Additionally, Nancy brought her expertise to KiwiCo, a subscription-based STEAM company, where she worked as an Editor and Project Manager, designing hands-on projects that inspire creativity, innovation, and problem-solving in children.

She earned a B.A. in Psychology with minors in Child Development and English from UCLA, followed by an M.A. in Curriculum and Instruction and a Multiple Subject Teaching Credential from San Jose State University.
