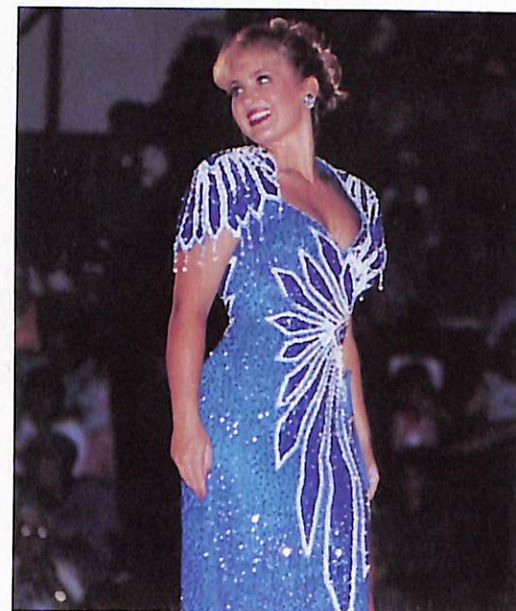
This year's pageant was in honor of the summer Olympics. The theme carried throughout the pageant was *Going for the Gold*.

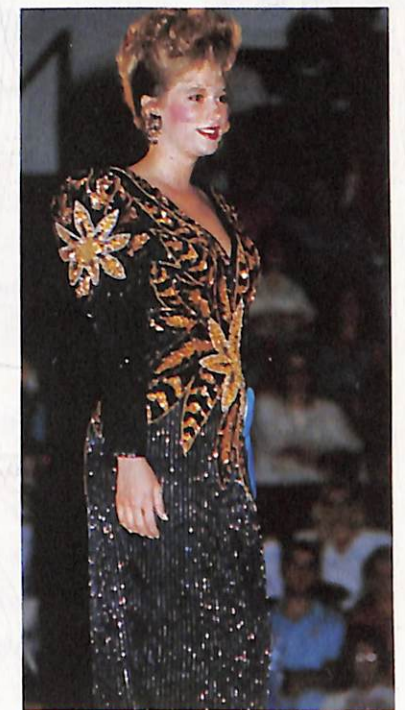

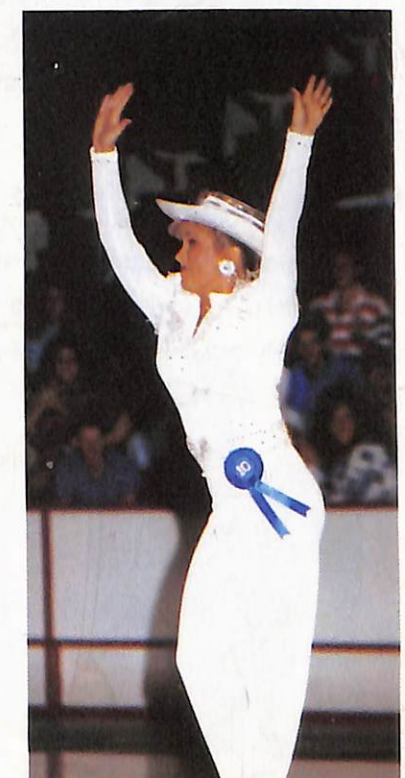

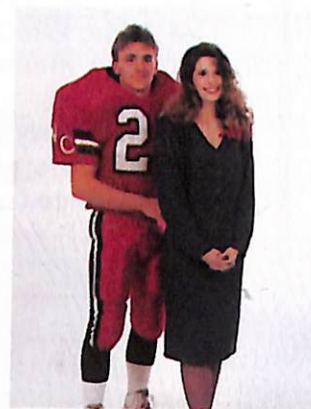
FOOTBALL HOMECOMING 1992-93

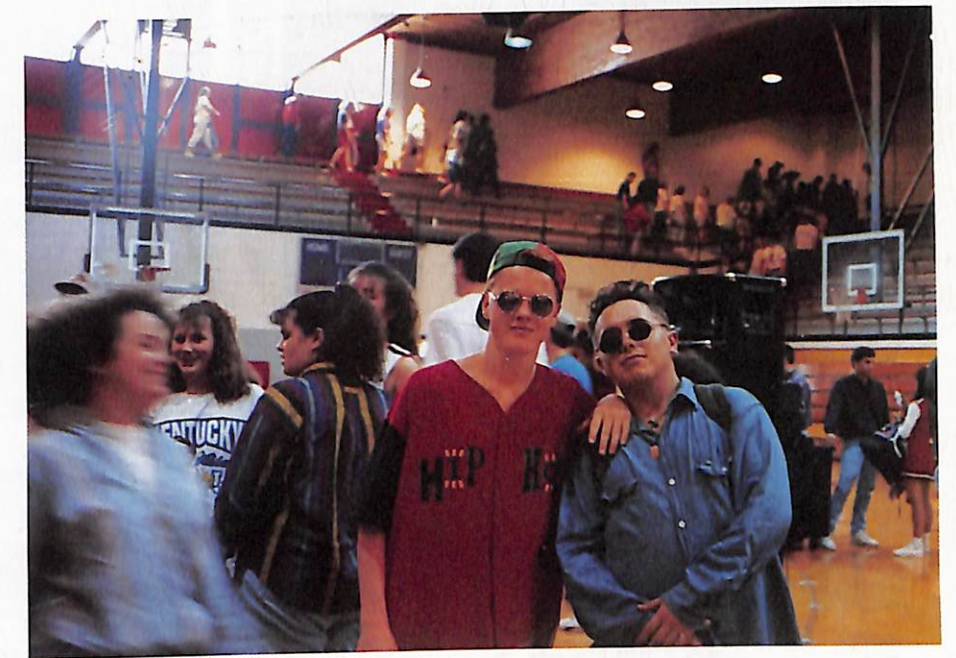
