Dear School Community Members,

DCS students are enriched each day with creative and interesting opportunities to learn, lead and succeed. Whether the learning takes place in the classroom, through athletics, musicals, speech improvement, special programs, gaming clubs or on field trips, we work to ensure that DCS students can compete with the best and brightest from anywhere in NY. Our students' education is an investment in the future and in this newsletter, the District presents the 2023-24 budget plan that makes it all happen.

The annual budget referendum will be held in the DHS gymnasium foyer from 8:00am to 8:00pm on Tuesday, May 16, 2023. In addition to the school budget, voters are asked to authorize the purchase of school buses and maintenance vehicles in Proposition Two and to select three Board members.

Through a careful budget development process, the District identified cost saving measures without reducing student programming. We discontinued positions where it made sense to do so. We added special education teachers and a behavior interventionist based upon students' needs. We added a pre-kindergarten teacher due to increased PK enrollment. The budget also includes a capital outlay of \$100,000 to complete minor building renovations and site work.

Revenue had been more challenging to predict during budget development due to the late State budget. Using conservative estimates, we based revenue projections on the Governor's Executive Budget Proposal. Our Foundation Aid from NYS is estimated to increase by 8% due to inflation. Foundation Aid plus other NYS funding accounts for approximately two-thirds of the District's total revenue. The remaining third comes from property taxes, rent, earned interest, PILOTS, refunds and District reserves.

District reserves are an important source of funding but they are finite. We add to and remove money from reserves each year to balance our budget. Our savings goal, like most businesses, is to always add more to savings than we take out. This money is then available for renovations, emergency expenses or future revenue. At the end of next year when federal pandemic monies dry up, our reserves will help to protect programs.

The 2023-24 budget is up 2.3%. The budget minimizes the impact on taxpayers with a 1.16% increase to the levy while ensuring we meet the educational needs of our students. Details of the budget and required communications are presented in the pages that follow. Please call me to answer any budget questions or share your thoughts on this budget.

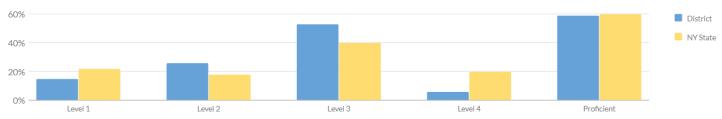

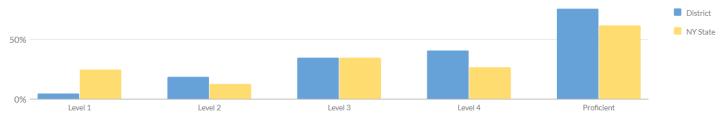
ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN PHYSICAL SETTING/PHYSICS (2021-22)



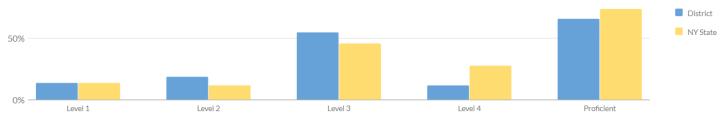
ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN PHYSICAL SETTING/CHEMISTRY (2021-22)



ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN PHYSICAL SETTING/EARTH SCIENCE (2021-22)



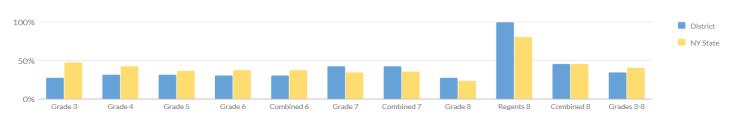
ANNUAL REGENTS EXAMINATION IN LIVING ENVIRONMENT (2021-22)

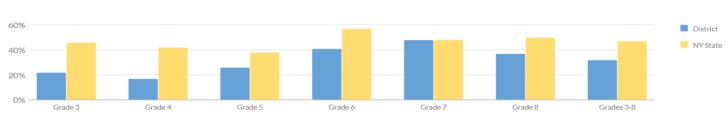

STAR Eligibility

The eligibility criteria are the same for both the STAR credit and the STAR property tax exemption. You can't receive both the credit and the exemption.

Eligible types of property include houses, condominiums, cooperative apartments, manufactured homes, farm houses and mixed-use properties, including apartment buildings (but only the owner-occupied portion).

Determining Your Primary Residence*

Some factors that help determine whether a property is your primary residence include voting, vehicle registrations, and length of time spent each year on the property. The Tax Department may also request proof of residency.

Income Eligibility **

Income eligibility for the 2022 STAR credit is based on federal or state income tax return information from the 2020 tax year. Income eligibility for the 2023 STAR credit is based on federal or state income tax return information from the 2021 tax year.

Special Eligibility Rules

Nursing home residents. If you own your home, you're eligible for Basic or Enhanced STAR, as long as no one other than the co-owner or spouse resides there.

Trusts. If you're a trust beneficiary who conveyed your home to trustees but continues to live in the home, you get the STAR benefit. For example, a senior creates a trust and conveys her home to her children as trustees. If she remains in the home as the beneficiary of the trust, she is considered the homeowner and gets the STAR benefit.

Life estates. Under a life estate, one party has a "life tenancy" (ownership for the rest of his or her life) and another party will become the owner after the life tenant dies. For exemption purposes, the life tenant is deemed to own the property; so STAR eligibility is based on the life tenant's qualifications.

Board of Education Update on the Superintendent Search

Dr. Paul Alioto announced in November that he will retire at the end of 2023. He has led our district as Superintendent of Schools since July 2010. His commitment to remain here has brought continuity to the District that had not been established in many years. Consistency in this crucial leadership role has allowed Dansville to hire and retain an administrative team that is committed to moving the District forward.

