MORGAN WRESTLERS VISIT WITH OSU HEAD WRESTLING COACH TOM RYAN

On February 6, Morgan's wrestlers had the "once in a lifetime" opportunity to meet and talk with the top wrestling coach in the country. The Ohio State University Head Wrestling Coach Tom Ryan recently earned the 2015 Big Ten Wrestling Coach of the Year and the 2015 NCAA Wrestling Coach of the Year Awards for his dedication, hard work and of course for his team's accomplishment as both the Big Ten Champion Team and the NCAA Champions!

Morgan's wrestlers visited the OSU Training Facility in Columbus where they talked with Coach Ryan and met several state and national wrestling champions. The students were able to watch the OSU and Minnesota wrestlers warming up before the big match. They were also able to try out equipment and talk with the wrestlers. The students were even permitted to try on the famed Spartan Helmet that was won by National Wrestling Champion Logan Steiber at the All Star Match between the number one and number two ranked wrestlers in the country. Logan won the helmet when he earned the outstanding wrestler award for that night and was crowned "Best of the Best". Coach Ryan stated, "The Spartan Helmet represents the true warrior and all the labels that go along with someone who lives a life of hard work, courage and discipline. To win this helmet is a true honor." The Ohio State University keeps the helmet on display at the OSU Training Facility. A very excited group of Morgan students enjoyed the "behind the scenes" look at the OSU Athletic Program.

After the tour and talk with Coach Ryan, the Morgan wrestlers and coaches were given tickets to attend the OSU vs. Minnesota Wrestling Match at the Schottenstein Center. The students were excited about watching the top state and national wrestlers (including Logan Steiber) and cheering on OSU to a big victory over Minnesota. They also enjoyed spotting the famous OSU football players and coaches at the event including OSU Coach Luke Fickell and players Ezekiel Elliott and Joey Bosa. After the match, the students were treated to a photo opportunity on the OSU Wrestling Mat. "Morgan Local School District is extremely grateful to the anonymous former Morgan High School Graduate for providing this wonderful opportunity for the Morgan Wrestling Teams. Dear Parent,
Your question is very timely. We are required by State Law to have school in session for 1001 hours each year. Since we have missed 16 days we are required by State Law to have school in session until we make up the hours of instruction we have missed. We can do this by lengthening the school day, adding school days on Saturday or holidays, and/or extending the school year into June if necessary.

Since extra school days were already built into our school calendar, and an extra one half hour was added beginning February 9, we only need 4 extra days to meet our required hours.

Assuming we have no more snow days, we can complete our required hours and not need to go into June by adding the following days:

Saturday, March 21
Easter Break Monday, April 6
Saturday, April 18
Tuesday, May 26

All about Testing: PARCC, Common Core, OGT

Rigorous standards, geared to college and career readiness, drive learning in every classroom across the State of Ohio. In June 2010, the Ohio State Board of Education adopted new learning standards in English language arts and mathematics, based on a multi-state effort known as Common Core. Ohio also wrote and adopted new learning standards in science, social studies, fine arts, world languages, and several other subjects, but these are not part of the Common Core.

Testing of these new standards started last month for all subjects. Testing for English language arts and mathematics (based on the new Common Core standards) is conducted by PARCC (Partnership for Assessment of Readiness for College and Careers). This is a group of states working together to develop a set of assessments that measure whether students are on track to be successful in college and in their careers. Social Studies and Science tests were developed by AIR (American Institutes for Research). This is an independent not-for-profit organization that provides large-scale state assessments services to many states, including Ohio.

Students at the high school level will participate in new Ohio testing for End of Course exams. This year's 10th grade students will be the last class who will take the current OGT (Ohio Graduation Test).

