:30 to 5 o'clock. There are kids that come from the junior high, Raider Youth Academy, and 4-6 graders at South Elementary. We hope to continue this program and add new features to incorporate the community and show off our talent. Our goal is to have two tournaments next year and possibly travel to some within the state.

This ancient game has taught these students how to use strategy and think in a way that stimulates their minds and challenges the way they think. A simple conversation with a young man has turned into one of my most cherished moments as an educator. To see students absolutely shine in this venue when they may not have felt success at school before is truly inspirational. To see their eyes light up when they become better each week and to see their determination grow is exhilarating. The excitement of being promoted and having pride in their effort to become better is second to none. I'm not sure how many 9-12 year olds know who Bobby Fischer or Magnus Carlsen are. However, I guarantee there are a bunch of young girls and boys in Stockport, Ohio, that not only know who they are, but want to play like them one day. I find this school, this community, and especially these kids, truly remarkable.

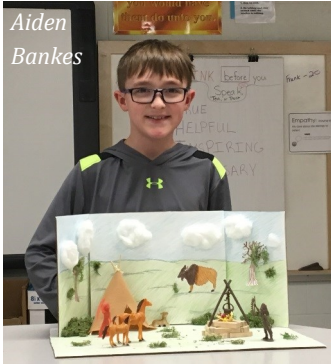