Senior Becky Canada said, "My biggest fear is losing contact with my friends after graduation. We've been together for so long; it's hard to imagine life without them."

Some of the juniors were asked, "What was the best and the worst thing that happened to you during your junior year?"

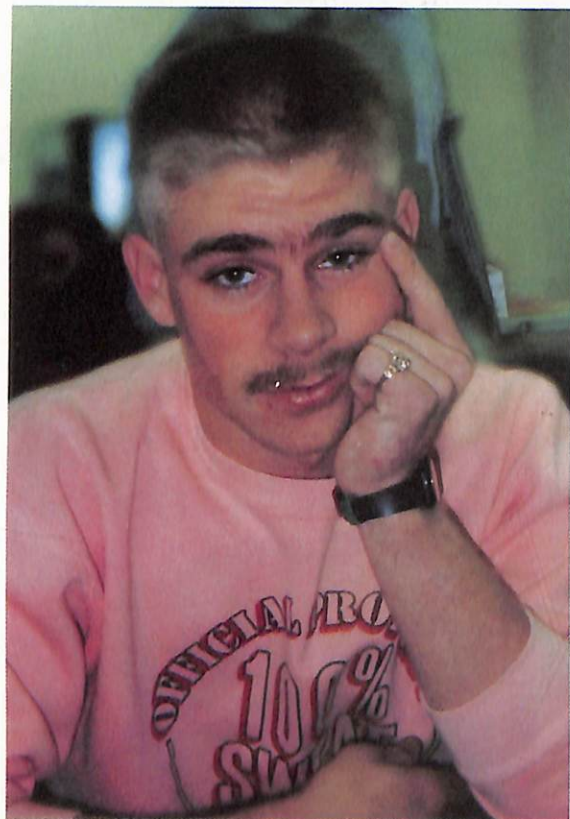

Jodi Fisher replied, "The good would be the thought of only one more year of school, and the bad would be when I wrecked my almost new car."