Testing began last week across the state. Students in grades 4-8 may be tested in ELA, math, social studies and science, this varies by grade level. High school freshmen will be tested in English, Algebra or Geometry and American History. Other tests will be phased in over the next couple of years. Testing is in two phases. The first is a performance based-test that requires students to perform tasks and write to show what they know. The final phase of testing for the year will take place during the last month of school. This test will be more like the previous testing, primarily multiple choice and short written answers. Then, the two testing phases will be combined for a total testing score for the year. Results for this year's testing will not be available until the fall as there is much work to be done to set standards for the testing levels. After this year, parents should know by the time school is out how their children did on Ohio's State tests. In the past, results were not available until mid to late summer.

The biggest change for students is that all tests will be taken on-line. In interviewing students who participated in field testing last year, the majority of Morgan students prefer to take the tests on-line. "It is interesting to see how our students have adapted to the changes technology brings to our classrooms. Even our youngest students love having a device in their hands while they are working and learning. We are making great progress with meeting the needs of our students as we prepare them for the future", stated Susan Troutner, Director of Curriculum and Instruction for the district.

Kindergarten Registration Under Way

Morgan Local Schools Announces Changes to Kindergarten Registration Process for the 2015-2016 School Year.

Enrollment packets will be available at the District Office, located at 65W. Union Avenue, on March 11th. Packets are also available on-line at www.mlsd.k12.oh.us by clicking on the Kindergarten registration link; at the local elementary buildings; and at local pre-schools. All packets are to be returned to Leslie Robbins at the District Office prior to April 15th.

At the time packets are returned the registering parent/guardian will need to supply the following: *a certified copy of the birth certificate; * immunization record; *social security card; *any existing custody papers; *proof of residence (such as a utility bill), and *a photo ID of the person registering the student.

The District Office will be open during regular business hours for registration from 8:30am – 4:30pm Monday through Friday. In addition, the office will process enrollment forms on the following Wednesday evenings till 7:00pm: March 18th, March 25th; April 1st; April 8th; and April 15th. We will also be open on two Saturdays from 8:00 am to Noon: March 21st and April 11th.

When the packet is returned, the parent/guardian will be able to make an appointment for the student's screening during the week of April 27th. Early morning, day time and evening appointments will be available. Screening will take approximately an hour.

Registration will be complete after this process is finished. Parents are invited to attend school with their child for one-half day when school begins in August. Students whose last name begins with A-M will attend on Wednesday, August 19th and not on August 20th. Students whose last name begins with N-Z will attend for their first day on Thursday, August 20th, and all kindergarten students will attend beginning Friday, August 21st.

Sponsored Silence

On Wednesday March, 25 2015 students and faculty of South Elementary will be raising awareness and funding for individuals in the school district who rely on AAC (augmentative and alternative communication). Augmentative and alternative communication includes all forms of communication (other than oral speech) that are used to express thoughts, needs, wants, and ideas. Any person with a disability that makes it difficult for them to communicate may benefit from AAC. AAC is commonly used with individuals with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, ALS and Parkinson's disease. AAC can include sign language and gestures, pictures and picture boards, as well as high tech devices such as iPads and VOCAs (voice output communication aids).

South teachers and students will be raising awareness for AAC use by trying different AAC devices currently being used in the district, using AAC systems to produce the announcements and holding a one minute silence to increase public awareness of the importance of communication and the profound impact and isolation that can occur when communication is disrupted or completely lost. Donations made during the event will go to funding new devices and maintaining older AAC systems for students in the district. Sponsored Silence events will be occurring at each building during the months of February and March. Morgan Students Earn College Credit Through Dual Enrollment



Mr. Wilcoxon teaches his own Morgan class college English Composition while at the same time teaching a Crooksville class the same course over Interactive Video Distance Learning (IVDL). Morgan also reciprocates with Crooksville teachers, teaching Morgan students over the same system. By sharing courses in this manner with other school districts it is possible to offer a complete sequence of courses that will apply to the college work for a professional career, or at least to earn the credit hours for the first year of basic college courses required of all college students. Some students who enter the program early enough will have the opportunity to complete two years of college work and graduate from Morgan with an Associates Degree.
