The Morgan Lady Raiders earned their third sectional title in four years with a huge win over the Meadowbrook Colts (62-19) on February 23, 2019. The Lady Raiders then faced the Zoarville Tuscarawas Valley Lady Trojans in the district semi-finals on February 27, 2019, and came out with a 44-40 win. The Lady Raiders went on to beat the Bellaire Big Reds (46-44) for the first District win for girls basketball in school history! The Lady Raiders also set the school record for most wins in a season (17). The team advanced to the "Sweet 16" round where they fell 56-55 to the Wheelersburg Lady Pirates. Ohio SkillsUSA Regional Results

February 23, 2019 was the Southeast Regional State SkillsUSA competition in New Philadelphia. Several MHS students competed and qualified for the State Competition: Michael Scott came in third place for CNC milling; Shelby Lockwood placed second in nail care; Jalynn Vincent came in second place for esthetics; and TJ Stiers placed third in Automotive Technology. The top three placers in the regional competition move on to the State Competition, which will be held April 16th and 17th at the Columbus Convention Center. Competing in the southeast regional, MHS students were up against students from over 60 other high schools, which are partnered with at least 10 Career Technical/Joint Vocational schools. Our region ranges from Athens county, north to Knox County, east to Steubenville, and south to Meigs County. We have eight additional students participating at the state level. These students do not have to qualify; this is due to a lower number of competitors in their field or event. These contests are referred to as *Straight to State Contests*. 

MATHCOUNTS

Morgan Junior High sent 12 eighth grade students to the OUZ campus on February 8th to compete in their very first MATHCOUNTS competition. MATHCOUNTS' mission is to provide engaging math programs and competitions to US middle school students of all ability levels to build confidence and improve attitudes towards math and problem solving. The Competition Series consists of four levels: school, chapter, state, and national. Morgan students competed at the chapter level, which was comprised of four rounds: Sprint, Target, Team, and Countdown. Each student competed individually in the Sprint and Target Rounds which consisted of over 110 students from 11 surrounding districts. Four students then went on to work together in the Team Round. The final round of the day was the Countdown Round where the top 12 individually scored students compete against each other to determine an overall *Mathlete*. Morgan's team of four finished fourth in the Team Round and Madisen Guinn finished individually in the top 12!

NEW TECHNOLOGY AT MORGAN JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL

Mr. Mike Lawson, technology teacher at Morgan Junior High School, has worked many hours to develop a highly engaging technology program. The students now have 14 drones, 12 Lego robots, six 3-D printers, and ten HD web cameras that will be used with green screens to edit student videos.

Beginning this second semester, Mr. Lawson is offering an advanced course for about 24 eighth grade students. These students will learn how to add video to PowerPoints, use block code to fly drones through gates, program robots to perform various tasks, and will learn the techniques for editing music and sound. They will also use Music Maker and Audacity to add music to their narration on PowerPoint. Furthermore, by using video-editing software, they will be able to put themselves in places they have never been before.

It was originally called "Jump-Rope-A-Thon" and was adopted the next year in 1979, by the American Heart Association.

Forty years later, "Jump-Rope-For-Heart" is now a nationwide event that raises money for heart research and education. Clayton Blackburn stated, "I like to jump rope to improve my jumping skills and to raise money for heart research." We dance together and stay in touch through FaceTime a lot."