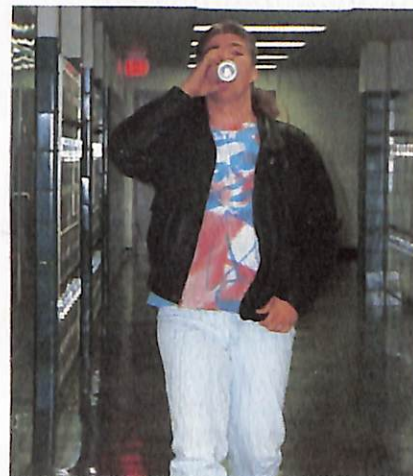

As you approach the end of your sophomore year, you may have begun to realize that high school is really going to end for you - and in just two years.

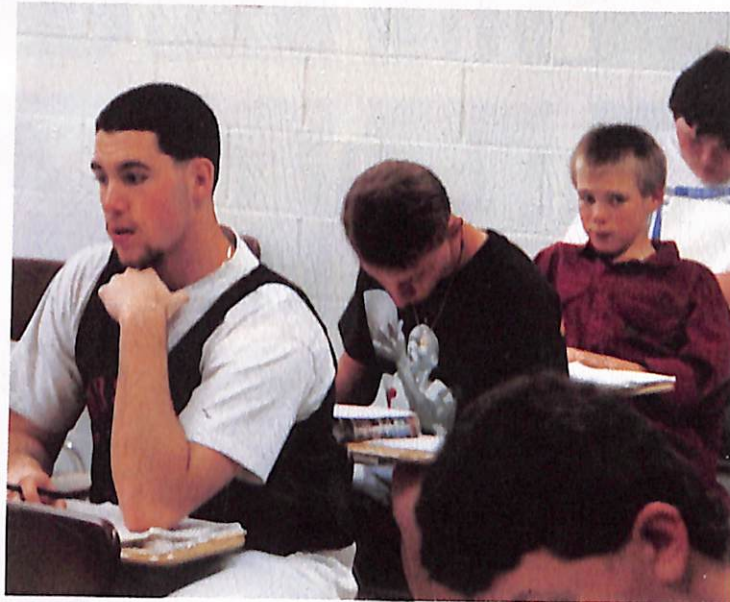
Consequently, your "future" becomes a real issue and you wonder - "Where will I be, and what will I be doing ten years from now?"

"The most difficult part in developing a yearbook is deadlines, deadlines, deadlines!" stated Lorri Taylor.

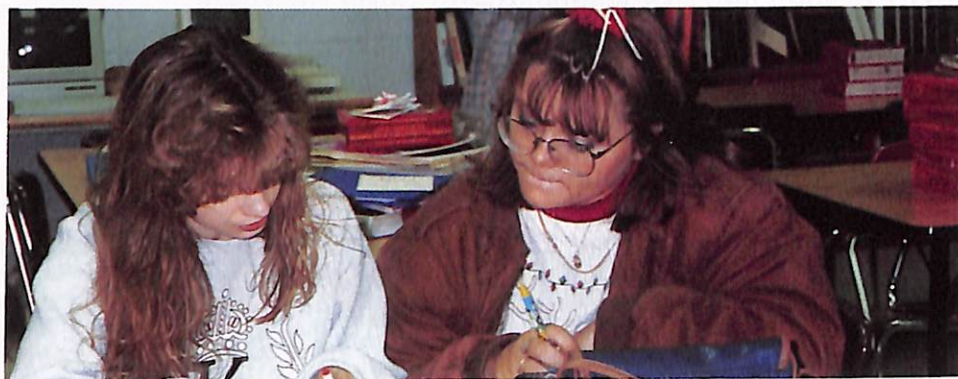

History is the place where most students catch up on their beauty sleep ... well, not at Whitley. History students have done a variety of interesting projects and activities this school year.

