Requirements for New York State Public Schools

The District-wide Safety and Emergency Management Plan was developed pursuant to Commissioner's Regulation 155.17 and NYS Education Law 2801 and requires:

- An annual public hearing with 30-days public comment period following the hearing;
- Adoption of the plan by the BOE by September 1.
- Posted on our District website by October 1.



Update per NYSED as of July 15, 2024

On Monday, July 15th, the State Board of Regents approved the proposed updates to 155.17 law. In addition to the proposed amendments that were announced several months ago, revisions to the amendments were made as a result of feedback received from stakeholders. These changes went into effect on July 31st, 2024.

In response to these last-minute changes made by NYSED, we are required to have a new 30-day public comment period for 2024-25 district plans.

NYSED further clarified that if a current district-wide safety plan is on track to meet the September 1st deadline, as ours is, **then we are in compliance**.

We will have a second public comment period later this fall based on these changes by SED and readopt at a later date this school year.

- **Participating in Unified Command Under Incident Command System Principles**
 - OPCSD Administrative team has undergone the FEMA Incident Command Structure (ICS) training, which is consistent with the National Interagency Incident Management System (NIMS);
 - This prepares OPCSD employees to have effective communications with first responders during an emergency.

 - The goal being to return to a pre-crisis climate of a more “normal” post-crisis state.

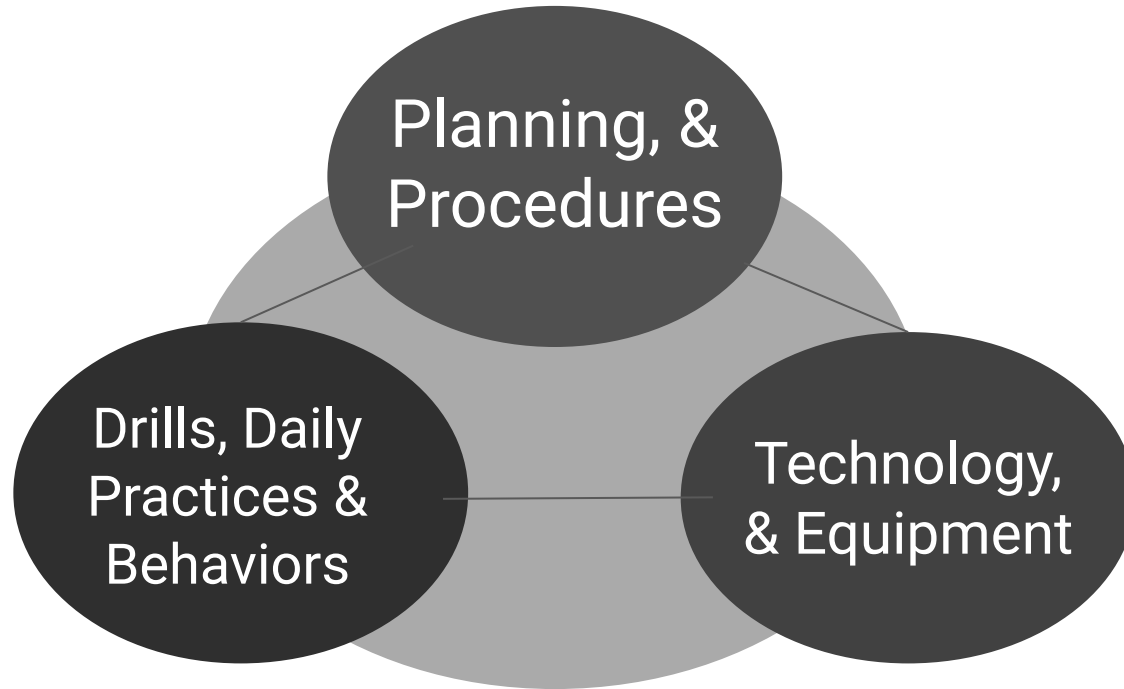


Comments from the Public
