<u>Phonemic Awareness</u>

<u>Sound counting -</u> Say a word and have your child show you how many sounds the word makes. For example, for the word "top", your child would place three objects in a row and tap each object as they say the sound.

<u>Elkonin boxes -</u> Pronounce a word slowly, stretching it out by sound._Ask your child to repeat the word.Draw boxes or squares on a piece of paper, chalkboard, or dry erase board with one box for each syllable or phoneme.Have your child count the number of phonemes in the word, not necessarily the number of letters. For example, *wish* has three phonemes and will use three boxes. /w/, /i/, /sh/

<u>Words to Know</u>

Kindergarten: reward, command, explain, soil, spread First: attend, glance, perform, proud, expand Second: prefer, serious, discuss, protect, deal, select Third: pretest, misunderstand, beautiful, endless, definition Fourth:overdo, underground, identification, attachable Fifth:interstate, seasonal, microphone, responsible

<u>Tips for Parents</u>

- Reading together regularly can help your child develop a love of reading and expose them to new words and ideas.
- Talk about new words you come across while reading.
- Put books everywhere in your home, or have a special place for them.