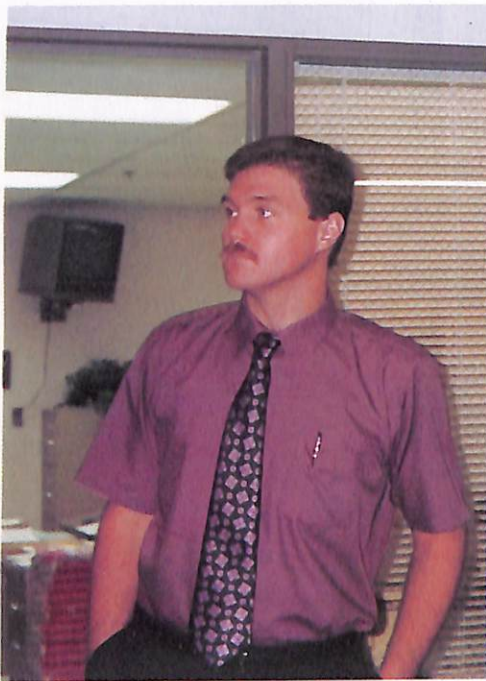

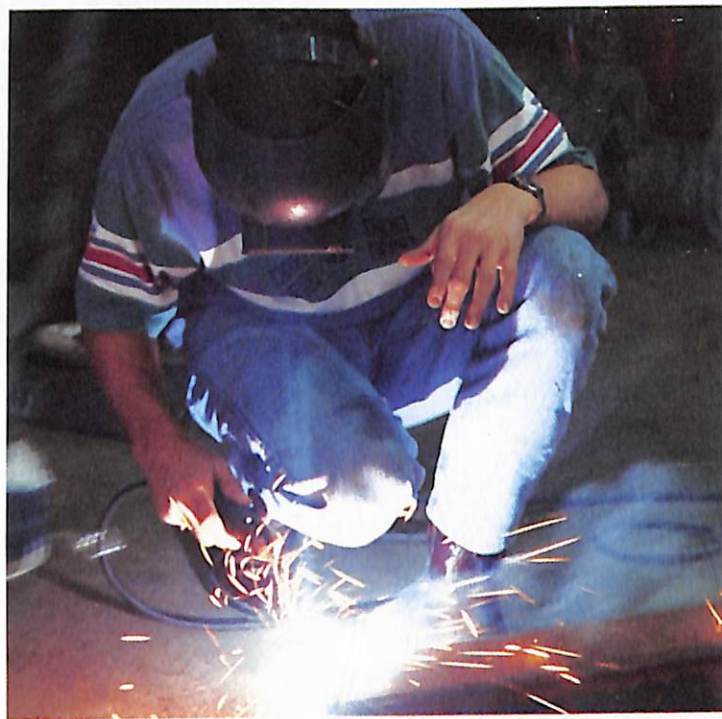
Keys To Success

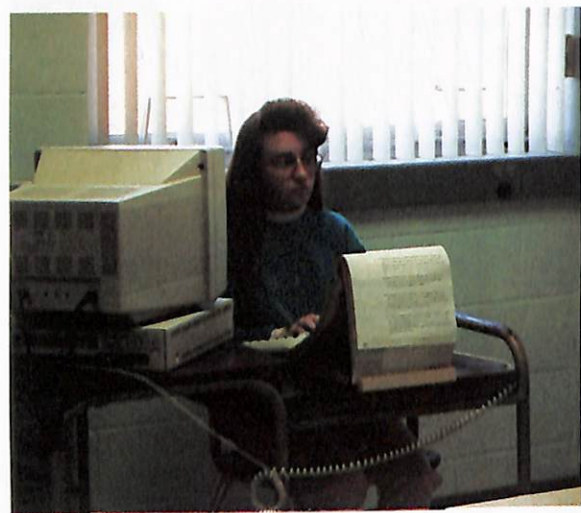

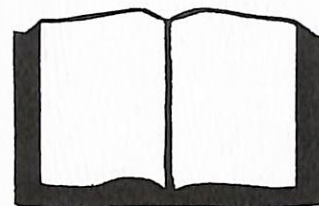
MEDIA CENTER

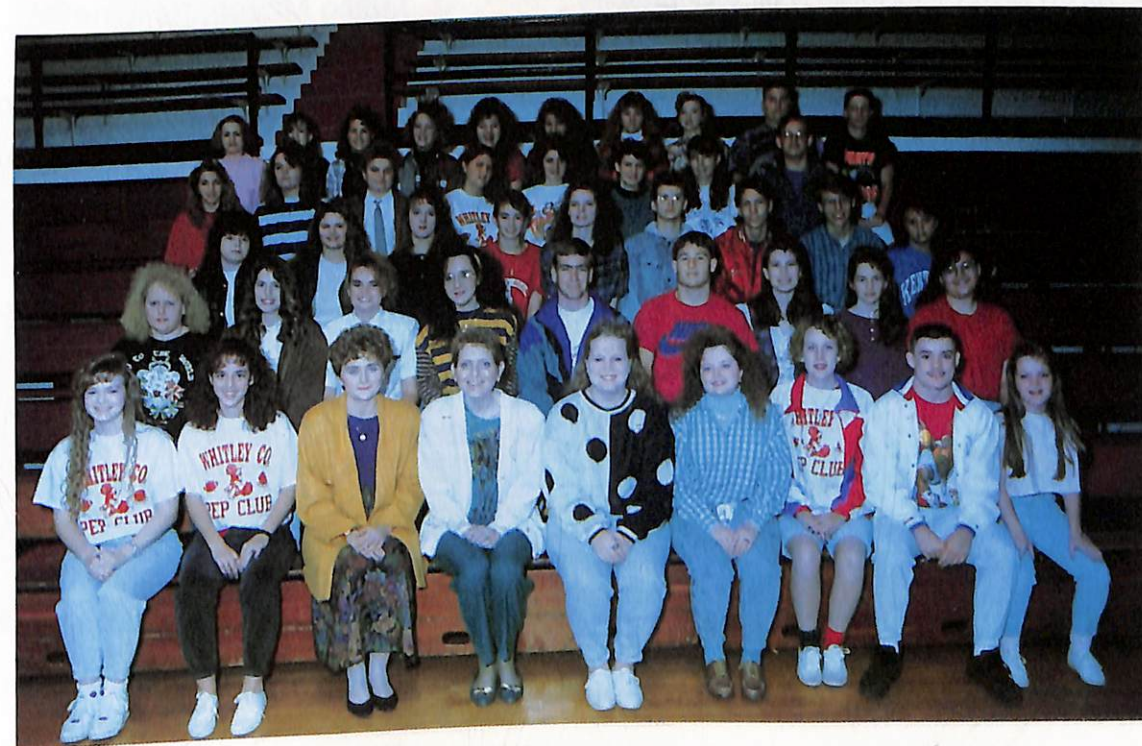
