The School Budget Vote will be held on Tuesday, May 15 in the High School Gymnasium Foyer from 8:00am to 8:00pm. Enter at the Mustang.

You will be voting on the annual school district budget for the 2018-19 school year, a capital reserve, the purchase of school buses and three (3) Board of Education seats.

This year Dansville will be using scanned ballots.



Dear Parents, Students and Community Members,

Dansville students continue to thrive. The wide array of learning opportunities existing throughout the District may surprise some but certainly not students, recent grads and parents. From three year old pre-kindergarten through 12th grade our children enjoy experiences rivaling those offered anywhere. We work hard to level the playing field for our kids and they are reaping the benefits of a 1st class education.

Our 2018-19 budget will be almost \$3 million less than this year's. The decrease is due to reduced debt. We've eliminated most of our debt from past construction projects we will see a proportional decrease in state building aid.

Finding a balance between fiscal prudence and educational prosperity is a responsibility that we take seriously. We reduce spending where appropriate and increase when needed. For 2018-19 this means a measured staffing reduction and an increase in spending for safety.

Specifically, there will be a reduction in the number of special education teaching positions due to changes in the population of students with disabilities. We also plan to reduce a high school social studies position by attrition. On the flip side we're increasing spending for safety and security (two way radio communication improvements) and we are maintaining \$100,000 for capital improvements to address site work. Adult education has been very popular and we modestly increased that budget as well.

Proposition 1 enacts the 2018-19 school budget. Proposition 2 asks voters to authorize a second capital reserve for future improvements to buildings and grounds. Proposition 3 permits the District to replace five large buses and one small bus.

The proposed 2018-19 budget balances educational opportunity and safety with fiscal restraint. Thank you for reading the budget newsletter and please call me with questions and comments.





Instructional expenditures for general education are K-12 expenditures for classroom instruction (excluding special education) plus a proration of building level administrative and instructional support expenditures. These expenditures include amounts for instruction of students with disabilities in a general-education setting. District expenditures, such as transportation, debt service and district-wide administration are not included.

The pupil count for general education is K-12 average daily membership plus K-2 pupils for whom the district pays tuition to another school district. This number represents all pupils, including those classified as having disabilities and those not classified, excluding only students with disabilities placed out of district. Pupils resident in the district but attending a charter school are included. For districts in which a county jail is located, this number includes incarcerated youth to whom the district must provide an education program.

Instructional expenditures for special education are K-12 expenditures for students with disabilities (including summer special education expenditures) plus a proration of building-level administrative and instructional support expenditures. District expenditures, such as transportation, debt service and district-wide administration are not included.

The pupil count for special education is a count of K-12 students with disabilities for the 2015-2016 school year plus students for whom the district receives tuition from another district plus students for whom the district pays tuition to another district. Students attending the State schools at Rome and Batavia, private placements and out-of-state placements are included.

Instructional expenditures per pupil is the simple arithmetic ratio of instruction expenditures to pupils. The total cost of instruction for students with disabilities may include both general and special education expenditures. Special education services provided in the general education classroom may benefit student not classified as having disabilities.

Total expenditures per pupil is the simple arithmetic ratio of total expenditures to pupils. Total expenditures include district expenditures for class-room instruction, as well as expenditures for transportation, debt service, community service and district-wide administration that are not included in the instructional expenditure values for general education and special education. As such, the sum of general education and special education instructional expenditures does not equal the total expenditures.

Information About Students with Disabilities (2016-2017)

Commissioner's Regulations require reporting students with disabilities by the percent of time they are in general education classrooms and the classification rate of students with disabilities. These data are to be compared with percentages for similar districts and all public schools. The required percentages for this district are reported below.

The source data for the statistics in this table were reported through the Student Information Repository System (SIRS) and verified in Verification Report 5. The counts are numbers of students reported in the least restrictive environment categories for school-age programs (ages 6-21) on BEDS Day, which is the first Wednesday of the reporting year. The percentages represent the amount of time students with disabilities are in general-education classrooms, regardless of the amount and cost of special-education services they receive. Rounding of percentage values may cause them to sum to a number slightly different from 100%.

This rate is a ratio of the count of school-age students with disabilities (ages 4-21) to the total enrollment of all school-age students in the school district, including students who are parentally placed in nonpublic schools located in the school district. The numerator includes all school-age students for whom a district has Committee on Special Education (CSE) responsibility to ensure the provision of special-education services. The denominator includes all school-age students who reside in the district. In the case of parentally placed students in non-public schools, it includes the number of students who attend the nonpublic schools located in the school district. Source data are drawn from the SIRS and from the Basic Education Data System (BEDS).

STAR Eligibility

The eligibility criteria are the same for both the STAR credit and the STAR property tax exemption. You can't receive both the credit and the exemption.

Eligible types of property include houses, condominiums, cooperative apartments, manufactured homes, and farm houses mixed-use properties, including apartment buildings (but only the owner-occupied portion).

Determining Your Primary Residence

Some factors that help determine whether a property is your primary residence include voting, vehicle registrations, and length of time spent each year on the property. The Tax Department may also request proof of residency.

