#### I have a few items to share

As you may recall, the Dudley Middle School showcase for the School Committee featured the DMS mini boat *Anita*, which was retrieved five miles off the coast of Nova Scotia by fisherman Captain Fudge. Grade 7–9 students at Lockeport Regional High School participated in opening the *Anita* to discover the items placed in its hull by DMS students.

Lockeport students and DMS students met via Google Meet to share updates and inform DMS about the condition of the *Anita*. Currently, DMS students are collaborating with Lockeport to develop a relaunch plan for the boat.

We greatly appreciate the efforts of Ms. Stacy Lynch for bringing this program to DMS.









Each year, Charlton and Dudley Middle Schools select Project 351 Ambassadors. Project 351 is an independent nonprofit organization that fosters youth-led service by engaging an unsung hero from each of Massachusetts' 351 cities and towns. United for a year of leadership and service, Ambassadors transform communities, promote kindness, advance social justice, and develop the courage, compassion, and skills needed to lead change.

This year's Ambassadors are Victoria Norton from Dudley Middle School and Anthony Heath from Charlton Middle School.

Ms. Lesa Petrock is in her 23rd year supporting one of the largest community service-learning projects at DMS. Through her efforts, along with those of her colleagues and DMS students, 350 children in need will receive assistance this holiday season.

A special public thank you goes to Ms. Darlene Wolcott, who generously donated 100 pajama bags for this year's initiative.

The annual "Marching of the Gifts" will take place tomorrow, Thursday, December 12, 2024, at DMS at approximately 9:00 AM. Additionally, Channel 4, WBZ, is expected to air a segment highlighting this significant effort to support children in the Worcester County area.

Rams Read celebrated its 2023 Awards Get-Together at Point Breeze on Tuesday, November 7, 2023. Rams Read has been a long-standing program at SHRHS but was expanded to include all schools this past summer.

Rams Read is a fun, summer reading initiative designed to bring staff together. Participation is voluntary, and the program culminates with a celebration in the fall. This incredible effort fosters connections among DCRSD staff across all schools. Full credit for this initiative goes to Ms. Kristen Griffiths from SHRHS.

As we are all aware, the November election resulted in changes to the requirements for the MCAS assessment as a graduation requirement. To clarify, this does not eliminate the MCAS assessment itself, but rather the requirement to pass the MCAS to graduate.

We have been informed that further guidance will be forthcoming, but I want to emphasize the current situation for the Class of 2025. While most people equated graduation with passing the MCAS, the legal term used was for students to earn a Competency Determination (CD) in order to graduate, which until now was passing the MCAS assessment.

Receiving a Competency Determination is still a requirement for graduating from a public high school in Massachusetts. However, once the new law takes effect, the language for earning a Competency Determination will shift to "satisfactorily completing coursework that has been certified by the Dudley-Charlton Regional School District."

For the Class of 2025, students who have already earned their CD through MCAS testing have met the requirements for graduation, provided they also meet our district's graduation requirements.

We will keep the School Committee and the public updated as further guidance is issued by DESE.

School Committee Student Representative Anthony Avoglia attended the Massachusetts Association of Student Representatives (MASR) meeting on Saturday, November 23, 2024. MASR is an organization comprised of student representatives from school committees across Massachusetts, dedicated to connecting, educating, and supporting student members of school committees throughout the state.

This meeting serves as an opportunity for new student representatives and returning MASR members to learn more about the organization, collaborate with one another, and gain a better understanding of the topics that are most important to student representatives in Massachusetts.



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Last week, we experienced our first weather-related closure. I want to take a moment to review this imperfect decision-making process, which impacts families in different ways. In these situations, safety remains our top priority—ensuring the safe transportation of students to and from school, as well as the safe travel of staff to and from work. I respectfully ask that families and staff prepare for any of the three difficult weather-related decisions that may arise during the winter months.

The most obvious decision is to close school for the entire day. However, this requires considerable thought and can be made either the night before or the morning of a weather-related event. Ideally, I strive to make the call the night before, but there are instances when additional time is necessary to reach a final decision. If an early morning decision is needed, messaging begins just after 5:00 AM. We use our DCRSD notification system, which includes phone calls, text messages, and emails. Additionally, our closures are listed on local news channels. We did encounter some clunkiness with last week's closure, so I encourage families to check multiple sources for weather-related decisions.

A delayed opening may be used if additional time is required to ensure safe travel for students and staff. This typically results in a 2-hour delay, providing time to prepare the schools for opening or to assist our towns' DPW operations in clearing local roads. While a 2-hour delay is standard, it is not without its challenges. If a delayed opening is announced, there will be no morning prekindergarten classes.

An early dismissal may be necessary depending on the timing of a weather-related event. We strive to follow our established early-release day dismissal schedule, but slight adjustments

may be required. At a minimum, there must be one hour between secondary and elementary dismissals. If an early dismissal is called, there will be no afternoon prekindergarten classes.

We appreciate your understanding and preparation for weather-related decisions in the months ahead.

SUBJECT: Finance Director Update

**Fiscal Year 2025**: Fiscal Year 2025 is still within the established Operating Budget parameters, inclusive of encumbered costs, such as Salaries. FY2025 Federal Grant approvals were received the final week of November, with disbursement expected in December. The Finance Director will work with the Assistant Superintendent to allocate the grant funding appropriately across FY2025 and FY2026 expenditures. A detailed Operating Budget update will be provided in January 2025, when the 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter of FY2025 is complete.

**Fiscal Year 2026**: Director of Finance & Operations is currently meeting with building principals and I/T Director to discuss FY2026 Budget priorities and concessions. The FY2026 Governor's Budget is due in January 2025. Collective bargaining of union contracts, increased utility costs, and increased costs associated with Healthcare may have an impact on FY2026 Expenditures. The District is currently investigating ways to mitigate or minimize these potential increases. A draft version of the FY2026 Operating Budget will be completed in January 2025.

**Excess & Deficiency (E&D)**: E&D certification process is nearing completion. The District has provided financial data to the Division of Local Services (DLS) to certify the use of E&D. Once this process concludes, we will know the impact E&D certification will have on the upcoming assessment to member communities. A further update will be provided in January 2025.

**Audit of Fiscal Year 2024**: Marcum, LLP was on site November 25th and November 26th to perform field testing related to the District's FY2024 financials. To this point, there have not been any reported findings or issues for follow up. Additional updates will be provided on a monthly basis until the final Audit report of FY2024 is published. Copies will be provided to the School Committee once the final Audit report is published.

Heritage Elementary School: On Friday, December 6, 2024, both heating boilers at Heritage Elementary School went down. Multiple vendors have been contacted to survey the problem. There was a suggestion that the tanks be cleaned, at a cost of approximately \$12,000-\$13,000 each. With the strong work and dedication of the Facilities Director and the Custodial staff at Heritage School, the District is working on alternative methods to remedy the heating system issue without having to incur the high cost associated with the an oil tank cleaning. We're looking at potential fixes, such as fuel line cleaning and delivery line replacement. For now, the District is utilizing a backup oil tank to deliver fuel to the boilers.