FOREIGN CULTURE

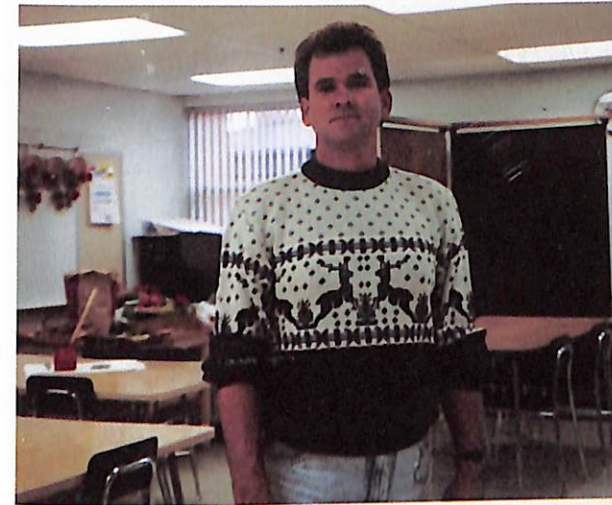

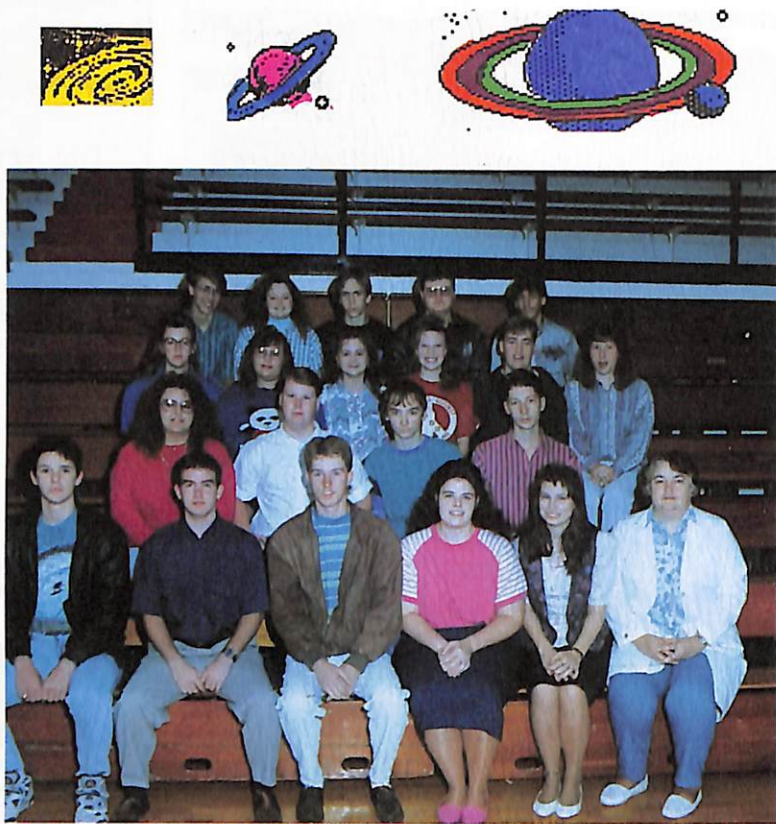

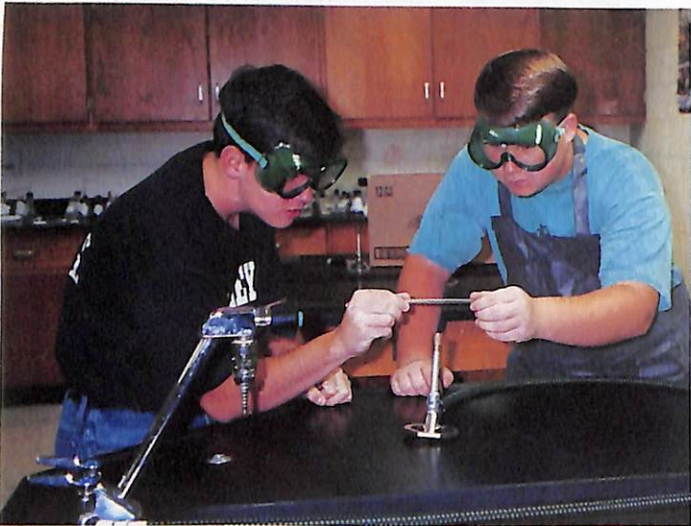
SCIENCE CLUB: SCIENTISTS OF THE FUTURE

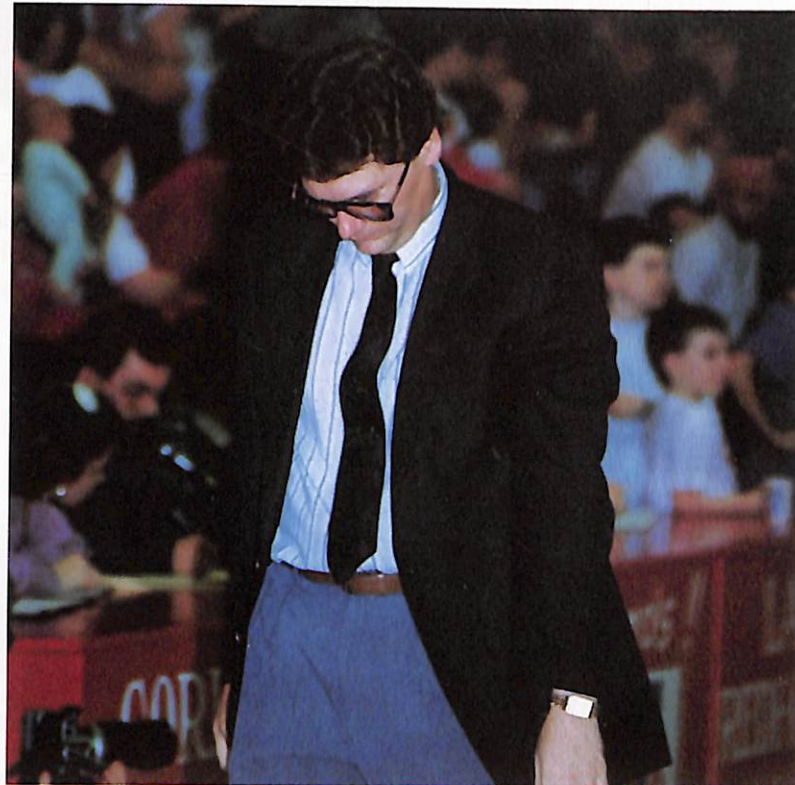
