45 46 47 48			All senior students will be required to perform a minimum of fifteen (15) hours of youth service between the end of their junior year and the end of their senior year. This allows them to perform their service during the summer months also.

- Each time a student completes service hours, they will submit a form to the 1 2 counseling office. If a student does not complete the 15 hours of service 3 requirement by the date determined by the administration for that graduating 4 class, they will be allowed to participate in the graduation ceremony but will 5 not receive a diploma until the Youth Service Requirement is complete. 6 7 C. **Exemplary Service** 8 9 Those students performing at least one hundred (100) hours of service will 10 receive special recognition at the end of each school year. 11 12 D. Types of Youth Service 13 14 There is virtually no limit to what a student can do to fulfill their youth service 15 requirement. A very broad division of places where help is always needed 16 might be as follows: 17 18 1. Social Agencies (e.g., food shelves, community centers, nursing homes, 19 hospitals, day care centers) Schools (e.g., peer tutoring, teaching assistantships, clerical assistance 20 2. 21 in Guidance/Career Center, Media Center, High School office, hall 22 monitoring) 23 3. Special projects (helping senior citizens with house cleaning, laundry, 24 home repair, or just visiting, helping with recycling programs, producing 25 public service videos, caring for small children) 26 27 E. School Support of Youth Service 28 29 It is the responsibility of Richfield High School to provide a variety of youth 30 service opportunities to students. 31 32 **IV.