The Board of Education is grateful to Dr. Alioto for his 13 years of service in Dansville. We also appreciate the fact that he has given us ample time to find his replacement in an organized and thoughtful manner. The Board of Education has appointed Genesee Valley BOCES Superintendent Kevin MacDonald as our consultant in the search for a new Superintendent of Schools. He and his staff have assisted with more than 20 searches in our BOCES region. We are confident they will guide us to create and carry out a process that culminates in the appointment of a superintendent who will lead Dansville for many years.

The Board has established a tentative timeline for the search. This process will include surveying staff and the community regarding the experiences and qualities they look for in a superintendent. The link to that survey can be found at the bottom of this article. This link can also be found on our school webpage.

Our plan is to have finalists selected and invited to interview in Dansville in mid to late September. We intend to have all stakeholder groups participate in interviewing the final candidates. This includes students, parents, employees, and community members.

Brian Applin

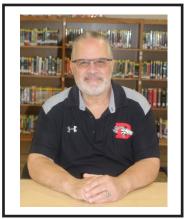

Maintenance Vehicles

With voter approval of Proposition 2, the District will purchase two 3/4 ton maintenance pickup trucks with v-plows. This will allow us to continue the maintenance vehicle replacement plan that we developed last year. Our plan continues to be to purchase these vehicles at the New York State Contract price, which is currently approximately \$55,000 per truck. We plan to keep them for three years and then sell them at auction. Although we cannot predict the future, trends show that we can auction them at or near the original New York State Contract purchase price and replace them.

School Buses

With voter approval of Proposition 2, the District will continue to execute its 8-year bus replacement schedule and purchase one 30 passenger bus and three 74 passenger school buses. The 30 passenger bus will replace one of our older model Chevy Minotours which will have over 100,000 miles by the end of this school year. The three 74 passenger school buses will replace some of the older buses in our fleet. The buses that are being replaced will be sold at auction or traded in when the new buses arrive.

The purpose of the replacement schedule is to ensure the safety of our students, drivers, and bus attendants, and to decrease the amount of vehicle maintenance that is needed. Our goal is to purchase approximately 4-5 vehicles each year so that we can keep our costs and revenue consistent. When our transportation costs and revenue fluctuate significantly, it makes budgeting for school buses more challenging. It is important to note that the District receives approximately \$0.87 back from the State for each dollar that is spent on transportation vehicles.

PROPOSITION 1: 2023-24 SCHOOL BUDGET

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to expend the sum of \$39,554,735 for the school budget for the 2023-24 school year and to levy the necessary tax on the taxable property of the school district.

PROPOSITION 2: PURCHASE SCHOOL BUSES & VEHICLES

Shall the following resolution be adopted?:

Resolved that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to undertake the acquisition of school buses and vehicles, at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$795,000, and to appropriate and expend from the existing bus purchase reserve fund \$185,000 for such costs, and that the balance of such costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments; and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the school district as may be necessary not to exceed \$610,000 shall be issued, or the School District may enter into an installment purchase contract if the Board of Education determines that it is in the best interest of the School District to finance the purchase in that method.

Guest Responsibilities

With access to school facilities come shared responsibilities. These responsibilities include reporting misuse of facilities to school administration, reporting vandalism to the police, caring for the facilities and encouraging others to do the same.



Video Surveillance

Guest safety and protection of District properties are primary concerns. All of the facilities are covered by high definition video surveillance. Activities are being recorded in every corner of District property, indoors and outside 24 hours a day, seven days a week.



Tennis & Pickleball Courts

Guest Hours

- Summer (July & August): 7 days/week from sunrise to 10:00 PM.
- Fall (September November):
 - Monday through Friday from 3:30 PM to 10:00 PM and weekends/holidays from sunrise to 10:00 PM.
- Winter (December February and weather permitting):
 - Monday through Friday from 3:30 PM to 10:00 PM and weekends/holidays from sunrise to 10:00 PM.
- Spring (March June):
 - Monday through Friday from 5:30 PM to 10:00 PM and weekends/holidays from sunrise to 10:00 PM except when in use by the District for scheduled activities and events.

Public use is prohibited during the school day, whenever the facilities are in use for scheduled activities and events and after 10:00 PM. After dark and before 10:00 PM, guests can turn on the LED lights with the push of a button on a clearly marked post.

Guest Obligations

- No motorized vehicles, bicycles, skateboards, rollerblades, roller skates, drones, model rockets.
- No food, gum, beverages, glass, plastics, tobacco products, vapes or any materials that may damage the surface.
- Pets are prohibited from entering. This will be strictly enforced.

Dansville Central School District 2023-2024 Proposed Budget, Proposition and Election

PROPOSITION #1: Proposed Budget

RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to expend the sum of \$39,554,735 for the school budget for the 2023-24 school year and to levy the necessary tax on the taxable property of the school district.

PROPOSITION #2: Purchase School Buses & Vehicles

Shall the following resolution be adopted?:

Resolved that the Board of Education of the Dansville Central School District is hereby authorized to undertake the acquisition of school buses and vehicles, at an estimated maximum aggregate cost of \$795,000, and to appropriate and expend from the existing bus purchase reserve fund \$185,000 for such costs, and that the balance of such costs, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by the levy of a tax to be collected in annual installments; and, in anticipation of such tax, debt obligations of the school district as may be necessary not to exceed \$610,000 shall be issued, or the School District may enter into an installment purchase contract if the Board of Education determines that it is in the best interest of the School District to finance the purchase in that method.