COLONEL BASKETBALL --

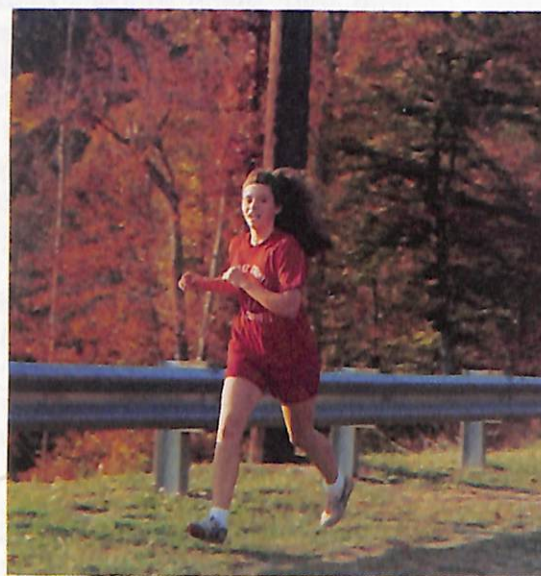
In major competitions, our boys' varsity did great. At the Middlesboro Mall Competition, they placed second overall and were awarded best sideline cheer.

We are very proud of the W.C.H.S. baseball team. They definitely represented our school well in competition. In the students eyes the Colonels are "Major League!"

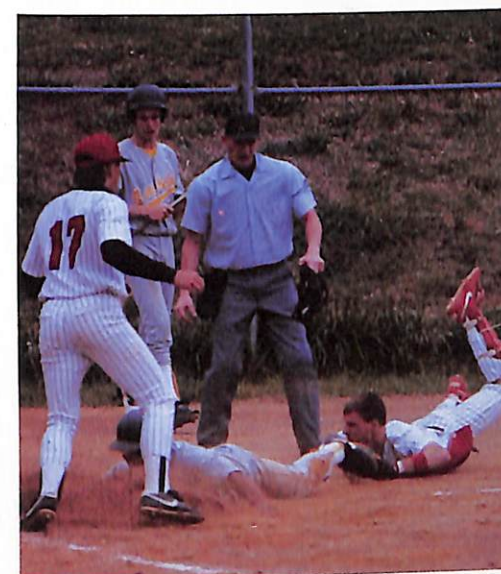

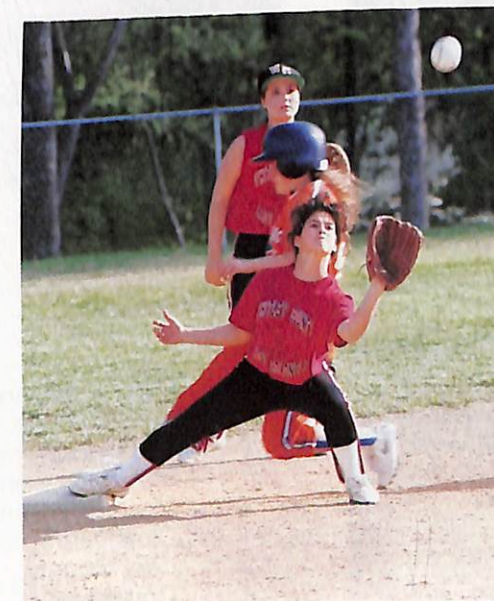
