Current NYS Assessment Data (2023-2024)

The results of the 2023-2024 Grades 3-8 English Language Arts and Mathematics represent student achievement on the new Next Generation Learning Standards.

For the purpose of tonight's presentation, we will look at the opportunity for us to use the 2023-2024 data to evaluate the effectiveness of our District Comprehensive Improvement Plan and curricular initiatives where data can be collected, reviewed and evaluated.



A 6-Year Overview of Assessments

2018-19	Typical assessment year - 2 day test, untimed
2019-20	No 3-8 assessments administered
2020-21	Limited 3-8 assessments (only session 1; multiple choice)
2021-22	Typical assessment year - 2 day test
2022-23	Typical assessment year - 2 day test Baseline: 3-8 assessments aligned to the Next Generation Learning Standards for the first time.
2023-24	Typical assessment year - 2 day test 3-8 assessments aligned to the Next Generation Learning Standards for the second time. This was the first year of the new 5th and 8th grade science test (previously given in 4th grade). Students in grade 5 and 8 took this assessment on the computer for the first time.



Accountability Subgroups in NYS

An accountability subgroup is a group of students who are assigned to a certain category based on their race/ethnicity, English language proficiency, disability status, or economic status.

The accountability subgroups are:

- All students are in a racial/ethnic category: American Indian or Alaska Native, Black or African American, Hispanic or Latino, Asian or Native Hawaiian/Other Pacific Islander, White, Multiracial
- Some students may be in additional subgroup categories:
 - Economically Disadvantaged;
 - o English Language Learners; and
 - Students with Disabilities.

Subgroup Definition: Economically Disadvantaged

Student who participates in, or whose family participates in, economic assistance programs, such as the Free or Reduced-Price Lunch Programs; Social Security Insurance (SSI); Food Stamps; Foster Care; Refugee Assistance (cash or medical assistance); Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC); Home Energy Assistance Program (HEAP); Safety Net Assistance (SNA); Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA); or Family Assistance: Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF). If one student in a family is identified as low income, all students from that household (economic unit) may be identified as low income.



Overall District Refusal Rate, 3-8 ELA and Math










GRADES 5 & 8 SCIENCE RESULTS (2023-24)

The results of the 2023-24 Grades 5 and 8 Science tests represent student achievement on the new NYS P-12 Science Learning Standards. Because the tests measure different learning standards, the results are not comparable to those from prior years.








Similar District ELA Proficiency Data - All students






Similar District ELA Proficiency Data - Students with Disabilities






Similar District ELA Proficiency Data - Economically Disadvantaged






Similar District ELA Proficiency Data - *Grade 5, All Students*
