DANSVILLE CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

Dear Community Member,

School budgets, like household budgets, are determined by priorities. A district must do everything it can to provide a high quality education to its students while keeping in mind the very real financial implications a school budget places on families and community members. The Superintendent and the Board of Education must balance the educational needs of its students while remaining fiscally responsible to taxpayers.

With these mandates in mind, this year Dansville finds itself in a difficult financial position. Due to the COVID pandemic, the District, with the best of intentions, provided additional programming and resources for the past several years in an attempt to offer its students more courses, to reduce the number of students in classes, to provide more supports, and to increase mental health services. While these additions have proved helpful, the accumulated costs associated with these additions have exceeded State Aid funding and the local tax levy; the two main revenue sources of the District. Therefore, Dansville must begin to restructure administration, faculty, and support staff personnel to align with the funding reality with which it is faced. The District will continue to provide excellent educational opportunities for all of its students. While there are some reductions in programming and resources, Dansville will continue to meet all State and Federal laws, regulations, and mandates as it has always done, but unfortunately, with fewer personnel.

This budget includes a \$100,000 capital outlay project for minor building renovations and site work in the District. Dansville receives 89.6% aid on every dollar spent on a capital outlay project.

The District has a proposition to purchase four buses to replace older buses and to replace aging utility vehicles and equipment, which is used to maintain the facilities and property. This proposition has nothing to do with personnel costs. Dansville receives 86.4% aid on every dollar spent on transportation vehicles.

The proposed 2024-25 budget balances student needs with the ability of the community to fund its schools. The estimated increase to the tax levy is 1.99%. This generates an additional \$181,270 in revenue. District residents who have lived here for 30 days and who are 18 or older are asked to vote on Tuesday, May 21, 2024 in person or by absentee ballot. Should the proposed budget be defeated pursuant to Section 2023 of the Education Law, the District shall remove all salary increases for management confidential employees and any civil service employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement. All equipment not instructionally necessary or for health and safety shall be removed to arrive at the contingent budget.

STAR Eligibility

The eligibility criteria are the same for both the STAR credit and the STAR property tax exemption. You cannot receive both the credit and the exemption.

Eligible types of property include houses, condominiums, cooperative apartments, manufactured homes, farm houses and mixed-use properties, including apartment buildings (but only the owner-occupied portion).

Determining Your Primary Residence*

Some factors that help determine whether a property is your primary residence include voting, vehicle registrations, and length of time spent each year on the property. The Tax Department may also request proof of residency.

Income Eligibility **

Income eligibility for the 2024 STAR credit is based on federal or state income tax return information from the 2022 tax year. Income eligibility for the 2025 STAR credit is based on federal or state income tax return information from the 2023 tax year.

Special Eligibility Rules

Nursing home residents. If you own your home, you're eligible for Basic or Enhanced STAR, as long as no one other than the co-owner or spouse resides there.

Trusts. If you're a trust beneficiary who conveyed your home to trustees but continues to live in the home, you get the STAR benefit. For example, a senior creates a trust and conveys her home to her children as trustees. If she remains in the home as the beneficiary of the trust, she is considered the homeowner and gets the STAR benefit.

Life estates. Under a life estate, one party has a "life tenancy" (ownership for the rest of his or her life) and another party will become the owner after the life tenant dies. For exemption purposes, the life tenant is deemed to own the property; so STAR eligibility is based on the life tenant's qualifications.


Comparison: How do per pupil expenditures compare?

Maintenance Vehicles

With voter approval of Proposition 2, the District will purchase one dump truck with a v-plow at an estimated cost of \$88,000 and one multi purpose front mower at an estimated cost of \$47,000. This will allow the District to continue the maintenance vehicle and equipment replacement plan that we developed in 2021-22.

School Buses

With voter approval of Proposition 2, the District will continue to execute its 8-year bus replacement schedule and purchase one 7-8 passenger vehicle, one 30 passenger bus and three 74 passenger school buses. The 30 passenger bus will replace one of our older model Chevy Minotours which will have over 100,000 miles by the end of this school year. The three 74 passenger school buses will replace some of the older buses in our fleet. The buses that are being replaced will be sold at auction or traded in when the new buses arrive.

The purpose of the replacement schedule is to ensure the safety of our students, drivers, and bus attendants, and to decrease the amount of vehicle maintenance that is needed. Our goal is to purchase approximately 5 vehicles each year so that we can keep our costs and revenue consistent. When our transportation costs and revenue fluctuate significantly, it makes budgeting for school buses more challenging. It is important to note that the District receives approximately 86.4% back from the State for each dollar that is spent on transportation vehicles.

PROPOSITION 1: 2024-25 School Budget

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to expend the sum of \$40,853,725 for the school budget for the 2024-25 school year and to levy the necessary tax on the taxable property of the school district.

PROPOSITION 2: Purchase School Buses and Vehicles

Shall the following resolution be adopted?:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to undertake the acquisition of school buses at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$787,000, one dump truck at an estimated maximum cost of \$88,000, and one multi-purpose front mower at an estimated maximum cost of \$47,000, all at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$922,000, less trade-in value, if any, and to appropriate and expend from the existing bus purchase reserve fund \$195,000 for such costs, and that the balance of such costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments; and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the school district as may be necessary not to exceed \$727,000 shall be issued, or the School District may enter into an installment purchase contract if the Board of Education determines that it is in the best interest of the School District to finance the purchase in that method.

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Dansville Central School District 2024-2025 Proposed Budget, Proposition and Election

PROPOSITION #1: Proposed Budget

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to expend the sum of \$40,853,725 for the school budget for the 2024-25 school year and to levy the necessary tax on the taxable property of the school district.

PROPOSITION #2: Purchase School Buses & Vehicles

Shall the following resolution be adopted?:

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to undertake the acquisition of school buses at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$787,000, one dump truck at an estimated maximum cost of \$88,000, and one multi-purpose front mower at an estimated maximum cost of \$47,000, all at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$922,000, less trade-in value, if any, and to appropriate and expend from the existing bus purchase reserve fund \$195,000 for such costs, and that the balance of such costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments; and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the school district as may be necessary not to exceed \$727,000 shall be issued, or the School District may enter into an installment purchase contract if the Board of Education determines that it is in the best interest of the School District to finance the purchase in that method.