Income Eligibility

Eligibility in 2017 is based on income information from the 2015 tax year. Income means federal "adjusted gross income" minus the "taxable amount" of total distributions from individual retirement accounts or individual retirement annuities (IRA's).

Special Eligibility Rules

Surviving spouses. You can retain an existing Enhanced STAR benefit if you're at least 62 years old as of December 31 in the year the benefit will continue. Otherwise, you may receive the Basic STAR benefit.

Nursing home residents. If you own your home, you're eligible for Basic or Enhanced STAR, as long as no one other than the co-owner or spouse resides there.

Trusts. If you're a trust beneficiary who conveyed your home to trustees but continues to live in the home, you get the STAR benefit. For example, a senior creates a trust and conveys her home to her children as trustees. If she remains in the home as the beneficiary of the trust, she is considered the homeowner and gets the STAR benefit.

Life estates. Under a life estate, one party has a "life tenancy" (ownership for the rest of his or her life) and another party will become the owner after the life tenant dies. For exemption purposes, the life tenant is deemed to own the property; so STAR eligibility is based on the life tenant's qualifications.

School Board Candidates

Community Service: I bring an extensive appreciation for the difficulties encountered by our very proud and professional staff. I have served as the treasurer for both the Dansville Public Library and the Daniel Goho Post 87, The American Legion. In this capacity I have been deeply involved in budget preparation and the monitoring of spending within a budget. I have been treasurer for each organization during major renovations.

What skills will you bring with you as a BOE member? I have served on the Dansville Board of Education for 8 years-the past 6 as vice president. I have served on the audit, policy and transportation committees. This service has given me the opportunity to learn different aspects of the operation of the school district.

What are the greatest challenges facing the District? The greatest challenge I see is trying to provide an equitable education for our students that allows them to compete with graduates of wealthier schools. The inequity of public support given to rural schools by New York State prevents us from offering the vast number of course selections available in wealthy suburban districts. Yet, our students are expected to compete when applying for college entrance or in the work place. Apathy toward education and the workings of the school affect our schools. Since I have been on the Board of Education, I have been disappointed by the lack of interest in our schools. When Board meetings are centered on the develop-

ment of a multimillion dollar budget, and with the exception of government students (who are there because of course requirements) and school administrators, the hall is almost empty. I get upset. Especially during "budget season", but also throughout the year, the public should take an active part.

What is your Occupation? I am a retired mathematics teacher with 35 years in the classroom. Simultaneously, I served in the New York Army National Guard.

<u>Family?</u> I am married to my wife and partner of 52 years, Mary. We have two children, Patrick and Leah, who are both graduates of Dansville Central School, and presently reside within the district with their families. I have two grandchildren who attend Dansville High School.

Community Service: I have served on the Dansville Board of Education since 2002. During that time I have been on the Finance, Audit, and Facilities committees as well as a member of the BOCES board for 5 years. I am a member of the Board of Trustees of the Dansville Public Library, a member of the combined Village and Town Zoning Board of Appeals, and an active volunteer with the New York State Festival of Balloons committee.

What skills will you bring with you as a BOE member? During my tenure on the Dansville Board of Education we have had successes and struggles. 

DHS Art Students Have Talent!



Proposition 3 asks the voters to approve the purchase five propane powered 66-passenger school buses and one 30 passenger school bus for transporting students.

Propane powered buses have proven to be very cost efficient and reliable and will increase the number of propane powered buses from 4 to 9.

The reviews have been very positive and these vehicles climb hills with more power than similar gas or diesel powered engines. The propane fuel is currently less expensive and emits less carbon into the atmosphere than gasoline and diesel powered school buses.

Proposed Budget and Propositions

2018-2019 PROPOSED BUDGET

PROPOSITION #1: Proposed Budget

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to expend a sum of \$31,264,658 for the school budget for the 2018-2019 school year and to levy the necessary tax on the taxable property of the school district on May 15, 2018.

PROPOSITION #2: Establish Capital Reserve Fund

RESOLVED, that in accordance with Education Law section 3651, the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to establish a Capital Reserve Fund, to be designated "2018 Capital Reserve Fund," to defray the cost of construction and reconstruction of School District buildings, facilities and grounds, including original equipment, machinery, apparatus, appurtenances, furnishings, and other incidental improvements and expenses in connection therewith, in an ultimate amount not to exceed Ten Million Dollars (\$10,000,000.00) plus accrued interest and other investment earnings. The 2018 Capital Reserve Fund shall have a probable term of ten (10) years. The Board of Education is further authorized to pay into the 2018 Capital Reserve Fund in the 2017-2018 school year and annually thereafter funds from the School District's available funds balance, State aid reimbursement to the School District on account of capital projects, such other monies as the voters may direct, and other legally available funds of the School District in an amount determined by the Board of Education up to the maximum authorized amount.


PROPOSITION #3: Purchase School Buses

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to undertake the acquisition of five (5) 66 passenger school buses, and one (1) 30 passenger bus, at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$675,600, less trade-in value, if any, and to appropriate and expend from the existing bus purchase reserve fund \$67,600 for such costs, and that the balance of such costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments, and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the school district as may be necessary not to exceed \$608,000 shall be issued, or the school district may enter into an installment purchase contract if the Board of Education determines that it is in the best interest of the school district to finance the purchase in that method.
